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REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

OCTOBER 30 - NOVEMBER 15, 2006
FOR SPRING 2007

All currently registered students who expect to return to CSB/SJU this Spring must complete advance registration by November 15th. Please follow these instructions carefully—proper registration is your responsibility. If you have any questions about registration, call the Registrar's Office at 5260 (CSB) or 3396 (SJU).

STUDENTS ARE ELIGIBLE TO REGISTER ONLY IF THEY HAVE:

- ... Met with their advisor to obtain their Label with Registration PIN #
- ... Settled all current charges with the Student Accounts Office
- ... Been accepted by a department (unless they are a first-year student, or first semester sophomore)
- ... Complied with Minnesota immunization regulations
- ... Have an active Network account
- ... Applied for graduation if they are classified as a Senior

We strongly urge you to meet with your advisor early and enter your registration on BANNER Web Self Service on the date listed on your PIN Label. **Registration is on-line—delaying your registration will affect course selection.**

Students who are ineligible to register for any of these reasons may register on BANNER Web Self Service after they have cleared all registration holds.

Please note that registration for ILPs (Individualized Learning Projects) and for special programs (Tri-College Exchange, Internships, etc.) requires your submission of special forms available from the Registrar's Office or they are available on-line. Registration for Internships (8 credits or more) are due the first day of classes.

REGISTRATION ADJUSTMENTS

Registration adjustments (Drop/Add) can be done on BANNER Web Self Service through January 18th. **You will need your Registration PIN# that you received from your Advisor.** To drop a course after this date, students can come to the Registrar's Office at SJU (Quad 163) or at CSB (Academic Services Building 208).

Listings of canceled or closed courses will be electronically updated on the Class Schedule Information on BANNER Web Self Service. Students should use BANNER Web Self Service to check whether a space has become available in a course that was previously closed. Courses may be added through the first 4 class days of the semester.

If a course is closed, check whether there are any other sections of the same course that have spaces available in them and register for an alternate section. If this option is not available to you, consider alternate courses and register accordingly. Your advisor is a good resource to help determine an appropriate alternate. In some cases, it may be appropriate for the department chair or instructor to "override" a student beyond the course limit. Override registrations are completed by the student presenting a signed (department chair or instructor, as appropriate) Drop/Add card to the Registrar's Office.

REGISTRATION PRIORITY AND COURSE SELECTION

Registration priority is based first on class standing, then on cumulative earned hours. Seniors are assigned courses first, then juniors, sophomores and first-year students. Class standing is determined by earned credits, not by years in college. **Banner Web Self Service will immediately respond to your course selection by indicating Enrolled or Closed.**

Go to INTERNET EXPLORER

Click on “**A to Z Index**” and under the “**B**” click on “**BANNER Web Self Service**”
Click on Web Self Service
Click on Enter Secure Area (CSB Students) or Enter Secure Area (SJU Students)
Enter Banner ID Number (from your ID card)
Enter WSC/PIN (six numbers/letters that you set. If you can't remember your WSC then click on “Forgot WSC or PIN?”)

Click on Student Services
Click on Student Records & Account Information
Click on Registration
Click on Add/Drop Classes
Click Submit where Spring 2007 displays
Enter Registration PIN number
Click Submit
Enter CRN numbers for courses
Click Submit Changes

If you took a course at another college prior to Fall 2005 which is a prerequisite of a CSB/SJU course, you MUST contact the Registrar's Office to be registered for the course.

To Drop a course go to Action Box – click pull down arrow and select Permanent Drop
Click Submit Changes

To change the credits on a Variable Credit Course:

Scroll down to course with variable credit
Enter new credit hours
Click Submit Changes

DROP/ADD on Banner Web Self Service

If you would like to drop and add courses for Spring Term 2007, you may do this through **BANNER Web Self Service** until **January 18th**. Please keep your Registration PIN #. You will need this to Drop/Add on Web Self Service. After this date you will need to drop and add courses in the Registrar's Office.

OBTAINING A NETWORK ACCOUNT

All students must have a NETWORK account to use Web Self Service from the Network PC's on campus. Most of you will already have an account, which you may use for many other functions besides course registration. If you do not have a Network account--or have forgotten your password or how to sign on--please follow these steps to obtain your Network account:

- Step #1:** Go the Computing Center at SJU, Quad 084, from 8:30 am - 4:30 pm
- Step #2:** Identify yourself as needing a Network account.
- Step #3:** Activate your account on one of the PC's in the computing center

PROBLEMS -- Discussed below are some common problems we expect some of you may encounter, and how you may solve them.

