## WHAT TO EXPECT AFTER SUBMITTING YOUR NEW STUDENT COURSE REQUEST FORM

Once your **New Student Course Request Form** has been received by the **Academic Advising Office**, it will be reviewed by an **Academic Advisor**. The information you have provided, along with results of the **Global Language Placement Exam**, will be used to register you for courses appropriate to your major and academic status.

You will receive your course schedule by mail in early August.

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## INTRODUCTION

Welcome to the College of Saint Benedict and Saint John's University (CBS/SJU)! We are pleased that you have chosen our institutions and hope that you will find the transition to college life as rewarding as it may be challenging.

The following guide provides information about academic requirements. **The information you provide on the New Student Course Request Form and results from the on-line Global Language Placement Exam will enable an Academic Advisor to register you for fall courses** according to your interests, intended major (if known) and academic background.

No doubt you are anxious about meeting new challenges--both academic and personal. Please take the time to read carefully through this booklet in preparation for a positive and rewarding college experience.

## ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

As part of the liberal arts program at CSB/SJU, you will complete the Common Curriculum in addition to major requirements. The combination of major and Common Curriculum requirements, along with elective courses, will provide you with the broad-based liberal arts education that you have chosen to pursue by selecting CSB/SJU. Ordinarily, students register for **16-18 credits**. Most courses are four credits, which allows for enrollment in four courses, typically First-Year Seminar, Global Language, a Common Curriculum course and perhaps a course to explore or fulfill a major requirement.

# THE COMMON CURRICULUM

The Common Curriculum is the foundation upon which students build their individualized academic program by providing every student with a broad liberal arts foundation.

## Global Language Proficiency

Students meet global language proficiency through coursework or proficiency examination. The proficiency level for language is equivalent to the successful completion of MCL 211.

## FIRST-YEAR EXPERIENCE:

Requirements for first-year students includes two semesters of First-Year Seminar (FYS) and the Fine Arts Experience (FAE). Students also take appropriate distributional courses from a wide variety of academic departments.

### FIRST-YEAR SEMINAR (FYS)

FYS is a required full-year course (four credits each semester) taken during the first year. The fall semester, "Voice and Expression," is designed to help students improve their ability to read carefully and think critically about what they read, to write in a variety of academic formats, to increase their information literacy as they conduct basic library searches and resource reviews, and to develop discussion skills necessary for successful college course work. The spring semester, "Advocacy and Argumentation," builds on those skills, and includes a significant research project and opportunities to improve skills of oral presentation. FYS is taught by faculty from across the curriculum. Though each section is unique in content and approach, every FYS section provides opportunities to develop the same intellectual skills. Through a wide variety of assignments and projects, students take an active part in developing as reader, thinker, listener, writer, speaker, and researcher at the undergraduate level.

An important feature of FYS is that the professor serves as faculty advisor for each of the students in his or her section of FYS. The students in each section stay together for both semesters, developing a sense of community and continuity.

### HONORS

First-year students who have been admitted to and have accepted participation in the Honors Program are typically enrolled in Honors FYS. To be eligible for Honors FYS, you must have returned the reply card confirming your interest to participate in the Honors Program. Additionally, there may be other Honors Program courses available.

### FINE ARTS EXPERIENCE (FAE) (No Credit)

Students who enroll as first-year students are required to attend a total of eight designated fine arts events by the end of the sophomore year, in categories specified by the Fine Arts Division. Transfer students will be required to complete a total of four fine arts events during each semester that they are enrolled in Transfer or First-Year Seminar. Students will be required to attend an orientation meeting in the Fall which does not count toward the eight required events. FAE-designated events include art gallery exhibits, orchestra performances, theater productions, dance performances and jazz ensemble performances.

