LITURGICAL MUSIC

Applied Organ

LMUS 407 01A · 1 credit · \$295 and \$175 Studio Fee

June 16-July 25 (days and times to be arranged between student and professor)

(1 lesson/wk; 3-5 studio sessions)

The development of technical skills and knowledge of performance practices at the graduate level. Ability to play a large variety of repertoire fluently and with understanding. Major works of significant periods and schools of organ literature will be studied and performed. Secondary organ students will develop sufficient techniques and familiarity with the instrument to play knowledgeably and/or coach others in parish settings.

Applied Voice

LMUS 408 01A · 1 credit · \$295 and \$175 Studio Fee

June 16-July 25 (days and times to be arranged between student and professor)
(1 lesson/wk; 3-5 studio sessions)

The fundamentals of singing and vocal pedagogy: breathing, efficient use of voice, diction, etc. Differing musical styles and the need to interpret the music based on the performance practices of given periods in music history. Voice majors will study and perform significant bodies of solo repertoire. Majors and secondary voice students will emphasize technique and pedagogical skills appropriate to roles as choral directors, section leaders and coaches for cantors/song leaders in parishes.

Gregorian Chant I

LMUS 410 01A · 1 credit · \$295

July 20 7-9 p.m., July 21 8:30-11 a.m. and 7-9 p.m., July 22 8:30-11 a.m. and 7-9 p.m., July 23 8:30-11 a.m.

Introduction to Gregorian Chant: historical development, notation, rhythm, accompaniment, Latin pronunciation, rehearsal techniques, use in the modern liturgy. Some knowledge of the basics of music theory are expected.

Gregorian Chant II

LMUS 411 01A · 1 credit · \$295

July 23 2-4:30 p.m. and 7-9 p.m., July 24 8:30-11 a.m. and 7-9 p.m., July 25 8:30-11 a.m. and 7-9 p.m., July 26 8-11 a.m.

A practical seminar on singing Gregorian chant well. Advanced study of early notation (Saint Gall and Metz schools) as found in the Graduale Triplex, for the purpose of semiological rhythmic nuance. Discussion of practical issues of chant performance in the liturgy, such as selection of chants, rehearsal techniques, vocal techniques, and other information.

Service Playing

LMUS 433 01A · 1 credit · \$295

June 16-July 25 (days and times to be arranged between student and professor)
(1 lesson/wk; 3-5 studio sessions)

The qualified church organist as leader and enabler of the assembly's singing. The course will require high proficiency levels of assembly leadership and accompanimental skills (hymns, masses, psalm forms) as well as vocal and choral accompaniment. Students will also develop abilities at sight-reading, modulation, transposing and extemporization.

Service Leadership for Cantor/Song Leader

LMUS 435 01A · 1 credit · \$295

June 16-July 25 (days and times to be arranged between student and professor)
(1 lesson/wk; 3-5 studio sessions)

Historic role of cantor in Jewish and Christian liturgy. Applied techniques include: teaching of antiphonal music to the assembly, appropriate directing skills, the cantor's ritual moments, cantorial music resources. The role of congregational song leader as distinguished from that of cantor and choir director. Developing good song leading style, i.e., teaching new music to a congregation, learning appropriate directing techniques for congregational leadership. Sharpening vocal and musical styles for both ministries will be emphasized.

Practicum

LMUS 439 01A · 1 credit · \$295

June 16-July 25 (days and times to be arranged between student and professor)

Direct involvement in actual liturgical music planning, rehearsing and implementing in a variety of liturgical forms. This is to be done in area churches and/or on-campus with permission of and under supervision of the advisor and other faculty with the aim of developing skills and the ability to integrate practice with musical and liturgical knowledge.

Topics in Liturgical Music: Final Project, Organ or Voice

The final project is developed in consultation with a student's faculty advisor. The project might be a lecture-recital.