... **Your PIN # doesn't work.**

Solution: Re-check your label and carefully re-enter the PIN #. You may have to Exit Web Self Service completely and login again. **YOUR PIN# for registration is not the same as your WSC (Web Security Code) that you use to access Student Information on Web Self Service.** Please note: the PIN # is not displayed (for security reasons) as you enter it on the computer.

... **You lost your PIN #.**

Solution: Contact your Advisor to get your Pin Number again, or bring your Advisor's signature to the Registrar's Office. (PIN #'s cannot be obtained in the Computer Access Areas)

... **You entered the wrong CRN #.**

Solution: Web Self Service allows you to make changes to your registration. See the section on changing your fall registration in the "Instructions for using Web Self Service". You may make changes on Web Self Service through January 18th.

... **While using Web Self Service it displays: "This session for your Login has expired".**

Solution: Web Self Service is programmed to Log off of the Registration Screen if you **leave the screen idle for more than 15 minutes**. If this should this happen, simply sign on again. To do so, click on Web Self Service and then click on the Fall Registration icon and start over.

... **Web Self Service shows the status of a course as 'open' but it will not permit you to register for the course.**

Solution: You may not meet the prerequisites or quota restrictions for that course. Check the notes in the class schedule under that course or contact the Registrar's Office.

ESSENTIAL INFORMATION

ACADEMIC ADVISING

After receiving this Class Schedule booklet, visit your academic advisor to arrange a program of classes for next term, and have your advisor place your PIN label on the Class Request Worksheet located on the back page of your Spring 2007 Class Schedule Booklet.

If you intend to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. Overloads may be attempted only by students in good academic standing, and overloads of 20 or more credits require the student to see the Academic Advising Office.

ACADEMIC PROBATION

First semester students must earn a minimum 1.8 cumulative grade point average to remain in good academic standing. In subsequent semesters, all students are required to maintain a 2.0 cumulative grade point average for all CSB/SJU coursework. Students who fall below a 2.0 cumulative GPA will be placed on academic probation for the next semester. During the probationary semester, students must raise their cumulative GPA to 2.0 and may take no courses for S/U grading unless the course is offered only on an S/U basis. Students whose cumulative GPA remains below the minimum standards at the end of a Final Probationary semester are subject to dismissal. For more information, see the Official Academic Catalog.

ADDING A CLASS

Thursday, January 18th is the last day you may ADD a full-term course to your program, unless the course's first meeting is scheduled after January 18th. No student may enroll for a full-term course after the second scheduled meeting without the instructor's consent.

BANNER Web Self Service will be available to add courses through the 4th day of the semester. After the 4th day of the semester, any additions, with the instructor's consent, must be made by filling out a drop/

add card and bringing it to the Registrar's Office.


AUDITING A CLASS

Students intending to audit a course (earn no credit) should indicate their intent when registering for the course, or complete a Drop/Add card and file it with the Registrar's Office during the first week of class. Auditors are expected to attend all regular classes, but they are not required to take final exams. A student who first registers for credit may change to auditor status any time during the first month of class. A student who first enrolls for auditor status may change to credit status only during the first week of class. Courses audited are not included in determining the total credits earned; however, the credit value of any course audited is computed in the assessment of tuition.



CALENDAR CHANGES

The CSB/SJU calendar is subject to modification or interruption due to occurrences such as fire, flood, labor disputes, interruption of utility services, acts of God, civil disorder and war. In the event of such occurrences, the Institutions will attempt to accommodate their students. However, we do not guarantee that courses of instruction, extra curricular activities or other programs or events will be completed or rescheduled. Refunds will be made to eligible students in accordance with College or University policy.

Classes offered Periods II, III, and IV generally are requested by greater numbers of students than are other periods. You are less likely to be closed out of a class that is scheduled for Period I, or V, and may wish to consider this when you prepare your initial registration.

CO-REQUISITES (COREQ)

Co-requisites are courses that must be taken during the same semester.

