Registration Instructions March 30—April 8, 2009 FALL 2009

All currently registered students who expect to return to CSB/SJU this Fall must complete advance registration by April 8th. Please follow these instructions carefully—proper registration is your responsibility. If you have any questions about registration, call the Registrar's Office at 5260 (CSB) or 3396 (SJU).

STUDENTS ARE ELIGIBLE TO REGISTER ONLY IF THEY HAVE:

- Met with their advisor to obtain their Label with Registration PIN #
- Settled all current charges with the Student Accounts Office
- Been accepted by a department (unless they are a first-year student)
Applied for graduation if they are classified as a Senior
- Complied with Minnesota immunization regulations
- Have an active Network account

We strongly urge you to meet with your advisor early and enter your registration on BANNER Web Self Service on the date listed on your PIN Label. **Registration is on-line—delaying your registration will affect course selection.**

Students who are ineligible to register for any of these reasons may register on BANNER Web Self Service after they have cleared all registration holds.

Please note that registration for ILPs (Individualized Learning Projects) and for special programs (Tri-College Exchange, Internships, etc.) requires your submission of special forms available from the Registrar's Office or they are available on-line. Registration for Internships (8 credits or more) are due the first day of classes.

REGISTRATION ADJUSTMENTS

Registration adjustments (Drop/Add) can be done on Banner Web Self Service through August 31st. **You will need your Registration PIN# that you received from your Advisor.** To drop a course after this date, students can come to the Registrar's Office at SJU (Quad 161) or at CSB (Academic Services Building 208).

Listings of cancelled or closed courses will be electronically updated on the Class Schedule Information on Banner Web Self Service. Students should use Banner Web Self Service to check whether a space has become available in a course that was previously closed. Courses may be added through the first 4 class days of the semester.

If a course is closed, check whether there are any other sections of the same course that have spaces available in them and register for an alternate section. If this option is not available to you, consider alternate courses and register accordingly. Your advisor is a good resource to help determine an appropriate alternate. In some cases, it may be appropriate for the department chair or instructor to "override" a student beyond the course limit. Override registrations are completed by the student presenting a signed (department chair or instructor, as appropriate) Drop/Add card to the Registrar's Office or the online Override form.

REGISTRATION PRIORITY AND COURSE SELECTION

Registration priority is based first on class standing, then on cumulative earned hours. Seniors are assigned courses first, then juniors, sophomores and first-year students. Class standing is determined by earned credits, not by years in college. **Banner Web Self Service will immediately respond to your course selection by indicating Enrolled or Closed.**

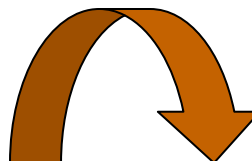

DROP/ADD on Banner Web Self Service

If you would like to drop and add courses for Fall Term 2009, you may do this through Banner Web Self Service until August 31st. Please keep your Registration PIN #. You will need this to Drop/Add on Banner Web Self Service. After this date you will need to drop and add courses in the Registrar's Office.

OBTAINING A NETWORK ACCOUNT

All students must have a NETWORK account to use Banner Web Self Service from the Network PC's on campus. Most of you will already have an account, which you may use for many other functions besides course registration. If you do not have a Network account please follow these steps to obtain your Network account:

- Step #1:** Go the Computing Center at SJU, Quad 084, from 8:30 am - 4:30 pm
- Step #2:** Identify yourself as needing a Network account.
- Step #3:** Activate your account on one of the PC's in the computing center

PROBLEMS -- Discussed below are some common problems we expect some of you may encounter, and how you may solve them.

- **Your PIN # doesn't work.**
Solution: Re-check your label and carefully re-enter the PIN #. You may have to Exit Banner Web Self Service completely and login again. **YOUR PIN# for registration is not the same as your WSC (Web Security Code) that you use to access Student Information on Banner-Web Self Service.** Please note: the PIN # is not displayed (for security reasons) as you enter it on the computer.
- **You lost your PIN #.**
Solution: Contact your Advisor to get your Pin Number again, or bring your Advisor's signature to the Registrar's Office. (PIN #'s cannot be obtained in the Computer Access Areas)
- **You entered the wrong CRN #.**
Solution: Banner Web Self Service allows you to make changes to your registration. See the section on changing your fall registration in the "Instructions for using Banner Web Self Service". You may make changes on Banner Web Self Service through August 31st.
- **While using Banner Web Self Service it displays: "This session for your Login has expired".**
Solution: Banner Web Self Service is programmed to Log off of the Registration Screen if you leave the screen idle for more than 15 minutes. If this should this happen, simply sign on again. To do so, click on Banner Web Self Service and then click on the Fall Registration icon and start over.
- **Banner Web Self Service shows the status of a course as 'open' but it will not permit you to register for the course.**
Solution: You may not meet the prerequisites or quota restrictions for that course. Check the notes in the class schedule under that course or contact the Registrar's Office.

ESSENTIAL INFORMATION

ACADEMIC ADVISING

After receiving this Class Schedule booklet, visit your academic advisor to arrange a program of classes for next term, and have your advisor place your PIN label on the Class Request Worksheet located on the back page of your Fall 2009 Class Schedule Booklet.

If you intend to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. Overloads may be attempted only by students in good academic standing, and overloads of 20 or more credits require the student to see the Academic Advising Office.

ACADEMIC PROBATION

First semester students must earn a minimum 1.8 cumulative grade point average to remain in good academic standing. In subsequent semesters, all students are required to maintain a 2.0 cumulative grade point average for all CSB/SJU coursework. Students who fall below a 2.0 cumulative GPA will be placed on academic probation for the next semester. During the probationary semester, students must raise their cumulative GPA to 2.0 and may take no courses for S/U grading unless the course is offered only on an S/U basis. Students whose cumulative GPA remains below the minimum standards at the end of a Final Probationary semester are subject to dismissal. For more information, see the Official Academic Catalog.

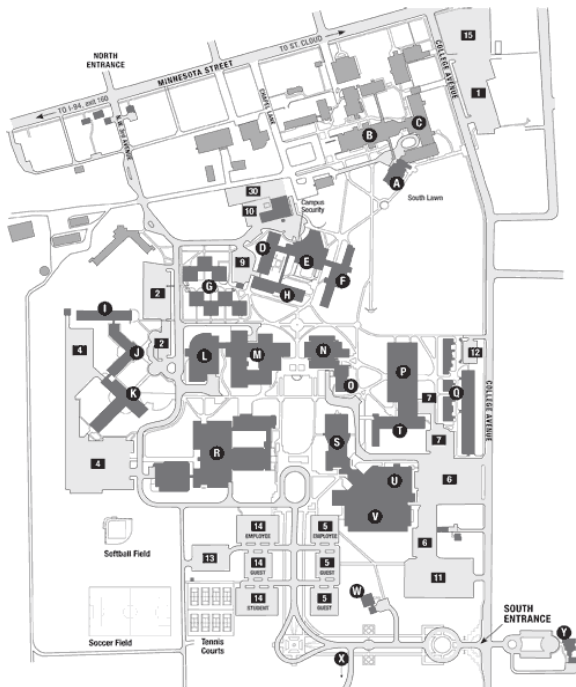
ADDING A CLASS

August 31st is the last day you may ADD a full-term course to your program, unless the course's first meeting is scheduled after August 31st. No student may enroll for a full-term course after the second scheduled meeting without the instructor's consent.

Banner Web Self Service will be available to add courses through the 4th day of the semester. After the 4th day of the semester, any additions, with the instructor's consent, must be made by filling out a drop/add card & filing with the Registrar's Office.

AUDITING A CLASS

Students intending to audit a course (earn no credit) should indicate their intent when registering for the course, or complete a Drop/Add card and file it with the Registrar's Office during the first week of class. Auditors are expected to attend all regular classes, but they are not required to take final exams. A student who first registers for credit may change to auditor status any time during the first month of class. A student who first enrolls for auditor status may change to credit status only during the first week of class. Courses audited are not included in determining the total credits earned; however, the credit value of any course audited is calculated in the total tuition cost.

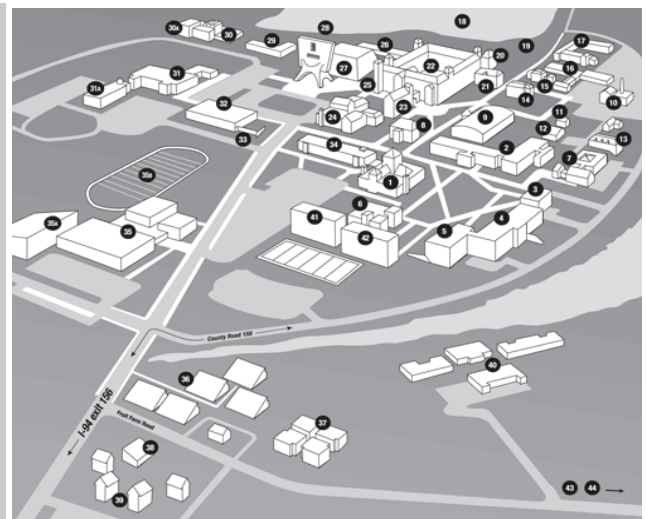

However, we do not guarantee that courses of instruction, extra curricular activities or other programs or events will be completed or rescheduled. Refunds will be made to eligible students in accordance with College or University policy.

Classes offered Periods II, III, and IV generally are requested by greater numbers of students than are other periods. You are less likely to be closed out of a class that is scheduled for Period I, or V, and may wish to consider this when you prepare your initial registration.