Interpretation of music and liturgical theology. History of liturgical music; official documents; issues, problems, and positions in liturgical music practice; worship aid evaluation; presentation of music/liturgy plans.

Rites of Christian Initiation

LTGY 404 01A · 3 credits · \$885

July 7-25 (July 7-10 M T W Th, July 14-25 M T Th F), 8-11:15 a.m.

Historical development and theology in the East and West of the catechumenate and the rites of baptism, the Spirit-gift and first eucharist. Contemporary reforms in the churches, with special emphasis on the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults.

Maxwell Johnson (PhD, University of Notre Dame) is Professor at the University of Notre Dame, Notre Dame, Indiana.

Eucharistic Liturgy and Theology

LTGY 406 01A · 3 credits · \$885

June 16-July 3 (June 16-27 M T Th F, June 30-July 3 M T W Th), 1-4:15 p.m.

The origins of the eucharistic liturgy and its historical development in both the East and West. Doctrinal perspectives. An evaluation of contemporary reformed rites, particularly the new Roman Missal. Current ecumenical dialogue and pastoral practice.

Christian McConnell (PhD, University of Notre Dame) is Assistant Professor at University of Saint Michael's College in the University of Toronto, Toronto, Ontario.

MONASTIC STUDIES, CHURCH HISTORY & SPIRITUALITY

Monastic History II: Benedict to the Reformation

MONS 404 01A and HHTH 415 01A · 3 credits · \$885

June 16-July 3 (June 16-27 M T Th F, June 30-July 3 M T W Th), 1-4:15 p.m.

The major changes in the development of Western monastic life took place during the Middle Ages. This course will address those changes, key female and male monastic figures and their writings and the reform movements from the early Middle Ages through the fifteenth century.

Maureen O'Brien (PhD, Western Michigan University) is Assistant Professor at Saint Cloud State University, Saint Cloud, Minnesota.

Monastic Spiritual Theology

MONS 434 01A and SPIR 434 01A · 3 credits · \$885

July 7-25 (July 7-10 M T W Th, July 14-25 M T Th F), 1-4:15 p.m.

The development of monastic spiritual theology will be studied from the perspective of monastic primary sources. Early texts will be studied as guides and sourcebooks for models of monastic spiritual progress and human maturity. Special emphasis will be placed on: (1) the original meanings of “active” and “contemplative” in the vocabulary of early monasticism; (2) models of spiritual development in the early church and in the early monastic movement; (3) the interrelationship between the cenobitic and eremitic lifestyles; (4) the theory and practice of *lectio divina*; (5) the mystical interpretation of the scriptures and the practice of liturgical prayer; (6) monologistic prayer; (7) monastic reform and renewal.

Luke Dysinger, OSB (DPhil, University of Oxford), is Assistant Professor at Saint John's Seminary, Camarillo, California.

Sources of Christian Mysticism

MONS 468 01A and SPIR 468 02A · 1 credit · \$295

June 23-27 (M T Th F), 8-11:15 a.m.

This course will trace the Greek and Syriac origins of Christian mysticism, working with biblical, philosophical, and theological writings and their synthesis in classical mystical texts such as the writings of St. Isaac the Syrian, Pseudo-Dionysius, and St. Symeon the New Theologian. Those writings in turn fed the great mystical traditions of the western church, including those of *The Cloud of Unknowing* and St. John of the Cross. Finally, we will consider the relevance of such classical expressions of mysticism today. Participation in the course presumes strong interest in the traditions of Christian mysticism but does not require previous in-depth study.

Columba Stewart, OSB (DPhil, University of Oxford), is Professor at Saint John's School of Theology-Seminary, Collegeville, Minnesota.

Spiritual Practice: History, Theology, Experience

SPIR 468 01A · 3 credits · \$885

July 7-25 (July 7-10 M T W Th, July 14-25 M T Th F), 8-11:15 a.m.