CREDITS EARNED AT OTHER COLLEGES

Students may complete out-of-residence courses and transfer them to the College of Saint Benedict and Saint John's University. The college at which the coursework is completed must be accredited by the appropriate regional accrediting agency at the time of enrollment. Courses to be transferred must be similar to courses offered for credit at the College of Saint Benedict and Saint John's University. Courses to be transferred must receive a minimum grade of C. Credits received for these courses are translated into semester credits according to the appropriate translation formula. Grades earned for transferred coursework are not calculated into the student's cumulative GPA. Before credit may be transferred, the Registrar's Office must receive an official transcript directly from the college at which the courses were completed.

With advance approval, students may apply these courses towards core and/or major requirements. Work taken to complete core requirements requires prior consultation with and approval of the Registrar's Office or the Academic Advising Office. Work taken to complete major requirements requires prior consultation and approval of the department chair. The department chair needs to sign an Academic Exemption Form.

Students who intend to transfer coursework from a foreign college or university must consult the director of international studies before beginning such study. Consult the Center for International Education for further information.

CREDIT OVERLOAD

If you plan to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. The overload tuition fee is billed at \$680.00 per credit over 18. Students whose cumulative grade point average is below 2.00 may not register for an overload. Students in good academic standing (GPA above 2.00) may register for a maximum of 1 overload credit (19 credits overall) without permission. Credit totals of 20 or more require the student to see the Academic Advising Office. BANNER Web Self Service registration system will not allow you to register for more than 19 credits.

DROPPING A CLASS

... **Jan. 18th** Last day to add/drop a course using BANNER Web Self Service. After this date students must fill out a drop/add card & obtain the instructor's signature to receive a permanent drop until February 7th .

... **Feb. 7th** Last day to receive a permanent drop on your schedule

... **Apr. 13th** Last day to receive a "W" on your transcript. If you withdraw after this date, your instructor will assign you an "F" at the end of the semester.

For courses scheduled for less than a full term, withdrawal during the first third of the course will result in no record entry; during the second third, a "W" entry; during the final third, a failure if appropriate.

Students who fail to properly drop or withdraw from a course may be subject to a failing grade if appropriate.

EXEMPTION/SUBSTITUTION

In exceptional circumstances students may petition for exemption/substitution from specific academic regulations. Forms for requesting an exemption/substitution are available from the Registrar's Office. Students should first consult with their academic advisor, whose signature on the exemption/substitution form represents a recommendation that the request be considered favorably by the approving official. Department chairs are the approving officials for exemptions/substitutions from requirements within majors and minors. Exemptions/substitutions from academic regulations beyond major and minor fields require the approval of the Assistant Academic Dean. Requests for these non-departmental exemptions/substitutions should be directed to the Academic Advising Offices. The guiding principle in considering requests for any exemption/substitution is fidelity to the academic standards of the colleges.

The academic calendar concludes each semester with a one-day study and three-day test cycle. Faculty may administer final exams for their classes only during the exam periods officially scheduled by the Registrar's Office. Cumulative final examinations may not be given during the regularly scheduled class days of the semester. If there is to be a cumulative final exam in a course, all exams given during the semester must be returned for student review by the last scheduled day of class.

Instructors of each full-term course are expected to announce at the beginning of the course whether a written two-hour final examination will be given. Such an exam will be administered during the three-day test cycle according to the schedule above. Note that a class is assigned a test time and day in the schedule according to the cycle and time period it meets during the semester. Classes that meet after Period V may use their last regularly scheduled class period for a final exam.

One period has been reserved on each of the three test days for the administration of a common exam for multiple-section courses who so desire. A list of such courses, and their exam times, will be announced this fall. The legend, MS, in the accompanying chart signifies times set aside for these multi-section common exams.

GRADUATION INFORMATION

- ... An Application for Degree must be submitted to the Registrar's Office prior to the award of a degree from Saint John's University or the College of Saint Benedict.
- ... An Application for Degree is sent spring semester to all CSB/SJU Juniors.
- ... Submitted applications are then reviewed to ensure all Core and Major requirements are met prior to the award of a degree.
- ... Results of the Degree Audit are sent to students two times during their senior year: September and March.
- ... Degrees are issued May, August, and December.
- ... Upon successful completion of all degree requirements, diplomas

and transcripts are sent to all graduates at their permanent address.