CO-REQUISITES (COREQ)

Co-requisites are courses that must be taken during the same semester.

CREDITS EARNED AT OTHER COLLEGES

Students may complete out-of-residence courses and transfer them to Saint Benedict's and Saint John's. The college at which the coursework is completed must be accredited by the appropriate regional accrediting agency at the time of enrollment. Courses to be transferred must be similar to courses offered for credit at Saint Benedicts and Saint John's. Courses to be transferred must receive a minimum grade of C. Credits received for these courses are translated into semester credits according to the appropriate translation formula. Grades earned for transferred coursework are not calculated into the student's cumulative GPA. Before credit may be transferred, the Registrar's Office must receive an official transcript directly from the college at which the courses were completed.

With advance approval, students may apply these courses towards core or common curriculum and/or major requirements. Work taken to complete core or common requirements requires prior consultation with and approval of the Registrar's Office or the Academic Advising Office. Work taken to complete major requirements requires prior consultation and approval of the department chair. The department chair needs to sign an Academic Substitution/Exemption Form.

Students who intend to transfer coursework from a foreign college or university must consult the director of international studies before beginning such study. Consult the Education Abroad Office for further information.

CREDIT OVERLOAD

If you plan to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. The overload tuition fee is estimated at \$816 per credit over 18. Students whose cumulative grade point average is below 2.00 may not register for an overload. Students in good academic standing (GPA above 2.00) may register for a maximum of 1 overload credit (19 credits overall) without permission. Credit totals of 20 or more require the student to see the Academic Advising Office. The Banner Web Self Service registration system will not allow you to register for more than 19 credits.

DROPPING A CLASS

- **Aug. 31st** Last day to drop a course using Banner Web Self Service. After this date students must fill out a drop/add card & obtain the instructor's signature to receive a permanent drop until September 21st
- **Sept. 21st** Last day to receive a permanent drop on your schedule
- **Nov. 16th** Last day to receive a "W" on your transcript. If you withdraw after this date, your instructor may assign you an "F" at the end of the semester if appropriate.

For courses scheduled for less than a full term, withdrawal during the first third of the course will result in no record entry; during the second third, a "W" entry; during the final third, a failure if appropriate.

Students who fail to properly drop or withdraw from a course may be subject to a failing grade if appropriate.

EXEMPTION/SUBSTITUTION

In exceptional circumstances students may petition for exemption/substitution from specific academic regulations. Forms for requesting an exemption/substitution are available from the Registrar's Office. Students should first consult with their academic advisor, whose signature on the exemption/substitution form represents a recommendation that the request be considered favorably by the approving official. Department chairs are the approving officials for exemptions/substitutions from requirements within majors and minors. Exemptions/substitutions from academic regulations beyond major and minor fields require the approval of the Assistant Academic Dean. Requests for these non-departmental exemptions/substitutions should be directed to the Academic Advising Offices. The guiding principle in considering requests for any exemption/substitution is fidelity to the academic standards of the colleges.

Classes that meet after Period V may use their last regularly scheduled class period for their final exam or request a multi section common exam time.

The academic calendar concludes each semester with a one-day study and three-day test cycle. Faculty may administer final exams for their classes only during the exam periods officially scheduled by the Registrar's Office. Cumulative final examinations may not be given during the regularly scheduled class days of the semester. If there is to be a cumulative final exam in a course, all exams given during the semester must be returned for student review by the last scheduled day of class.

Instructors of each full-term course are expected to announce at the beginning of the course whether a written two-hour final examination will be given. Such an exam will be administered during the three-day test cycle according to the schedule above. Note that a class is assigned a test time and day in the schedule according to the cycle and time period it meets during the semester. Classes that meet after Period V may use their last regularly scheduled class period for a final exam.

One period has been reserved on each of the four test days for the administration of a common exam for multiple-section courses who so desire. A list of such courses, and their exam times, will be announced this fall. The legend, MS, in the accompanying chart signifies times set aside for these multi-section common exams.

GRADUATION INFORMATION

- An Application for Degree must be submitted to the Registrar's Office prior to the award of a degree from Saint John's University or the College of Saint Benedict.

- An Application for Degree is sent to all CSB/SJU Juniors during spring semester.
- Submitted applications are then reviewed to ensure all Core or Common Curriculum and Major requirements are met prior to the award of a degree.
- Results of the Degree Audit are sent to students two times during their senior year: September and February.
- Degrees are issued in May, August, and December.
- Upon successful completion of all degree requirements, diplomas and transcripts are sent to all graduates at their permanent address.
- An Application for Degree allows students the privilege to participate in the May commencement ceremony.
- Students may participate in the May commencement ceremony if they are within 8 credits of all degree requirements.
- Students who leave CSB/SJU may transfer up to eight semester credits from another accredited institution of higher education to complete their degree requirements.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

- 124 credit hours. 45 of these must be earned at CSB/SJU
- 40 of the total credit hours must be upper division (300 level)
- 2.0 minimum cumulative GPA (unless a specific major requires a higher average)
- 2.0 minimum GPA major and/or supporting courses (unless a specific major requires a higher average)
- Completed Core or Common Curriculum requirements
- Acceptance to a major (usually at the completion of sophomore year)
- Requirements for a major (half of the courses for a major must be completed at CSB/SJU)
- Candidates for a degree must normally be in residence for the two semesters preceding commencement

HOLDS

All financial, academic, student accounts & health center holds must be cleared before registering for classes.

INCOMPLETE GRADE POLICY

The policy concerning the temporary grade Incomplete (I) includes the following points:

When circumstances warrant, instructors may allow some delay in the completion of course work. Such extensions shall not extend beyond the close of the following regular (fall or spring) semester, and earlier limits may be set at the discretion of the instructor.

The instructor must report on the official grade roster the grade "I" followed by the minimum grade the student will receive if the course work is not complete by the end of the following semester (e.g., IF, or IC, or IB). That grade will be used in the computation of grade point averages until the Incomplete is removed.

If by the end of the following semester the instructor reports a single final grade to the Registrar, that grade will replace the I/ GRADE, the Incomplete will be removed, and averages recomputed accordingly. Otherwise the minimum grade that was assigned with the "I" will become a permanent part of the transcript.

Exceptions to the above may be granted only by the written permission of the appropriate Academic Dean. Such exceptions will ordinarily be granted only in cases of medical disability or problems of comparable seriousness.

Degree candidates are cautioned that failure to have all degree requirements satisfied (including removal of Incomplete grades in courses needed for graduation by March 15th will necessarily result in postponement of their graduation.

INDIVIDUAL LEARNING PROJECTS

The guidelines and application forms for Individual Learning Projects, sometimes called Independent Study, are available in the Registrar's Office. If you are planning an ILP for Fall term, please consult these

guidelines. Remember, only 4 credits of ILP per term are allowed. You may indicate your intent to register for an ILP by requesting DNA 271 01A **CRN #11190**, or DNA 371-01A, **CRN #11191** on Banner Web Self Service. **Remember to indicate the number of credits. First-year students are not eligible for ILPs.**

INTERNSHIPS

SUMMER 2009 INTERNSHIPS FOR CREDIT

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an Internship for academic credit during Summer of 2009 are required to attend a one-hour Legal and Professional Issues session offered in April of 2009. Check with the Internship Office (Academic Services Building, phone 5799) for exact dates. All internships which take place during the summer must be registered under the Summer term not under the preceding Spring semester or the following Fall semester.

You will not be registered for your internship until the Registrar receives your completed Registration for Internship Learning Contract form with all required signatures. This form and other required legal forms can be obtained from the Internship Office. Check the Internship Program website (www.csbsju.edu/internship) for information on other requirements. The last day to register for a Summer 2009 Internship is Monday, May 4. Registration after this date requires approval from the Internship Program Coordinator.

FALL 2009 INTERNSHIPS FOR CREDIT

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an Internship for academic credit during Fall of 2009 are required to attend a one-hour Legal and Professional Issues session offered in April of 2009. When you register for fall classes, you may indicate your intent to register for a Fall 2009 Internship by requesting DNA 397-01A, CRN # 11192 through Banner Web Self Service. Enter the number of credits you expect to earn.

You will not be registered for your internship until the Registrar receives your completed Registration for Internship Learning Contract form with all required signatures. This form and other required legal forms can be obtained from the Internship Office. Check the Internship Program website (www.csbsju.edu/internship) for information on other requirements. The last day to register for a Fall 2009 Internship is Monday, May 4. Registration after this date requires approval from the Internship Program Coordinator.

MINNESOTA STUDENTS ELIGIBLE FOR THE MINNESOTA GRANT PROGRAM:

You must register for a minimum of 15 credits each semester to receive a Minnesota Grant at the full-time student rate. Students who register for 12-14 credits may still receive a Minnesota Grant but the award amount will be substantially reduced. Please direct any questions to the Financial Aid Office at CSB or SJU. (For all other aid programs, 12 credits is still considered full-time.)

OFFICIAL COMMUNICATIONS TO STUDENTS BY E-MAIL

The Registrar's Office will use electronic mail as the most expeditious means of communicating with you. Make sure you are not blocking messages from the Registrar's Office in order to receive important notices regarding graduation, cancellation of courses, course schedule updates, etc.

ON TRACK

Advisors will have access to their advisees' On Track advising aid through Banner Web Self Service for Faculty Advising System. Please make an appointment to meet with your advisor early to review your academic progress and select your Fall coursework. Remember, all students **MUST** see their advisor to receive their Registration PIN # Label.

