


- •Came to St. John's Prep in 1931 at age 15;








1934 Hockey Team

McCarthy was a right end, and also on the "all-star college intramural football team" (1934 Sagatagan)





The team went **1-6** on the season, scoring a total of **9** goals all season. "Lack of ice...and the loss of starts from last year's squad made the road this season a rocky one. But Coach McCarthy and [the] lettermen went to work unflinchingly in the face of adverse odds."