- ... An Application for Degree allows students the privilege to participate in the May commencement ceremony.
- ... Students may participate in the May commencement ceremony if they are within 8 credits of all degree requirements.
- ... Students who leave CSB/SJU may transfer up to eight semester credits from another accredited institution of higher education to complete their degree requirements.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

- ... 124 credit hours. 45 of these must be taken at CSB/SJU
- ... 40 of the total credit hours must be upper division (300 level)
- ... 2.0 minimum cumulative GPA (unless a specific major requires a higher average)
- ... 2.0 minimum GPA major and/or supporting courses (unless a specific major requires a higher average)
- ... Completed Core curriculum requirements
- ... Acceptance to a major (usually at the completion of sophomore year)
- ... Requirements for a major or minor (half of the courses for a major or minor must be completed at CSB/SJU)

HOLDS

All financial, academic, student accounts & health center holds must be cleared before registering for classes.

INCOMPLETE GRADE POLICY

The policy concerning the temporary grade Incomplete (I) includes the following points:

When circumstances warrant, instructors may allow some delay in the completion of course work. Such extensions shall not extend beyond the close of the following regular (fall or spring) semester, and earlier limits may be set at the discretion of the instructor.

The instructor must report on the official grade roster the grade "I" followed by the minimum grade the student will receive if the course work is not complete by the end of the following semester (e.g., IF, or IC, or IB). That grade will be used in the computation of grade point averages until the Incomplete is removed.

If by the end of the following semester the instructor reports a single final grade to the Registrar, that grade will replace the I/GRADE, the Incomplete will be removed, and averages recomputed accordingly. Otherwise the provisional grade that was assigned with the "I" will become a permanent part of the transcript.

Exceptions to the above may be granted only by the written permission of the Assistant Academic Dean. Such exceptions will ordinarily be granted only in cases of medical disability or problems of comparable seriousness.

Degree candidates are cautioned that failure to have all degree requirements satisfied (including removal of Incomplete grades in courses needed for graduation) by March 15th may result in postponement of their graduation.

INDIVIDUAL LEARNING PROJECTS

The guidelines and application forms for Individual Learning Projects, sometimes called Independent Study, are available in the Registrar's Office. If you are planning an ILP for Spring term, please consult these guidelines. Remember, only 4 credits of ILP per term are allowed. You may indicate your intent to register for an ILP by requesting DNA 271 01A CRN #12797, or DNA 371-01A, CRN #13616 on Banner Web Self Service. **Remember to indicate the number of credits. First-year students are not eligible for ILPs.**

SPRING 2007 INTERNSHIPS FOR CREDIT

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an Internship for academic credit during Spring 2007 are required to attend a one-hour Legal & Professional Issues session in November or December of 2006. Check with the Internship Office (Academic Services Building, phone 5799) for exact dates. When you register for spring classes, you may indicate your intent to register for a Spring 2007 internship by requesting DNA 397-01A, Call #12799 through Banner Web Self Service.

You will not be registered for your internship until the Registrar's Office receives your completed Registration for Internship-Preliminary Learning Contract form with all required signatures. This form and other required legal forms can be obtained from the Internship Office. For information on other requirements, check the Internship Program website (www.csbsju.edu/internship). The last day to register for a Spring 2007 Internship is Wednesday, December 20th. Registration after this date requires approval of the Internship Coordinator.

SUMMER 2007 INTERNSHIPS FOR CREDIT

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an Internship for academic credit during Summer 2007 are required to attend a one-hour Legal and Professional Issues session offered in April of 2007. Check with the Internship Office (Academic Services Building, phone 5799) for exact dates. All internships which take place during the summer must be registered under the Summer term not under the preceding Spring semester or the following Fall semester.

You will not be registered for your internship until the Registrar's Office receives your completed Registration for Internship-Preliminary Learning Contract form with all required signatures. This form and other required legal forms can be obtained from the Internship Office. For information on other requirements, check the Internship Program website (www.csbsju.edu/internship). The last day to register for a Summer 2007 Internship is Friday, May 11th. Registration after this date requires approval of the Internship Coordinator.

FALL 2007 INTERNSHIPS FOR CREDIT

MINNESOTA STUDENTS ELIGIBLE FOR THE MINNESOTA GRANT PROGRAM:

You must register for a minimum of 15 credits each semester to receive a Minnesota Grant at the full-time student rate. Students who register for 12-14 credits may still receive a Minnesota Grant but the award amount will be substantially reduced. Please direct any questions to the Financial Aid Office at CSB or SJU. (For all other aid programs, 12 credits is still considered full-time.)