PERMISSION REQUIRED CLASSES

Before attempting to register for courses listed as "Permission of Instructor or Department", students must obtain written permission.

PREREQUISITES

Check the course listings section of this class schedule to find out if a class has a prerequisite. Make sure you have met all prerequisites before attempting to register for a course. If you have not taken the prerequisite, you must contact the department to seek written approval (signed drop/add card or e-mail directly from the instructor) to register for the course. If you fulfilled the prerequisite through a course taken at another college, prior to Fall 2005, please contact the Registrar's Office prior to registration.

REPEATING A COURSE

A course that has been failed may be repeated for credit. Courses that have been passed may not be repeated for credit. They may, however, be repeated for additional honor points. The original grade is not removed when the course is repeated and credit for a course can be earned only once. The higher grade is computed in the GPA. If you are registering for a course that you are repeating you **MUST** notify the Registrar's Office. **Repeating a course in which a passing grade has already been earned may have financial aid implications. See Financial Aid Office for additional information.**

STUDENT TEACHING

Students registering for student teaching (EDUC 361, 362, 363) in their 9th (or greater) semester as a full-time student at CSB/SJU will be billed at ½ the regular tuition rate for that semester. These students will also not be charged the student activity fee, technology fee, and campus center fee for that semester. Institutional gift aid (scholarships/grants) will not be available to these students.

STUDY ABROAD

CSB and SJU offer a number of group overseas study programs. Students who plan to enroll in one of these programs should contact the Education Abroad Office, MAIN 004 at CSB. Students who are considering enrolling in coursework offered abroad by another institution (Consortium/External Study Abroad) should contact the Education Abroad Office or the Registrar's Office, for information on transfer of credits. Students who register for SA 372, Consortium/External Study Abroad, will be billed a \$225 fee.

Seniors must ordinarily be in residence for the two semesters immediately preceding commencement (graduation). "In residence" is defined as enrollment as a full-time student at CSB/SJU for a minimum of 12 credits per semester. Any student wishing to register for an External Study Abroad Consortium during one of their two last semesters of their Senior year must receive approval from the Academic Advising Office. Seniors will **not** be allowed to register for a year long External Study Abroad Consortium.

S/U REGISTRATION

Arrangements for this non-honor point grading option should be made with your professor at the beginning of the course. Remember that undergraduates are limited in the number and types of courses they may take for the grade S (Satisfactory). See the Catalog for specific rules. First-year students may not take the S/U option except for a course with only S/U grades available. The grade S, once turned in by the instructor, is **NOT SUBJECT TO LATER CHANGE.**

Grading options are listed in the Class Schedule as either GRADING OPTION A-F REQUIRED or GRADING OPTION S-U REQUIRED. If neither of these is listed, the instructor will permit eligible students to choose either option by the date the instructor specifies at the beginning of the course. Once you have chosen, you may not request that the S/U be changed to an honor point grade.

If coursework grades average below a C under the S/U option, the grade U (Unsatisfactory) will be given with no credit earned.

TRI-COLLEGE EXCHANGE

The College of Saint Benedict, Saint John's University, and Saint Cloud State University have an agreement that encourages regular full-time undergraduate students to take courses on any of the three campuses. Registration is limited to fall and spring semesters. If you are interested in taking courses at Saint Cloud State, you can pick up a copy of their Class Schedule and a registration application at the Registrar's Office. If a course seems suitable for your program of studies, see your advisor for permission to register. To register, file the approved application with the Registrar's Office at the St. John's campus before August 23rd. The course will be added to your Fall 2009 Student Detail Schedule, if space is available.

CSB/SJU students will be billed tuition, and other fees, at CSB/SJU rates. If a student is not registered for more than 18 total credits, there will ordinarily be no additional charge. For credits over 18, an additional tuition estimated \$816, will be made for each additional semester credit hour.

If you have any questions about Tri-College Exchange and the suitability of SCSU courses toward your degree program, see Jane Stromme in the Registrar's Office, QUAD 161.

TRANSCRIPT SERVICE

Current students may request an unofficial copy of their transcript at no charge from the Registrar's Office. Official transcript requests must be submitted in writing to the Registrar's Office and may be picked up at the Registrar's Office (or we can mail them for you) 3 working days after the request is made, except during the first and last week of each term.

Former students may request a transcript copy for \$3.00 per transcript. The fee for faxing a transcript will be \$3.00 per transcript. If the transcript is faxed outside the U.S. the fee will be a minimum of \$5.00. All transcript requests must be submitted in writing via mail or fax and payment must accompany the order.

UPDATES TO THE OFFICIAL CLASS SCHEDULE

Updates, including additional courses, cancellations, changes to existing courses, core approvals & other general changes to the Official Class Schedule will be published periodically on the Registrar's Official website. Notification of the publication of these updates will be sent via E-mail to all students and faculty.

VARIABLE CREDIT COURSES

If a course is listed with a range of credits (variable), you must enter the appropriate credit amount desired when you register for the course. The credit amount you are registered for may impact your status as a full-time student or your financial aid.

Any request to release GPA information must be in writing with your signature authorizing the release of this information

WITHDRAWAL FROM COLLEGE

Complete withdrawal from all of your courses during the term must be initiated with your Residential Director at CSB, Mary Commons 221 or the Residential Life Office, Sexton 127 at SJU. If you withdraw by September 21st no official record of your registration for that term will be made. If you withdraw between September 22nd and November 16th, the mark "W" will appear behind that term's courses on your transcript. If you withdraw after November 16th, all courses for that term will be followed by the grade of "F". If you decide to withdraw after the term ends, you MUST notify the office mentioned above.

FALL 2009 COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

ART

ART 233D: Artists Books

Elaine Rutherford

Students will develop visual narratives using various 2-D media such as drawing, painting and printmaking processes. Students will investigate the bookform as a format as they work towards arriving at a marriage of form and content. The artist book is a unique format that encourages different attitudes between artist and viewer. It contains ideas in the familiarity and intimacy of the bookform while providing opportunities for development of sequential imagery and narratives. Students may combine text and image in their projects and will work towards finding the most appropriate bookform for their content. Visual presentations, demos, field trips, discussion and hands on studio practice are all components of this class.

ART 344: Contemporary Critical Theory

Staff

This course examines in depth the major themes within modern and contemporary art theory and practice. Students will learn and analyze the works of seminal artists, art critics and theorists of the mid-20th century onward through reading, writing, and discussion.

PREREQUISITE: ART 300.

BIOLOGY

BIOL 373: Topic: Introduction to Bioinformatics

Jennifer Galovich

Cross-listed with MATH 340

"Bioinformatics" refers to the collection of theory and tools used to answer questions about the nature and interpretation of molecular information – it is all about "making sense of molecular messages". In recent decades, mathematicians, biologists and computer scientists, working together, have assembled enormous data banks of DNA sequences and powerful computer programs and machines for analyzing them. So our main take will be understanding the nature of these molecular messages – what kinds of questions can this data address? We will also study algorithms that have been devised for addressing these questions. In so doing we will both practice using the algorithms and deepen our understanding of the mathematical ideas that justify them.

COMMUNICATION

COMM 305: Women's Voices

Shane Miller

This class is a survey of the rhetorical efforts of a variety of North American women from the early 19th century to contemporary times. Women from diverse cultures and movements will be studied, and their rhetorical efforts critically discussed. The class will draw upon a variety of rhetorical theories to discover how and why women's voices have been silenced, as well as to understand the creative efforts used by these women to make their voices heard.

PREREQUISITE: COMM 101

COMM 381A: Classical Rhetoric

Richard Ice

This course will examine the foundations of the Western rhetorical tradition. Specifically, the course will examine classical rhetoric in ancient Greece and Rome. The writings of Plato, Aristotle, Cicero, and St. Augustine are read and discussed. Students will read the primary texts (in English) and learn to analyze and appreciate these texts. Students will read texts for the ancient time period and explore how these rhetorical theories developed. Students will examine how classical rhetorical theory serves as the foundation for modern theories of rhetoric and persuasion.

COMM 383E: Layout and Design for Print Media

Martin Sundvall

This course will explore the different computer technologies and software used in creating print media. Students will use programs such as Adobe In-Design, Adobe Photoshop, and basic web page design to bring their creative visions and course projects into printed reality. The course is geared for advertising, public relations, and news editorial students.

Completion of COMM 245 recommended. Reserved for COMM majors.

COMM 383F: Communicating Effectively using Applied Media Aesthetics

Katie Johnson

This course will examine the importance of encoding variables (production techniques) in creating effective media messages. Students will learn the principles of media aesthetics to both create and critique messages. The goals of the course are as follows: 1) Students will learn the major elements and principles of applied media aesthetics. 2) Students will learn how to apply those elements and principles through creating and critiquing media mes-

sages. 3) Students will learn how to apply those elements and principles through the process of creating media messages.

COMM 385A: Love, Sex, Commitment, and Communication

Karyl Daughters

This course will explore the communication of love, sexuality, and commitment in close interpersonal relationships. To do this, we will discuss readings from psychological, cultural, and evolutionary perspectives that will address these functions of communication and help us understand why and how we love. Throughout this process students will discover current research findings as well as become familiar with how research is conducted. Ultimately, students will propose and conduct research projects that will contribute to our understanding of love and communication. Evaluation will be based on exams, a research paper, a group research project, and class participation.

COMM 385B: Health Communication

Jennifer Kramer

This course is designed to provide a broad introduction to the study and application of communication theories, principles, and practices in health contexts. In the course you will examine how narratives, media, interpersonal communication, group communication, intercultural communication, gender communication, organizational communication, and promotional campaigns function within health contexts. The relevance of communication to health will be examined as a means for improving communication in the health care setting, improving personal health, and influencing public health. This course has a service learning component.