# GLOBAL LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY REQUIREMENT

All students are required to achieve proficiency in a modern or classical language. The language information you provide on page 4 of your New Student Course Request Form, along with the on-line placement exam, will help determine **placement**. **Proficiency** can be achieved either by passing a language proficiency exam or successfully completing the third semester level (i.e., FREN 211, GERM 211, CHIN 211, etc.) of a language. (You will be notified if your placement makes you eligible to take the Proficiency Exam.)\* Language courses are offered in Chinese, French, German, Greek, Japanese, Latin and Spanish.

Multilingual students may meet the Global Language proficiency requirement based on the language skills they bring with them to college. To accomplish this, students must demonstrate proficiency in English and one other world language via standardized testing and/or other assessment of language skills, which will be offered on campus early in the fall semester. Once the assessment is complete, course schedules may be adjusted according to the needs of individual students.

**\*NOTE:** If you are considering beginning a new language, taking the placement exam is still recommended to help you determine whether you wish to begin a new language or meet the requirement via a previously studied language. There will be options for students who test higher than 211.

## GLOBAL LANGUAGE PLACEMENT EXAM INSTRUCTIONS for FRENCH and GERMAN

### Self-registering from the Course List screen:

1. From the Entry Page (<http://webct.csbsju.edu/>), click "See courses". The Course List screen appears displaying the courses for the selected category.
2. In the Course List, locate the course ([MCLL Language Placement Exams](#)), and then in the Self-Registration column, click the "pencil" icon. The Self-Registration screen appears.
3. Click "Log in to myWebCT". You will then be prompted to enter your username and password (see information below). Complete the required fields and click "Continue". The Course Added screen appears confirming the registration.

Your username and password are identical. They are your first name, middle initial (if you have one), and last name, separated by periods and in ALL CAPS. Use no spaces or dashes.

# MATHEMATICS

All students are required to complete a Mathematics course as part of the Common Curriculum. Though you are not required to enroll in a course your first semester, you are asked to read the following thoroughly as it includes information valuable for your entire four years at CSB/SJU.

## MATHEMATICS COURSE PREREQUISITES

Placement in a Mathematics course this fall will depend on your intended major, performance in your high school Mathematics courses and your Mathematics score on college entrance exams. All of the Mathematics courses have, as a prerequisite, satisfactory completion of the Quantitative Skills Inventory (QSI) exam. A subscore  $\geq$  of 21 on the Mathematics ACT or  $\geq$  530 on the SAT will substitute for a passing score on this exam. If you do not meet this prerequisite by your ACT/SAT Mathematics score, there will be several opportunities for you to take the exam, starting early in the fall semester, so that you will be able to meet the prerequisite and be eligible to enroll in Mathematics courses in coming semesters. Also depending on your Mathematics background and college entrance exam scores, you may be placed in ACSC 111 Preparation for College Mathematics, to help you prepare for the QSI exam.

## MATHEMATICS COURSE INFORMATION

Common Curriculum Mathematic Requirement: The Mathematics Department offers a variety of courses (both non-calculus and calculus) which fulfill the Common Curriculum Mathematics requirement (note that the number of the course does NOT indicate the difficulty level of the Mathematics involved). All 100-level Mathematics courses assume students have successfully completed at least three years of college preparatory Mathematics, including two years of algebra. Calculus courses assume four years of college preparatory Mathematics.

If you need some review to prepare for the QSI, or just want to brush up on some basic Mathematics and algebra skills to prepare for Mathematics or other classes, the following Academic Skills courses are available.

- ACSC 111: Preparation for College Mathematics, Level I (1 credit)  
A review of basic Mathematics, including arithmetic skills, beginning algebra, and geometry. Emphasis will be placed on awareness and acquisition of problem-solving techniques. This course is designed for students who need to review to prepare for the QSI, but is also appropriate for others who would like to refresh their Mathematics skills.  
(Note: this course is for preparation only; it does not, by itself, satisfy the QSI course prerequisite or meet the Common Curriculum Mathematics course requirement)
- MATHEMATICS 115: Pre-Calculus Mathematics (2 credits)  
A quick review of algebra II and trigonometry topics that are used in calculus, including polynomial, trigonometric, and exponential functions. This course is designed for the student who will be taking calculus, but would like some review and practice in order to be better prepared.  
*Prerequisite: three years of college preparatory Mathematics; satisfactory completion of QSI.*  
(Note: this course is for preparation only; it does not satisfy the Common Curriculum Mathematics course requirement)