Spiritual practice as invitation to encounter and name the presence, patterns and movements of the Spirit in life, worship, theology and the history of the church. Resources include: 1) texts exemplifying the deep wisdom from Christian formational traditions on the rhythms of spiritual journey, discernment, divine presence, vocation, mysticism, and spiritual direction; 2) formational practices of contemplative openness to The Holy in self, others, creation, and God. Integration of these resources focused through the lens of students' experience of spiritual practice as embodied knowing.

PASTORAL THEOLOGY & MINISTRY

Pastoral Liturgy II

PTHM 427 01A · 3 credits · \$885

May 16 6:30-9:30 p.m., June 16-20 8 a.m.-noon, July 28-30 1-5 p.m.

Students will study the history, theology and pastoral celebration of the rites of Christian Marriage, Reconciliation (communal and individual), Anointing of the Sick, Christian funerals, and the Liturgy of the Hours in parishes. The course includes practica with videotaping for the development of ministerial skills.

Johan van Parys (PhD, University of Notre Dame) is Director of Liturgy and the Sacred Arts at the Basilica of Saint Mary, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Parish Administration

PTHM 450 01A · 3 credits · \$885

June 16-July 3 (June 16-26 M T W Th, June 30-July 3 M T W Th), 6:30-9:45 p.m.

Contemporary theories of leadership as applied to church ministry. Overview of critical parish administration systems including: governance, vision, human resources, financial management, shared ministry management, and communications.

Jerry Roth (MBA, University of Saint Thomas) is Executive Director, The Center for Parish Leadership, Burnsville, Minnesota, Adjunct Instructor at the University of Saint Thomas, Saint Paul, Minnesota, and Adjunct Instructor at Saint John's School of Theology-Seminary, Collegeville, Minnesota.

Practicum in Catechesis

PTHM 459 01A · 3 credits · \$885

May 17 8:30-11:30 a.m., June 17 1:30-5:30 p.m., July 28-30 8 a.m.-noon

Students work with an organization, project, or parish in the area of their ministerial interest. The supervised experience requires the students to integrate theological competence with pastoral practice in developing vocational identity as a public minister, exploring issues of leadership, power and authority; and gaining facility in articulating the Christian faith and in fostering the development of faith with others. Students will reflect on the practice of ministry in theological reflection groups.

The Johannine Tradition

The Gospel and Letters of John have been very influential in the shaping of Christian theology. A close reading of the texts will provide an examination of the Johannine corpus within its theological, social, and historical context.

An investigation of the Christian doctrine of the human person: creation and fall, sin and grace, justification and sanctification, eschatological fulfillment.

Social Thought and Faithful Citizenship

MORL 468 01A · 3 credits · \$885

June 16-July 3 (June 16-27 M T Th F, June 30-July 3 M T W Th), 8-11:15 a.m.

An exploration of the intersection of Christian faith and US political life in this election year. The course begins and ends with the US Bishops' document *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship* (2007). We will explore the claims Christian (especially, but not limited to, Catholic) faith makes upon politicians and voters, church-state relations, and the role of religion in public discourse. Readings include selections from Vatican II's *Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World* and *Declaration on Religious Liberty*, St. Augustine's *City of God*, and key documents of modern Catholic social teaching. Basic knowledge of and interest in issues related to the current presidential campaign is expected.

Dana Dillon (MDiv, University of Notre Dame; PhD [anticipated May 2008], Duke University) is Instructor at Providence College, Providence, Rhode Island.

Biblical, Archaeological, and Religious Sites

JRSM 406 · 3 credits · \$4970

May 16-June 7

This course forms the educational component for the study tour of the Holy Land. It surveys the historical and archaeological sites which provide the context for both the Old and New Testaments. It includes visits to places held sacred by Christians as well as those revered by Jews and Muslims.

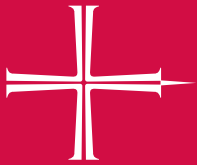