PREREQUISITE: COMM 101, 103 or 105 or permission of Instructor.

COMPUTER SCIENCE

CSCI 317F: Parallel Computing

Michael Heroux

This course will introduce the student to the concepts of parallel computing, including parallel architectures, runtime environments and programming models. Students will learn about multi-core processors, attached processors such as graphics units and networked parallel machines. They will also learn a variety of programming models and languages, in both theory and in practice. Programming assignments will include use of OpenMP, TBB, CUDA, OpenCL, MPI and MapReduce.

CORE - SENIOR SEMINARS

CORE 390-01A: The Medical Professional in the Modern World

Jeff Anderson

Cross-listed with HONR 390

Permission of the instructor required with preference given to non-honors pre-med students

The word "professional" today connotes an individual with well-developed skills, specialized knowledge, and expertise, who conforms to the standards of a profession. The original meaning of "professional" as one who "makes a profession of faith" in the face of demanding circumstances has been all but lost in the medical profession. This class will use the burgeoning literature of medicine, written by, for, and about medical professionals, in order to explore the full range of "professional" challenges facing today's medical professionals.

The practice of medicine is rife with ethical dilemmas. By exploring the efforts of medical professionals to counter the institutional forces that constrain them and to find their own solid ground to stand upon, this course aims to cultivate the habit of moral reflection in future medical professionals. Although this course will primarily focus on the experiences of medical doctors, it should also be of interest to those aspiring to other medical and non-medical careers.

CORE 390-02A: Current Issues in Society

James Makepeace

This senior seminar will be a synthetic examination of major ethical theories and current environmental problems. The course will proceed from a "lifestyle analysis" approach and will have a particular focus on lifestyles attempting "enlightened minimalization".

CORE 390-03A: War and the Memory of War in the Last Century

Nick Hayes

The twentieth century opened with the promise of peace and prosperity. Our last century, however, witnessed a succession of wars from its beginning to its end. This course examines how twentieth century culture came to remember and interpret the century's wars from WWI, WWII, the Holocaust, the Vietnam Wars, the Wars of the ex-Yugoslavia in the 1990's, Rwanda, Afghanistan, and Iraq. Our focus falls not on the basic history of each of these tragic events, but on how the memory of the wars shaped our culture

and values. Behind our inquires lie disturbing moral questions: How does a society reconcile itself to the knowledge of human atrocity and the legacy of total war on civilian populations? What are our moral and ethical responsibilities to remember that indeed such things happen on this earth?

CORE 390-04A & 05A: Race & Justice in American Legal History
Eugene Garver

This course will look at the history of racial equality as treated by the U.S. Supreme Court. Primary focus will be the three crucial cases of Dred Scott vs. Sanford, Plessy vs. Ferguson, and Brown vs. Board of Education, but we will also extend the history a bit on both ends, looking at arguments about slavery at the founding of the Constitution, and at cases from the 60 years since Brown. We will try to put the legal history in a wider social context, and look at changing meanings of equality over the last 200 years.

EDUCATION

EDUC 335: Environmental Education Pedagogy
Karen Bengtson

Cross-listed with ENVR 335

This course is designed for individuals that are planning on teaching in the field of environmental education in formal classroom settings and/or interpretive settings, such as environmental learning centers. Some of the issues that will be explored are the incorporation of environmental education in standards based settings, the dichotomy of advocacy versus education, and the history, trends and best practices of environmental education. The relationship between the two types of environmental education settings will also be explored, including collaboration, and students will be designing and teaching environmental education curriculum base on the North American Association for Environmental Education's "Excellence in Environmental Education-Guidelines for Learning". This course will include a practicum experience.

PREREQUISITE: EDUC/ENVR Studies majors/minors, or permission from instructor.

ENGLISH

ENGL 130-01A: Reading Fiction
Betsy Johnson-Miller

Cross-listed with HONR 250A

One definition of the word provoke is "to stir up intentionally." In this class, we will examine literature that provokes readers and at the same time we will explore the relationship between author, text and reader. The literature we will encounter will provoke us in a variety of ways: from asking us to examine race and gender roles to asking us to question some firmly and commonly held beliefs, from asking us to examine an author's context to demanding that we jump into a narrative that will not let us go. The purpose of this class will be to get stirred up by literature, to find ourselves breathless, angry, thrilled, confused, all within the confines of a page.

ENGL 346-01A: US Literature to 1865
Steven Thomas

As the famous economist Adam Smith observed in 1776 in his treatise, *The Wealth of Nations*, America was originally a business venture that produced much wealth for an emergent bourgeois class in both the colonies and Europe, but was also accompanied by much violence, slavery, and disease. The discovery of America in 1492 has been both celebrated and condemned as the beginning of modern capitalism. In the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, classic authors such as Benjamin Franklin in America, Jonathan Swift in Ireland, and Daniel Defoe and Olaudah Equiano in England expressed their views on a changing economy and attempted to affect policy. Later, early nineteenth-century authors such as Nathaniel Hawthorne, Henry David Thoreau, and Ralph Waldo Emerson reflected on the previous century whose changes they had inherited. The goal of this class is to investigate how literature of the enlightenment and post-enlightenment eras represented or participated in an eighteenth-century economy that some, following Adam Smith, have called mercantilism, but others have called imperialism. The class is designed to appeal to literature majors interested in either early American literary history or post-colonial theory as well as to students majoring in business, history, or economics who might want to take a literature class that relates to their fields.

ENGL 367-01A: Studies in Contemporary Literature
Mara Faulkner

Powerful forces are changing both the content of literature and the physical form in which it comes to readers. Some of those forces are technology, environmental concerns, forced migrations, new or retooled ways of reading, readers' expectations, and human creativity, which refuses to be hemmed in or pushed around.

Of course, authors continue to write the kinds of literature we're all familiar with—novels, short stories, poetry—and we will read a fair number of these authors, primarily from the United States. But other forms are becoming increasingly popular with writers and readers—graphic novels, creative nonfic-

tion and other hybrid forms, hypertext fiction, and even graffiti. We will read/look at a couple of graphic novels (I'm thinking of *Persepolis* by Marjane Satriani and *Palestine* by Joe Sacco) and explore the other forms in a variety of ways.

Your work for the class will include lots of reading/looking and engaged discussion. During the first half of the semester, you will complete and present an intensely focused research project on a contemporary author or a new literary development. During the second half of the semester, each of you will try your hand at creating a graphic novel, a hypertext (or mock hypertext) short story, or one of the other forms that are new, or at least new to you. Or maybe you will invent a form no one else has thought of! There will be a mid-term and a final exam.

I will choose books in the next few months and will be glad to send the list to people who sign up for the class.

ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES

ENVR 100A: The Nutritious Garden
Bernadette Elhard

This section of ENVR 100 is part of the new "Hands-On-The-Land" series of experiential learning courses offered by the Environmental Studies Department with the assistance of the St. John's Arboretum and faculty from several other departments. This first course will be offered by Profs. Bernadette Elhard and Romona Robinson-O'Brien of the Nutrition Department.

Want to eat green? Lower your carbon foot print with your food choices? Ever wonder what is whole food? How can you plant a garden to increase your nutritional status? This course will provide students with practical approaches to these issues by teaching them about growing their own food and safely preserving it. The course will combine lecture, discussion, readings and field trips to examine the relationship between the science of Nutrition, gardening and food preservation. Students will learn about garden planning from a nutritional and geographical perspective. Food preservation technology will be combined with culinary preparation technique to create appealing food from a taste, texture and visual perspective. Students will apply food preservation and food preparation knowledge previously discussed in the course by preserving locally grown foods in the food science laboratory. No prerequisites are required for this course.

A laboratory fee of \$10.00 will be charged to cover the cost of food and supplies for the food preservation lab.

ENVR 225: Food, Gender, Globalization and the Environment
Diane Veale Jones

In this course, we examine the environmental, economical, and social equity issues of food, production, processing, distribution and consumption. We explore the journey of food from the field to our table. To map successfully this journey we analyze women's and men's roles, historically and currently, in food production; examine different approaches to food sustainability and environmental sustainability; and delve into politics of food regulation.

ENVR 300F: Environmental Geology
Larry Davis

The objectives of this course are for the student to develop a more in-depth understanding about human interactions with the natural environment and to explore everyday problems with our environment and global community from a geological perspective.

- Develop a greater self-awareness of your personal role regarding environmental issues;
- Develop an increased awareness of environmental issues and how they affect society;
- Gain an understanding of the interactions between humans and geological processes; and
- Develop an understanding of past, present, and future environmental issues and how they affect the Earth and our society.

ENVR 300G: Science of Global Climate Change
Troy Knight

Is Earth's climate rapidly changing, and if so, what is causing it? Heated ideological debates and images of imminent environmental catastrophe generated by the issue of climate change often obscure the scientific foundation upon which it rests. In this course students will gain a basic understanding of the interdisciplinary science behind climate change and its impacts. Following an introduction to the climate system, we will explore Earth's climatic history and how we know about this history, the drivers of climate change past and present, and the impact of climate change and stability on human societies in the past, present and future. Labs will focus on furthering understanding of climatic processes, methods in paleoclimatology, and the use of models in climate science.