### Calculus Information:

**Essentials of Calculus (MATHEMATICS 118)**  
**Calculus I (MATHEMATICS 119)**  
**Calculus II (MATHEMATICS 120)**

Because calculus is required for many majors (Economics, Biochemistry, Chemistry, Computer Science, Mathematics, Natural Science, Physics) and it is generally needed early on, taking calculus in your first semester is an important option for you to consider. Both Mathematics 118 and Mathematics 119 are entry-level calculus courses; some majors may recommend one over the other. In general, an ACT Mathematics subscore of  $\geq 25$  is used as a guideline for "calculus readiness", or you can take our Calculus Readiness Exam at the Mathematics Skills Center or on-line ([www.csbsju.edu/Mathematicsskillscenter](http://www.csbsju.edu/Mathematicsskillscenter)). If you need to improve your Mathematics skills before taking calculus, you can get help at the Mathematics Skills Center or take our Pre-Calculus course (see above).

If you took Calculus I in high school and have a strong calculus background but did not receive AP credit for it, you can still register for Calculus II. You are encouraged to discuss this possibility with a member of the Mathematics Department. If you do begin with Calculus II and earn a grade of C or better in the course, you will also be awarded credit for Calculus I.

## CREDITS EARNED ELSEWHERE

In some cases, having earned college credit prior to your enrollment affects how you are registered for the first semester. Please note on your New Student Course Request Form whether you have participated in the following:

### ADVANCED PLACEMENT/ INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE

Depending upon the exams taken and the scores earned, you may be awarded credit for Advanced Placement/ International Baccalaureate exams. Some departments award credit and consider requirements satisfied by certain scores. Others award no credit, but consider specific scores in "exempting" students from requirements. Not all departments recognize or grant credit for AP or IB exams. If you have taken or will be taking any Advanced Placement/ International Baccalaureate exams, it is important that you request that scores be sent to the CSB/SJU Registrar Office as soon as possible. You will be notified of any credit granted when you receive your fall schedule of classes. In the meantime, the advisor who registers you for fall should be aware of potential credit, so that registration does not duplicate previously earned credits. ### COLLEGE TRANSFER CREDIT AND POST SECONDARY ENROLLMENT

As with Advanced Placement credit, it is important for CSB/SJU to be informed of any course work completed at another institution, including college work completed during high school. Please request of the previous college's registrar that an **official transcript** be sent to the Admission Office as soon as possible so your transcript can be evaluated in light of our curricular requirements.

**Coursework taken through Post Secondary Enrollment Options will be evaluated for elective and Common Curriculum credits. However, such coursework cannot be substituted for First-Year Seminar.**

# FIRST SEMESTER PROGRAMS OF STUDY

The following pages contain the courses recommended for first year students. Most of the courses award four semester credits each. The number at the end of each recommended course, e.g. (4), indicates the number of credits for that course. The typical load in a semester is 16 - 18 credits. This usually means selecting **four courses**. Students interested in choral or instrumental participation in music may take an additional 1 or 2 credits in fine arts.

**COMMON CURRICULUM REQUIREMENTS:** Courses listed in the following recommendations as "other Common Curriculum requirements" refer to courses in Humanities (**HM**), Social Sciences (**SS**), Natural Sciences (**NS**), Theology (**TH**), Fine Arts (**FA**), and Mathematics (**MT**).

**UNDECLARED OR UNDECIDED:** If a student is not yet ready to follow recommendations for a major, a short set of sample course selections focusing on general Common Curriculum requirements can be found at the end of this list. **It is wise to select courses which explore disciplines of possible interest and which might lead to the selection of a major.**

## ATTENTION NURSING MAJORS

Admission into the nursing department is very competitive with a limited number of places in the major due to restricted clinical and faculty availability. Therefore, it may be the case that qualified applicants cannot be accepted into the major. Because of this, it is critical to consider alternative majors even in one's first semester. Students who are eligible by grade point average but who cannot be admitted to the major due to limited space will be referred to Academic Advising to discuss other majors.

