Research and Root Beer

Summer Research in DNA Repair Mechanisms

Dr. Michael Reagan reports that his "students, Zach Shaheen and Katie Ward, had a productive summer working in the lab, studying the effect of DNA ethylation on transcription by RNA polymerase II. They showed that damaging DNA by ethylating it causes RNAPII to pause or terminate transcription when it encounters a damaged base. I showed this work at the "Mutagenesis" conference in Newport, RI in August to rave reviews. The next part of the project is to determine if the RNAPII is just paused, or if it really terminates transcription when it encounters this damage. Zach and Katie will be showing their poster on Thursday, Sept 14 at 4-5:30 in Mary Commons and will be giving a short talk on it at some point this semester. I'm sure they'd be happy to talk about their experience in lab, so get in touch with them if you are interested."

Daphnia Research

Dr. Bill Lamberts worked this summer with CSB student Caitlin Walsh and Zhou Haiyun (Melody) of Southwest China University. Their research was part of the first year of the China Summer Research Exchange Program. They did research on predatory infochemicals on *Daphnia* heart rate and swimming behavior.

Erin Saupe - Smithsonian Summer Internship – by Dr. Larry Davis, CSB/SJU Biology

This past summer, Erin Saupe (Senior; Natural Science - Geology) completed a 10-week summer research internship at the Smithsonian's Museum of National History under the direction of Dr. Brian Huber. Erin's research focused on foraminifera (forams), which are Protista that secrete a calcium carbonate test, or shell. Forams live in a variety of salt and fresh water environments from the poles to the equator. Because forams have been present for over 540 million years and some groups evolve relatively quickly, they are used as index fossils for dating sedimentary rock strata.



Erin's project was part of a larger endeavor aimed at restructuring the classification of Cretaceous age planktonic (floating) foraminifera and based on changes in shape through time. During Erin's investigation, two species of Late Cretaceous, planktonic foraminifera, *Heterohelix rajagopalani* and *Gublerina cuvillieri*, were studied from three Deep Sea Drilling Project sites (761B, 762C, 1050C) to determine if *Heterohelix rajagopalani* is the ancestor of *Gublerina cuvillieri*. Shell growth measurements were obtained from high resolution x-ray images to quantitatively measure growth differences between the two species. Scanning Electron Microscope images were used to look at differences in shell ornamentation

and external morphology. Preliminary data analysis suggests that *H. rajagopalani* and *G. cuvillieri*'s early ontogeny, or growth history, is similar but that their morphology changes as they grow more chambers. Stable isotope analyses of the two species will be obtained to determine if their relative depth ecologies differ. Erin's project can provide a glimpse into what the climate was like 64 million years ago as well as provide information on current climate change.

Erin presented her research at a Smithsonian Research Symposium and anticipates presenting again at a Geological Society of America meeting in the coming year. The title of Erin's research presentation is "*Is Heterohelix rajagonpalani* the Ancestor of *Gublerina cuvillieri*? A Phylogenic and Taxonomic Study." Buckthorn Busters & Trailblazers Wanted

Volunteers are needed on October 14th from 9:00 to 1:00 or so (or as long as you can help) we will be working on two projects in the Big Woods behind Oak Hill Community School. There are several trails winding through the woods that are in need of widening and cleaning up. We will also be working on removing European Buckthorn, an invasive species of plant, from the woods. The trail crew will be pulling and cutting small brushy plants to widen the trails and clearing fallen branches from the trails. Gloves and loppers and pruners will be very useful tools. The buckthorn crew will be pulling smaller buckthorn plants out of the ground. Anything too big to pull will need to be cut with loppers or chainsaws. All of the bigger branches and plants will need to be dragged out of the Big Woods and put on piles to be chipped at a later date by a city crew. Many people will be needed for this activity.