ENVR 310: Environmental Geography

Jean Lavigne

Case-study based and issue-oriented approach to understanding relationships between societies and their environments from a geographical perspective. Centered on exploring how humans around the world have modified their environments, and how societies respond to environmental change. Examining these processes includes exploring the current and historical roles played by social and cultural institutions, by political and economic systems, and by forces such as development and globalization.

ENVR 335: Environmental Education Pedagogy

Karen Bengtson

Cross-listed with EDUC 335

This course is designed for individuals that are planning on teaching in the field of environmental education in formal classroom settings and/or interpretive settings, such as environmental learning centers. Some of the issues that will be explored are the incorporation of environmental education in standards based settings, the dichotomy of advocacy versus education, and the history, trends and best practices of environmental education. The relationship between the two types of environmental education settings will also be explored, including collaboration, and students will be designing and teaching environmental education curriculum base on the North American Association for Environmental Education's "Excellence in Environmental Education-Guidelines for Learning". This course will include a practicum experience. PREREQUISITE: EDUC/ENVR Studies majors/minors, or permission from instructor.

ETHICS

ETHS 390-01A: Justice in the Twenty-First Century

Dan Finn

Few issues are as fundamental to human life as justice, and few are as controversial. This course will examine in detail six different understandings of justice, each of which is a rival to the others in debates about justice in the twenty-first century. Students will be reading two novels, and six philosophical or theological treatments of the notion of justice in our joint efforts to come to grips with what justice means in our lives: personally and on a national and global scale.

ETHS 390-02A: Reading for Life

Anthony Cunningham

Everyone loves a good story. Great stories can provide us with far more than mere recreation. Stories can provide us with rich character portraits that can reveal the subtleties and nuances of what it means to live well and responsibly. In this course we'll use novels and films to address Socrates' most basic ethical questions, "How should one live?" and "What sort of person should I be?" We'll do so by attending to all the concrete, particular details of real life and fictional characters thoroughly embroiled in the "business of living." Reading well offers the possibility of vicarious experience and ultimately, ethical insight. The stated goal of the Senior Seminar Core requirement is to help students to develop the ability to make good moral judgments. This is a life-long process but hopefully some diligent, careful, thoughtful attention on our part this semester can help us hone the ability to think about Socrates' questions. ETHS 390-03A: Moral Values & Public Policy

Tim Robinson

What role should moral values play in our thinking about legal and public policy issues? The answer depends in part on whether we can justify our moral judgments to each other. How can that be done? What exactly are moral judgments, anyway? We approach these questions by looking at the process of judicial reasoning in criminal law, both as a potential model for moral reasoning, and as a point of intersection between moral and legal considerations. We examine particular cases and issues, as well as more theoretical questions about the foundations of ethics and law.

ETHS 390-04A: Ethics in Everyday Life

Jean Keller

Daily headlines bring to our attention a whole host of challenging and seemingly intractable social problems. How, in the face of such challenges, are we to plan out and live our lives? What are our responsibilities, as individuals and communities, to engage and try to resolve such problems? And how do such moral obligations stack up against our desire to pursue our own passions and careers and to care for our family and friends? In this course, we'll use moral theory to engage problems posed by the news, literature, and students own lives as a means to address pressing contemporary ethical concerns.

ETHS 390-05A: Environmental Ethics

Charles Wright

Environmental ethics was until relatively recently an oxymoron. There could be no such thing as "environmental ethics," according to conventional wisdom, because humans had no ethical obligations to beings that were not human. However, the dominance of modern technology and industry and the unwanted (and largely unexpected) consequences of this dominance have caused modern humans to reconsider this comfortable assumption and to reflect on the values and moral convictions that structure our interaction with the nonhuman world. This class is an introduction to the process of reconsideration and reflection—we shall explore challenges and alternatives to traditional human-centered conceptions of morality. By taking a class in environmental ethics you will choose to engage in an ongoing process of inquiry that is of concern, quite literally, to every living being.

This class also represents an opportunity for you to prepare yourselves better for the responsibilities of democratic citizenship. Membership in a democratic society gives you a unique opportunity (and responsibility) to participate in a process of collective will formation that promises—for better or for worse—to shape the future of earth's living systems.

ETHS 390-06A: Sex, Death & Ethics

Scott Johnson

Admit it, you just read this description because of the title. And you think since it meets once a week on a Thursday night, it shouldn't interfere too much with your weekend. Yet, some of the subjects are unavoidable in college. You've talked about sex before, but have you discussed its implications? Is sex ever related to death? Aren't ethics supposed to be boring?

We rarely have the opportunity to explore our most deeply held opinions in a civil public forum. Can abortion be discussed at the dinner table without parents becoming worried and suspicious? Should abortion even be discussed at a pair of Benedictine Catholic colleges where and official doctrine of disapproval is well known and clearly expressed? Yet, if we don't talk about abortion somewhere, how will we know that our moral judgments are consciously elected and defensibly maintained? And if we can't talk about this subject, how can we claim to account for a variety of other moral views which easily compare with abortion? There is more to sex death and ethics than simply abortion. Haven't you always wondered why everyone who has sex in a horror film is about to die?

This course will consider Sex, Death and Ethics, consistent with the guidelines for senior seminar. Abortion is only one area where the three interrelate. Students will have some choice in where we choose to explore. We will read different kinds of texts and maybe even see some films. We will ask more questions than we will answer, but we will also develop our critical thinking skills with essentially contested concepts. There are no preconceived answers to the questions we will ask. Our task, properly stated, is to learn how to ask and assess those questions which may turn out to have uncertain answers. Ethics is the study of how we should live, and questions about these topics are vitally important. We will simply do the best we can under the circumstances.

ETHS 390-07A: Reading for Life

GENDER & WOMEN'S STUDIES

GWST 290A: Men's Studies Research

Gar Kellom

In addition to men's studies content and research methodology, students participate in three ongoing research projects in the SJU men's center: a small group social norms study of masculinity, a social norms spirituality project, and an international men's stories project. Additional projects may be developed. Class time arranged with those enrolled. May be repeated.

GWST 360: Spirituality of the College Male: Male Spirituality & Sexuality

William Schipper

Cross-listed with THEO334

This course will use the experience of the college male as the point of departure for a consideration of the interplay between male sexuality, masculine identity and spirituality, and the ways in which these might be better integrated. This course will examine concepts found in long-established and contemporary studies of spirituality, male sexuality, and masculinity. Of special interest will be the ways in which male sexuality, masculine identity and spirituality affect men's relationships with God, self and the other. Underlying this course is the assumption that the development of a personal spirituality will help one to be more attentive to the voice of God, more aware of the meaning of one's own existence, and better able to form communities founded on respect for individual persons.

HISPANIC STUDIES

HISP 355: Resisting Patriarchal Rule in Latin American Narrative by Women Writers

Elena Sanchez-Mora

This course centers on four contemporary novels by Latin American Women Writers that portray female characters coming of age during dictatorial regimes. The authors are from Mexico, Nicaragua, Dominican Republic and Chile, while the time frame of the novels ranges from the late nineteenth century to the late 1980's. Students will research historical events, particularly the political situation of women, as well as the authors' trajectory and literary criticism of their work. Students are also expected to get a background knowledge of national allegorical fictions as well as the so-called "novel of the dictatorship" of the 1970's. The main focus of the course is on feminist narrative techniques the authors employ to bring to life women's strategies against political repression, from fighting back, to writing, dreaming of a brighter future, and spiritual healing. Ultimately, political resistance merges with the private sphere, as the protagonists must also confront patriarchal power within family, church, school, and work force. Class assignments will consist primarily of research team presentations, reading circles, student led discussion and writing workshops.

PREREQUISITE: HISP 312 plus one upper division course in Hispanic Studies

HISP 356B: Spanish Variations and Acquisition

Nelsey Echavez-Solano

The focus of this course is on sociolinguistic variation and cross-dialectal diversity in different varieties of Spanish in Latin America and Spain. Sociolinguistic issues and historical aspects of dialect variation and study will be addressed, along with other extralinguistic factors. In addition, students will learn about the theoretical approaches used in the acquisition of Spanish as a second language studies as well as the effects of various pedagogical approaches on the development of Spanish interlanguage systems. **Course prerequisite:** HISP 312 plus one upper division course in Hispanic Studies.

HISTORY

HIST 200: Sophomore Colloquium: East Meets West: Ever The Twain- Shall Meet

Richard Bohr

The Victorian poet Rudyard Kipling once wrote that "East is East, and West is West/And never the twain shall meet." This course seeks to prove him wrong by exploring the long, intimate relationship between East Asia and the West. In particular, we will study the initial East-West encounter through the Silk Road, Marco Polo, international trade, and missionary activism; trace the destruction of traditional East Asia in the wake of modern Western imperialism; analyze East Asia's efforts to achieve "self-strengthening" through the adaptation of Western ideas and institutions; assess Asia's contribution to Western culture; and envision East-West partnerships in the newly-dawned "Asian Century."

The course will employ such primary sources as memoirs, letters, autobiographies, treaties, newspapers, magazines, novels, film, photography, and artifacts as well as secondary sources. Through role play, debate, and other interactive formats, we will focus on East-West images and stereotypes. At semester's end, students will exhibit their projects on specific aspects of the East-West encounter to the CSB/SJU community.

HIST 300H: From Books to Bytes

Theresa Vann

Books have served as a primary repository of human knowledge since their inception. Over the millennia, book technology has evolved from ancient papyrus scrolls to modern digital formats, proving the adaptability and longevity of the book form.

Using the collections and resources of the Hill Museum & Manuscript Library, this introductory course will examine the book both as an artifact and as an agent of cultural change. Students will learn the technology of the book; the innovations introduced by the book; and the book's impact on human culture on a global basis.

