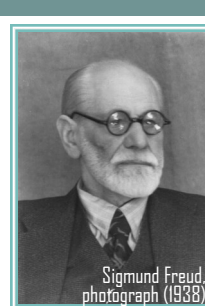

Psychology students receive Jackson Fellowship

Kaitlin Andreasen and Carolyn Vandelac, CSB a psychology major and psychology minor, respectively, will be building leadership skills, enhancing social development and improving community life this summer thanks to their internships through the Marie and Robert Jackson Fellows program.

The Jackson Fellows program was established in 2008 through an anonymous donation made to the College of Saint Benedict. Students who are named Jackson Fellows work at civic affairs organizations for the summer and also attend group seminars focused on civic engagement and leadership.

This year over forty applications from highly qualified candidates were received, said Matt Lindstrom, associate professor of political science at CSB and SJU and director of the Eugene J. McCarthy Center for Public Policy and Civic Engagement who co-heads the fellowship, along with Marah Jacobson-Schulte, service-learning coordinator at CSB and SJU. “[The selection process] involved looking for applicants with strong communication and

leadership ability, academic success, and an interest in community service and public policy,” said Lindstrom.

Andreasen and Vandelac are among the nine students chosen this year to receive paid internships at a work site of their choice. For her summer, Andreasen plans to work at The Kaleidoscope Place, a nonprofit alternative learning school in downtown Minneapolis. “I will have the opportunity to mentor and provide support to children in different areas including social, cognitive, and emotional development,” said Andreasen.

For her internship, Vandelac plans to work in St. Paul for the White House Project, a national, nonprofit, nonpartisan organization that seeks to advance women’s leadership in communities and government. She will be involved in many projects for the organization, including planning their annual conference and debate training sessions for women.

Both women hope this community-oriented internship is a stepping-stone on the path toward fulfilling careers. “I am very excited to be a 2010 Jackson Fellow and to broaden my horizons in the field of psychology,” said Andreasen. Those interested in future Jackson Fellowship slots should

get involved in community-building activities as soon as possible. “Don’t wait until you’re a senior to worry about your résumé,” said Lindstrom.

The two psychology students also advocate early preparation. “Students [should try] to gain a deeper understanding of civic engagement and... have internships, summer jobs, and extra-curricular activities that they are passionate about,” said Vandelac. She went on to stress that leadership skills are very important, and can be honed through classes offered by the Inspiring Leaders Certificate Program (ILCP).

Volunteer work and activities are very important, but Jackson fellows, as exemplified by Andreasen and Vandelac, must have more than that. “[We are looking] for students who push themselves,” said Lindstrom, “people who don’t just take the easy way.” Jackson fellows are top students and campus leaders interested in civic engagement and volunteerism.

If so, you should strongly consider applying to be an Introductory Psychology Lab Teaching Intern (TI) in the psychology department’s unique teaching practicum program (PSYC 399)!

During this experience you will be responsible for teaching two, 70-minute introductory psychology lab courses to small groups of introductory psychology students, and you will work with classmates to develop lesson plans and grade assignments for these labs. In addition, all TIs will meet twice

a cycle for the practicum course, in which you will work together to develop strong teaching practices to implement in your labs.

There are many fulfilling benefits to being a TI. This experience fulfills the senior capstone requirement for the psychology major and along the way, you are sure to learn many valuable life skills that will help you in the future. You will also be able to interact with psychology faculty, fellow senior psychology majors, and other students.