Students apply to the nursing major in December of the sophomore year. At that time, a minimum nursing pre-requisite grade point average of 2.75 is required. Pre-requisite courses include: BIOL 121, 212, 214; PSYC 111, 360; MATH 124; NRSRG 110, 112, 207, 340. A minimum grade of "C" or better is required in all pre-requisite courses. Students who repeat a nursing pre-requisite course will be considered for admission to the major on an individual basis.

Your signature is required for enrollment in nursing pre-requisite courses.** Nursing majors will be asked to endorse their understanding of options again prior to spring term registration.

# PLANNING YOUR PRE-MEDICINE COURSES

Pre-Medicine is a program of study that prepares a student for entrance into medical school. Since there is no pre-medicine major, students must choose an academic discipline of study. Medical schools do not require a particular major nor look more favorably on certain majors versus others. Although a science major may be the most common, it is very important for you to choose a major that is exciting and interesting to you.

There are seven curriculum options to consider depending on your intended major (science or non-science), whether you intend to study abroad, and when you intend to apply to medical school. These are listed as Option A through G. The descriptions include the implications of each choice. After studying the information, indicate your preferred option when you list Pre-Med as a choice on Page 1 of the NEW STUDENT COURSE REQUEST FORM. If you do not indicate a preference and are eligible for Option A, you will be so registered. This means that you will be enrolled in both CHEM 123 General Chemistry I and BIOL 121 Cellular Life: Introduction to Cell and Molecular Biology in your first semester. Note that both of these science courses also have labs.

The faculty advisors for pre-med at CSB/SJU are Manuel Campos, David Huber, David Mitchell, and Jeff Anderson. They recommend that you register your name on the Health Pre-Professional Programs web site so you will periodically receive pre-med information. Feel free to contact any of them for further information on the program or curricular options.

**Note: Students considering both nursing and pre-medicine are advised to follow recommended first-semester courses for pre-medicine.**

## **CHEM 121 Skills In Chemistry (2 credits):**

This course is designed specifically to help students develop and improve the problem solving, quantitative reasoning, critical thinking and reading skills necessary to be successful in CHEM 123 Introductory General Chemistry. The course will meet during the first half of fall semester. The course content will be coordinated closely with the first half of CHEM 123 and will be scheduled to run concurrently with it. Students will work on problem solving activities that will help them understand the topics and assignments in CHEM 123. The focus will be on how to: 1) read problems, 2) determine what information is necessary to solve problems, 3) use proper tools (equations, formulas, etc.) to solve problems, and 4) evaluate answers.

Student who have earned a Mathematics ACT score of 21-24 are eligible for the course and will be registered on a space available basis.

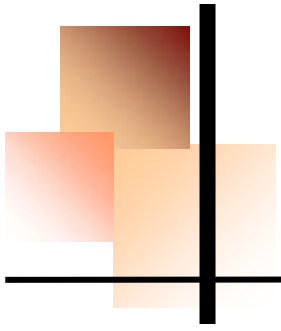

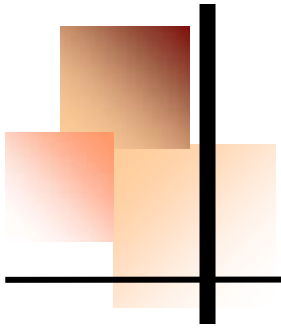

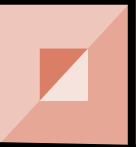

Most classes are scheduled to meet on either odd days (1-3-5) of the cycle, or on even days (2-4-6). As a result, your classes generally meet every other day. Most likely, you will be registered for four 4-credit classes. Classes (with occasional exceptions--such as Art studios) generally meet for 70 minutes.