The goal of this course will be to provide an introductory vocabulary and a structure for students who wish to explore the history of books and printing from the ancient to modern world. The course will be organized around the following topics: the technology of the book; the book in ancient society, focusing on the development of writing and the alphabet; the classical book; the people of the book; the medieval book; printing; and the digital book.

HIST 309: Public Culture in Modern India

Brendan LaRocque

In this course we will examine some of the major forms of culture, politics, and religion as well as the ways in which the acquisition and transmission of knowledge developed and was transformed in the history of South Asia. We will initially focus on the major systems of political, social, and religious thought that existed prior to the period of British rule. The final weeks of the course will be devoted to the issues of popular culture, identity, gender, social justice, and militarism in the age of globalization. In addition to reading scholarly books and articles, our course material will include music, poetry, journalism, popular Bollywood cinema and "art films".

HIST 381: Readings Seminar: How do you read history?

Derek Larson

Learning to effectively and efficiently read and discuss book-length histories is a skill that takes practice to develop but will serve students well throughout their lives. In this new course intended for History majors the focus is on the critical reading, analysis, and discussion of current, classic, and compelling historical writing. The course will be structured as a seminar emphasizing discussion and analysis of common readings, with written assignments including formal book reviews and critiques. For Fall 2009 the broad subject will be 20th century American history. Potential topics include changing sexual mores, youth culture, popular music, history of technology, environmental history, gender, drugs & alcohol, wartime experiences, consumer culture, politics, and a wide range of biography. Students who enroll will be asked to suggest a topic for the class and at least one book will be selected to reflect the most popular choice among the students.

Future topics will vary each semester and course may be repeated for credit with permission of Department Chair.

Preferred Prerequisite: HIST 200.

HIST 395: Historiography and Methods: Cultural Ascendancy and Benevolent Use of Power

Cynthia Curran

The historiographic focus in this class will be on the evolving and changing interpretations of the British Empire. James Bryce, a 19th century British historian, noted that "the object of history is to discover and set forth facts." Through readings and discussion, students will examine whether this is possible or even desirable. In the 19th century, Britain was the first industrialized nation, it had the greatest navy in world and it exerted the greatest global cultural influence. Was the British Empire a benevolent and progressive influence on suffering peoples or was it racist and self-serving? Why did its Empire decline? Is it possible to learn lessons from the past? Although this course uses the British Empire as its main subject, students will be encouraged to consider other empires in their final written assignment.

HONORS

HONR 210C: Paleobiology of Dinosauria

Larry Davis

Dinosaurs, meaning 'fearfully great lizards', is a name which invokes both the concept of great success and utter failure. Dinosaurs were first recognized in the mid-19th century and are among the best known animals in the fossil record. Beginning with just one species among many very unusual Triassic age (240 million years ago) reptiles, the dinosaurs were to become the dominant group of land animals for nearly 130 million years. Dinosaurian diversity is incredible: from tiny feathered hunters to mighty predators; horned, spiked, and duckbilled herbivores; and the largest land animals of all time. From this great diversity arose the birds, the only surviving lineage of *Dinosauria*. How can we understand the biology of dinosaurs, given that no human has ever seen a dinosaur? How can we determine their diets, their speed of travel, their physiology, their behavior? In this course we will explore what we know about Dinosaurs. Even more importantly, we will examine how we know what we know. Most of the laboratory portion of this course will examine the question – 'Are birds dinosaurs?'

HONR 240A: The Biblical Tradition

Vincent Smiles

An introduction to the discipline of Christian theology with a substantial focus on select themes and texts of the scriptures, such as creation, covenant, kingdom, prophets, gospel and New Testament letters. Attention is also given to the method of theological study and the development of the Christian tradition since Biblical times. Students will be introduced to the Biblical languages, especially Hebrew, and will learn to think critically both about the Bible and about modern theological controversies.

HONR 250A-01A: Reading Fiction

Betsy Johnson-Miller

Cross-listed with ENGL 130-01A.

One definition of the word provoke is "to stir up intentionally." In this class, we will examine literature that provokes readers and at the same time we will explore the relationship between author, text and reader. The literature we will encounter will provoke us in a variety of ways: from asking us to examine race and gender roles to asking us to question some firmly and commonly held beliefs, from asking us to examine an author's context to demanding that we jump into a narrative that will not let us go. The purpose of this class will be to get stirred up by literature, to find ourselves breathless, angry, thrilled, confused, all within the confines of a page.

HONR 250K: The European Experience

Martha Tomhave

Was the early modern period a time of fervent faith and intellectual traditionalism? Or was it an age of discovery and the period where reason and science triumphed? Our examination of European history between the Renaissance and Napoleon will investigate the tension between traditionalism and discovery by looking at the changing nature of religious and secular authority; intellectual developments in art, science, and philosophy; the roles of men and women in family and society; early modern globalization; and state-building in England and France.

HONR 310: Great Books/Ideas

Scott Richardson

This is a year-long discussion-based seminar that concentrates on some of the world's greatest works of literature, philosophy, and intellectual history. All students in this course purchase a personal library of 100 books, from which we will select a substantial number to read during the course of the year, including the summer and the break between semesters. Among the authors included in the book list are Homer, Augustine, the Greek tragedians, Austen, Thoreau, Camus, Dostoevsky, Tolstoy, George Eliot, Faulkner, Pynchon, Freud, Kafka, Rushdie, Melville, Dinesen, Flannery O'Connor, Plato, Nabokov, Shakespeare, Cervantes, and Woolf. Preference will be given to juniors and seniors in the honors program. Registration is by permission of the instructor only. Interested students should email the instructor.

HONR 320B: Intercultural Communication

Jeanmarie Cook

An examination of the relationship between communication and culture. Communication theory is used to identify and explore barriers and opportunities in communicating with individuals from different cultures and cultures. Skills necessary for communication across cultures are identified and developed. Topics covered include worldview, ethnocentrism, perception, language, nonverbal cues, gender, sexual orientation, power, multi-cultural identities, educational systems, approaches to health and healing, culture shock and acculturation, intercultural competence, and intercultural ethics.

HONR 350H: Spiritual Traditions of Islam: The Religion and Politics of Islam

Noreen Herzfeld

The Islamic world dominates the news—Hamas in Gaza, a nuclear program in Iran, the rise of Hezbollah in Lebanon, a Sunni/Shiite civil war in Iraq, not to mention 911 and bombings in London and Madrid. Islam is also the fastest growing religion in America. It is impossible to understand current events either at home or abroad without some understanding of this faith and the cultures in which it is practiced.

The study of another faith also provides a new window through which to examine one's own, and a new appreciation for the commonality of the human condition throughout the globe. Islam raises broad questions: faith versus reason, the role of position of women, the rights of religious and cultural minorities, freedom of speech vs. religious respect, multiculturalism vs. assimilation, the role of a sacred text, what freedom and democracy really mean.

This course focuses on Islamic spiritual traditions in the context of both East and West. Although we will begin with a historical overview and an examination of the basic beliefs of Islam, our focus will be on how Muslims encounter God today, how their faith informs their lives, and how the traditions of Islam are influencing current political events around the globe.

HONR 350J: Ethical Thinking

Frederick de Sam Lazaro

In this discussion/seminar-based course, students will be assigned no fewer than three books for the course, chosen specifically to highlight the historic relevance of current global affairs to be discussed in the class. For example, one assigned reading is Adam Hochschild's epic account of the colonization of Congo, King Leopold's Ghost. Students will at the same time watch and analyze the PBS documentary "Democracy in the Rough", produced by the instructor in the war-torn Democratic Republic of Congo in 2006. Class discussions connect those historical dots with contemporary issues. In further discussions of issues of the day, students will follow the assignments of the instructor(s) for various PBS, NPR and other media outlets. Each student will choose one or two foreign media organs that they will monitor throughout the semester and report to the class. In addition, two to three books will be assigned, which in the past have included *A Turn in the South*, by V.S. Naipaul, *Mountains Beyond Mountains*, by Tracy Kidder and *Banker to the Poor*, by Muhammad Yunus.

HONR 390: Senior Seminar: The Medical Professional in the Modern World

Jeff Anderson

The word "professional" today connotes an individual with well-developed skills, specialized knowledge, and expertise, who conforms to the standards of a profession. The original meaning of "professional" as one who "makes a profession of faith" in the face of demanding circumstances has been all but lost in the medical profession. This class will use the burgeoning literature of medicine, written by, for, and about medical professionals, in order to explore the full range of "professional" challenges facing today's medical professionals.

The practice of medicine is rife with ethical dilemmas. By exploring the efforts of medical professionals to counter the institutional forces that constrain them and to find their own solid ground to stand upon, this course aims to cultivate the habit of moral reflection in future medical professionals. Although this course will primarily focus on the experiences of medical doctors, it should also be of interest to those aspiring to other medical and non-medical careers.

MANAGEMENT

MGMT 305E: Product & Brand Marketing

Lisa Lindgren

Product and brand marketing has become a critical activity in today's organizations. Originally found only in large consumer packaged goods companies, a wide variety of companies (service, non-profit, business-to-business marketers) have organizations devoted to marketing the company's brands and products. Today almost 25% of sales and marketing jobs are involved in this critical function. This course examines all of the key aspects of marketing a brand, a product line, and an individual product.

MATHEMATICS

MATH 340: Topic: Introduction to Bioinformatics

Jennifer Galovich

Cross-listed with BIOL 373

"Bioinformatics" refers to the collection of theory and tools used to answer questions about the nature and interpretation of molecular information – it is all about "making sense of molecular messages". In recent decades, mathematicians, biologists and computer scientists, working together, have assembled enormous data banks of DNA sequences and powerful computer programs and machines for analyzing them. So our main take will be understanding the nature of these molecular messages – what kinds of questions can this data address? We will also study algorithms that have been devised for addressing these questions. In so doing we will both practice using the algorithms and deepen our understanding of the mathematical ideas that justify them.

MODERN AND CLASSICAL LANGUAGES

FREN 352E: French Icons

Ned Dubin

Our sense of national identity is in large part tied to iconic figures in our history and culture, both real and fictional. (And a lot of what we "know" about the real ones is pure legend.) This course will investigate 5 such French icons – Charlemagne, Jeanne d'Arc, D'Artagnan, Napoléon and Brigitte Bardot – and look at the historical persons, what literature/film/art/etc. have turned them into, and their role in shaping or perpetuating the French self-image. Students will choose an icon as research project for their term paper and in-class presentation.

FREN 354: Oral Communication in French-Studies in FREN language

Karen Erickson

Through readings, listening exercises, activities, presentations, and performances, we will develop skills of effective oral self expression. The course will include:

- Intonation and phonetics, oral readings of poetry and prose
- Techniques of oral presentation (PowerPoint, note cards, organizing research materials, warm-ups, handling Q & A in a non-native language)
- Conversation in real time (interviewing in French, skits on cultural events in everyday life, business and personal etiquette, issues in intercultural communication)

GERM 355E: The Portrayal of Evil in Contemporary German Film

Andreas Kiryakakis

This course offers an introduction to contemporary history and culture, through the portrayal and interpretations of various aspects of evil in German film and media. It will provide a framework for a discussion of evil from a biological, psychological and theological view depicted in the films and newspaper of German-speaking countries. The seminar will concentrate on critical readings, discussions and viewing of films including such films as: *Brother of Sleep*, *The Edukators*, *The Experiment*, *The Life of Others*, *Nowhere in Africa*, *Run Lola Run*, *Sophie Scholl*.

GERM 357A: Berlin: City of Majesty & Black Humor

This course will examine in texts, articles, jokes, and films the biography of Berlin, founded in the backwaters of the Great Northern European Plain eight centuries ago, yet center of some of history's most remarkable political, social, and cultural movements. The buildings and monuments reveal Berlin's history, from Prussian dominance to Hitler's "Germania," the Wall, and the stunningly refurbished Reichstag. Berlin's museums, music, theater, and art are blossoming again after 1989 and reunification. Despite deep divides and political shifts, the Berliners maintained their spirit, their resilience, and their sense of (black) humor in literature, journalism, music, theaters, and cabarets.

PEACE STUDIES

PCST 368: Religion, Society & Politics

Ron Pagnucco

Cross-listed with THEO 348

Recent developments in the United States and other parts of the world have led observers to look closely at religious groups' beliefs and activities concerning the state, society and sociopolitical issues like cultural diversity and war and peace. In this course we will examine the Judeo-Christian tradition and address such questions as: What is the relationship between religion and ethnicity and religion and nationalism? What is religious fundamentalism? How do various groups view their relationship with the state and the broader society? What kinds of social and political goals do religious groups have and how do they try and achieve them? We will try to answer these and other questions through the study of historical and sociological case studies and selected religious texts reflecting the range of belief and practice in the Judeo-Christian tradition.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

PHED 175: Principles of Athletic Training

Julie Deyak

In this course students will learn and apply fundamental theoretical and practical concepts relative to risk management, including administrative and legal issues; preventing athletic injuries through conditioning, nutrition, protective equipment, and addressing environmental issues; and managing athletic injuries through on-the-field and off-the-field assessment, treatment of acute and non-acute injuries, and the use of universal precautions in preventing the transmission of bloodborne pathogens.

PHED 274: Motor Learning

Don Fischer

In this course students will learn fundamental concepts of motor learning and apply the concepts by instructing proper exercise techniques. Analytical skills will be developed through analysis of exercise techniques and correction of errors. Students enrolled in this course will actively participate in exercise techniques.

POLITICAL SCIENCE

PSYC 350B: American Political Thought & Contemporary Policy Applications

James Read

This newly-offered topics course will explore key concepts and ideas in the history of American political thought, but also explicitly address their contemporary public policy applications and echoes both in the United States and elsewhere in the world. For example, we will connect the "inalienable rights" spoken of in the Declaration of Independence with modern-day conceptions of human rights and international law. We will compare the formation of a new federal constitution for the United States in 1787 with contemporary attempts to draft an acceptable constitution for the European Union. We will critically examine John C. Calhoun's proposed consensus model of government with 20th Century attempts to institutionalize consensus models in Northern Ireland, Yugoslavia, and South Africa. The course as a whole will emphasize the fact that political ideas have policy consequences, sometimes immediately in their own time, sometimes in contexts far removed in place and time; and conversely that we should judge the worth of an idea or theory by examining the policy consequences to which it leads.

PSYCHOLOGY

PSYC 309B: Psychology & Law

Aubrey Immelman

The general aim of this course is to learn about psychological knowledge as it applies to law. The course offers an overview of contemporary psychological theories, research, principles, concepts, and practices pertinent to the legal system. Although students will gain an appreciation for the culture and traditions of law, this is *not* a law course. The emphasis is on human behavior and mental processes and the interaction of psychology with the legal and criminal justice systems.

Specific topics include psychological assessment, testing, and the law; psychology and the courts; mental health law (competencies, criminal responsibility, civil commitment; the psychology of the jury (procedural considerations and jury decision making; the psychology of evidence (eyewitness testimony, the polygraph, hypnosis, facial composites, profiling, pretrial publicity); correctional psychology; family law; juvenile delinquency and justice; criminal behavior; and the psychology of law enforcement.

PREREQUISITE: PSYC 111 and either PSYC 350 or 381

PSYC 393: Personality Assessment in Criminal and Political Psychology

Aubrey Immelman

Psychology Seminar involves detailed consideration of a special topic and requires seminar participants to prepare and present a major paper. This section is designed to help senior psychology majors integrate diverse psychological concepts, principles, theories, and methods to the applied areas of criminal investigation and political psychology.

The course will draw from several cognate areas of psychology, including the biological foundations of personality; perception and cognition; motivation and emotion; human development; personality psychology; psychopathology; and social psychology.

Students will develop a personality profile of a rogue leader on the international scene or offender and victim profiles in an unsolved criminal case.

PREREQUISITE: Senior standing and 20 credits in psychology.

SOCIAL WORK

SWRK 301: Social Services Grant Writing

Staff

This course is designed to teach the mechanics of successful grant writing. It addresses the full continuum of the grant writing process from defining the grant idea, identifying grant sources, and writing and submitting the grant

application. Emphasizes skill development in the areas of writing and submitting a grant application, public speaking skills, and ethical issues. Students need to be at least Junior standing to register for this course. Course will meet once per cycle.

STUDY ABROAD COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

GENERAL TO VARIOUS PROGRAMS:

MGMT 389: Study Abroad Experiential Learning

This course is designed for students participating in Study Abroad. Reading relevant to understanding business in the international environment will be assigned. Students will write a series of essays integrating their knowledge of theory with their personal observations and reactions. Particular emphasis will be placed on the impact of culture on business. The course will be taught by a professor at CSB/SJU using distance learning to maintain contact with students located in a variety of countries.

THEATER

THEA 218: Culture & Dramatic Literature: Readings in Culture: Asian American Drama **Kaarin Johnston**

In this course students will read and discuss modern or contemporary plays written by Asian American playwrights. Some playwrights include: David Henry Hwang, Laurence Yep, Jessica Hagedorn, etc. The class may perform a minimum of one public reading.

THEA 260: Theater & Youth

Kaarin Johnston

This participatory course focuses on using the art form of theater both as a pedagogical tool and as performance art. Creative Drama and TIE are practiced through experiential learning and students improve their leadership skills through teaching others. The course includes basic instruction on creating theatrical performances with child actors. Various forms of theater such as: puppetry, pantomime and improvisation are also addressed.

PREREQUISITE for Elementary Education majors: EDUC 107, 200

THEA 385C: Interactive Theater for Social Change

Kaarin Johnston

Students work together using a variety of techniques to create open-ended scenarios which focus on specific issues involving cultural differences. They are called "Interactive" because once the scenarios have been created and rehearsed, the student "collaborator/performers" are ready to interact with specific groups, in an apparently improvisational mode, focusing on specific areas of misunderstanding. There are several student groups at other institutions working from this model so we will also learn from their work. Our work will be tailored to the CSB/SJU communities. Texts may include Augusto Boal's *Theater of the Oppressed* and Paulo Freire's *Pedagogy of the Oppressed*. We will begin our work by interpreting the Interactive Theater Ethics Statement being written by a special task force of the national organization, American Theatre in Higher Education.

THEA 385D: Computer Aided Drafting for Theater

Mark Hennigs

This course applies technology and theory to creating pictorial documentation of theatrical design. Vectorworks and Photo Shop will be used to create examples of scenic architectural design.

THEOLOGY

THEO 111: The Biblical Tradition

Various

This course offers an introduction to the discipline of Christian theology, giving primary attention to texts from the Bible (including selections from the Pentateuch, the Prophets, the Gospels, and the Pauline Letters), emphasizing prominent biblical themes (including creation, covenant, and reign of God), and considering some post-biblical developments in the tradition.

THEO 308: Theology in Light of Science

Staff

This course will comprise an investigation of the historical and evolving relationship between theology and the natural sciences. This will involve some study of a) the rise of science in the western world, b) the reception and resistance it has encountered within Christianity, c) recent theologies that have taken account of major scientific advances, and d) some major issues that require and bring together contributions from both theology and the natural sciences.

PREREQUISITE: THEO 180 or 111

THEO 329A: Women's Theological Perspectives

Anna Mercedes

This course introduces students to the critiques and alternative reconstructions that feminist/womanist/mujerista theologians present with respect to traditional Christian understandings of scripture, God, human personhood (including the body and sexuality), and the church using scriptural, historical, cultural, social, and spiritual approaches.

THEO 334: Spirituality of the College Male: Male Spirituality & Sexuality

William Schipper

Cross-listed with GWST 360

This course will use the experience of the college male as the point of departure for a consideration of the interplay between male sexuality, masculine identity and spirituality, and the ways in which these might be better integrated. This course will examine concepts found in long-established and contemporary studies of spirituality, male sexuality, and masculinity. Of special interest will be the ways in which male sexuality, masculine identity and spirituality affect men's relationships with God, self and the other. Underlying this course is the assumption that the development of a personal spirituality will help one to be more attentive to the voice of God, more aware of the meaning of one's own existence, and better able to form communities founded on respect for individual persons.

THEO 339A: Discernment and Christian Decision Making

Marian Diaz

This course introduces participants to the teachings on discernment found within the Christian tradition. The topic of discernment will be considered both as a way of life and as a specific process for vocational decision-making. Participants will apply discernment principles in differing contexts through course assignments and class activities such as discussion of case studies and reflection on personal experiences.

THEO 348: Religion, Society & Politics

Ron Pagnucco

Cross-listed with PCST 368

Recent developments in the United States and other parts of the world have led observers to look closely at religious groups' beliefs and activities concerning the state, society and sociopolitical issues like cultural diversity and war and peace. In this course we will examine the Judeo-Christian tradition and address such questions as: What is the relationship between religion and ethnicity and religion and nationalism? What is religious fundamentalism? How do various groups view their relationship with the state and the broader society? What kinds of social and political goals do religious groups have and how do they try and achieve them? THEO 349A: Family, Church, and Society

Kari-Shane Zimmerman

Drawing on historical, sociological, and religious sources, this course introduces students to a range of perspectives concerning the intersection of family, church and society, focusing on issues such as cohabitation, marriage, divorce, homosexuality, and gender roles.

THEO 395: Advanced Seminar in Theology: *The Sacraments: Theology, History and Culture*

Martin Connell

This seminar is a close study of the theology and history of the seven sacraments of the Roman Catholic tradition, with concentration on how God (theology of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit), the Church (ecclesiology), and humanity as a whole (Christian anthropology) are portrayed and realized in the church gathered at prayer.

Topics include critical reflection on the role of ritual behavior in humanity society, evidence for the sacraments in the New Testament (building on THEO 111), protracted study of the Sacraments of Baptism and the Mass, after which the seminar will take up the sacraments of healing (Reconciliation and Sick), of vocation (Ordination and Marriage), of anointing (Confirmation), and of death and burial (funerals). Students in the seminar will read and analyze rites not only for their theology but for the literary qualities of good, effective prayers, and for the distinctive, unique anthropology that Roman Catholic worship offers among the variety of Christian traditions of the United States.

SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

DOCT 468-01A: Christ & the Religions

Michael Byron

This course will explore various approaches undertaken today by several representative Christian theologians and movements in their attempts to account for the singular relevance and importance of Christ in the context of other world religions. Aware of an intensified critical historical consciousness, and attentive to the implications of interreligious dialogue for contemporary

Christological reflection, this course will introduce and evaluate some proposals for integrating these experiences with a Christian understanding of Jesus Christ.

HHTH 468-01A: History of Christian Prayer

Mary Forman

Cross-listed with SPIR 468-01A

Christians have explored a wide variety of prayer forms to express their relationship with God. The course will focus on the historical, cultural, social and religious influences on the diverse forms of prayer, from the early church to modern time. Particular attention will be given to primary texts in translation that are representative of Christian individuals and groups through the ages.

LMUS 468-01A: Gregorian Chant Schola

Anthony Ruff

A performing ensemble, open to men and women, which sings Gregorian Chant (and some English chant) primarily at liturgies of Saint John's Abbey and other liturgies on the two campuses.

LTGY 468-01A: Liturgy & Christian Spirituality

Don Saliers

Cross-listed with SPIR 468-02A

This course studies the rich and varied ways in which particular Christian rites both form and express a faithful way of life. Drawing on classical Roman Catholic and contemporary ecumenical sources, we will examine patterns and qualities of participation in Word, Sacrament, music and prayer (including *lectio divina*). Particular attention is given to theological reflection on human subjectivity and agency--desire, emotion, motives, and moral/ethical engagement.

Specific pastoral/liturgical proposals about contemporary liturgical reform/renewal will be offered.

MONS 468-01A: Monasticism in the British and Irish Isles: From Its Origins to the Dissolution—Web Class (no campus)

Greg Peters

When Augustine of Canterbury arrived on British soil in 598 there was already a flourishing Christian Church, including a robust monastic observance. Nearly 1500 years later King Henry VIII tried to eradicate this monasticism with the dissolution of the monasteries. This course will examine the history of monasticism as practiced by those people that lived in the British and Irish islands during the early and medieval Christian eras. Students will read primary texts in translation, complete a research project and actively participate in online discussions. Students who chose may attend a three day residential session at St. Andrew's Abbey in Valyermo, CA. October 12-15, 2009.

SPIR 468-01A: History of Christian Prayer

Mary Forman

Cross-listed with HHTH 468-01A

Christians have explored a wide variety of prayer forms to express their relationship with God. The course will focus on the historical, cultural, social and religious influences on the diverse forms of prayer, from the early church to modern time. Particular attention will be given to primary texts in translation that are representative of Christian individuals and groups through the ages.

SPIR 468-02A: Liturgy & Christian Spirituality

Don Saliers

Cross-listed with LTGY 468-01A

This course studies the rich and varied ways in which particular Christian rites both form and express a faithful way of life. Drawing on classical Roman Catholic and contemporary ecumenical sources, we will examine patterns and qualities of participation in Word, Sacrament, music and prayer (including *lectio divina*). Particular attention is given to theological reflection on human subjectivity and agency--desire, emotion, motives, and moral/ethical engagement.

Specific pastoral/liturgical proposals about contemporary liturgical reform/renewal will be offered.

SPIR 468-02A: What to Make of Saint Uncommer: Approaches to Christian Hagiography—Web Class (no campus)

Helen Rolfson

The *lives* of the saints constitute a theological and literary form that is well worth the effort to study in detail. The genre began very early, with the stories of the martyrs being transmitted as precious legacy to the Church, and it developed throughout the ages in various ways in different places, some of them even occasionally bizarre. The course examines: the place of stories of the saints in Christian teaching and lore; the way in which this genre contributes to theological understanding; the intent of the writer(s); an approach to hagiographical exegesis; exercises in analysis of hagiographical literature; the work of the Bollandists; the liturgical and pastoral implications of hagiography; the connection between hagiography and popular religion. A web-based course, it will be conducted in seminar style as much as this medium allows

- **Gender (GE):** (1 course) Designed to expose students to gender issues; may also satisfy another common curriculum requirement depending on designation.
- **Ethics Common Seminar (ES):** (1 junior/senior level course) designed to help students develop the ability to recognize ethical issues, examine them from multiple perspectives and articulate the reasoned arguments that support their normative judgments as a means of developing students' ability to make responsible decisions.

CORE CURRICULUM REQUIREMENTS

The purpose of the Core Curriculum is to provide students with a foundation and the intellectual tools necessary to examine the fundamental, recurring questions about ourselves and our world. These questions challenge students to broaden their interests and explore a variety of academic areas. Striving to ask those questions well and make good moral and ethical judgments about them is at the heart of our colleges' mission.

The Core Curriculum is composed of four levels of requirements:

1. Proficiency-based requirements

Foreign language proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in speaking or reading a classical or modern language through satisfactory completion of the language proficiency exam or through satisfactory completion of Modern/Classical Language 211 (with any passing grade).

Mathematics Proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in elementary algebra and geometry through satisfactory completion of the mathematics proficiency exam or calculus readiness exam.

First Year Students beginning Fall 2001 must complete the Fine Arts Experience requirement by attending 8 designated Fine Arts Experience Events—four events per semester.

2. Cross-Disciplinary courses

First-Year Symposium (2 courses)-- CORE 100 & 101, or HONR 100 & 101

Senior Seminar--CORE 390, or HONR 390 only. Education majors can complete EDUC 390 and SWRK majors can complete SWRK 390. Ordinarily completed during Senior year. Cannot be repeated for credit. Both semesters of First-Year Symposium must already be completed.

3. Disciplinary courses

Only courses which are designated within the course title by the appropriate symbol (FA, HML, MT, JC, etc) may be used to complete the following disciplinary requirements.

FA	(4 credits)	Must be from courses that are designated as fulfilling Fine Arts
HML	(2 courses)	Must be from different departments or disciplines (ex. Not two literature courses even if they are from different department)
TH	(1 course)	Must be 100 level theology course.
HMU	(1 course)	Must be from the same discipline as one HML or TH already completed. Cross listed courses only fulfill either the HMU or the JC, but not both disciplinary requirements.

5. Physical Education requirement