OFFICIAL COMMUNICATIONS TO STUDENTS BY E-MAIL

The Registrar's Office will use electronic mail as the most expeditious means of communicating with you. Make sure you are not blocking messages from the Registrar's Office in order to receive important notices regarding graduation, cancellation of courses, course schedule updates, etc.

ON TRACK

Advisors will have access to their advisees' On Track advising aid through BANNER Web Self Service for Faculty. Please make an appointment to meet with your advisor early to review your academic progress and select your Fall coursework. Remember, all students **MUST** see their advisor to receive their Registration PIN # Label.

PERMISSION REQUIRED CLASSES

Before attempting to register for courses listed as "Permission of Instructor or Department", students must obtain written permission.

PREREQUISITES

Check the course listings section of this class schedule to find out if a class has a prerequisite. Make sure you have met all prerequisites before attempting to register for a course. If you have not taken the prerequisite, you must contact the department to seek written approval (signed drop/add card or e-mail directly from the instructor) to register for the course. If you fulfilled the prerequisite through a course taken at another college prior to Fall 2005, please contact the Registrar's Office prior to registration.

REPEATING A COURSE

A course that has been failed may be repeated for credit. Courses that have been passed may not be repeated for credit. They may, however, be repeated for additional honor points. The original grade is not removed when the course is repeated and credit for a course can be earned only once. The higher grade is computed in the GPA. If you are registering for a course that you are repeating you **MUST** notify the Registrar's Office.

STUDENT TEACHING

Students registering for student teaching (EDUC 361, 362, 363) in their 9th (or greater) semester as a full-time student at CSB/SJU will be billed at ½ the regular tuition rate for that semester. These students will also not be charged the student activity fee, technology fee, and campus center fee for that semester. Institutional gift aid (scholarships/grants) will not be available to these students.

STUDY ABROAD

CSB and SJU offer a number of group overseas study programs. Students who plan to enroll in one of these programs should contact the Center for International Education, QUAD 128 at SJU. Students who are considering enrolling in coursework offered abroad by another institution (Consortium/External Study Abroad) should contact the International Education Office or the Registrar's Office, for information on transfer of credits. Students who register for SA 372, Consortium/External Study Abroad, will be billed a \$199 fee.

Seniors must ordinarily be in residence for the two semesters immediately preceding commencement (graduation). "In residence" is defined as enrollment as a full-time student at CSB/SJU for a minimum of 12 credits per semester. Any student wishing to register for a External Study Abroad Consortium during one of their two last semesters of their Senior year must receive approval from the Academic Advising Office. Seniors will **not** be allowed to register for a year long External Study Abroad Consortium.

S/U REGISTRATION

Arrangements for this non-honor point grading option should be made with your professor at the beginning of the course. Remember that undergraduates are limited in the number and types of courses they may take for the grade S (Satisfactory). See the Catalog for specific rules. First-year students may not take the S/U option except for a course with only S/U grades available. The grade S, once turned in by the instructor, is **NOT SUBJECT TO LATER CHANGE**. Grading options are listed in the Class Schedule as either A-F grading only or S-U grading only. If neither of these is listed, the instruc-

tor will permit eligible students to choose either option by the date the instructor specifies at the beginning of the course. Once you have chosen, you may not request that the S/U be changed to an honor point grade.

If coursework grades average below a C under the S/U option, the grade U (Unsatisfactory) will be given with no credit earned.

TRI-COLLEGE EXCHANGE

The College of Saint Benedict, Saint John's University, and Saint Cloud State University have an agreement that encourages regular full-time undergraduate students to take courses on any of the three campuses. Registration is limited to fall and spring semesters. If you are interested in taking courses at Saint Cloud State, you can pick up a copy of their Class Schedule and a registration application at the Registrar's Office. If a course seems suitable for your program of studies, see your advisor for permission to register. To register, file the approved application with the Registrar's Office at the St. John's campus before January 2nd. The course will be added to your Spring 2007 Student Detail Schedule, if space is available.

CSB/SJU students will be billed tuition, and other fees, at CSB/SJU rates. If a student is not registered for more than 18 total credits, there will ordinarily be no additional charge. For credits over 18, an additional tuition charge of \$680.00, will be made for each additional semester credit hour.

If you have any questions about Tri-College Exchange and the suitability of SCSU courses toward your degree program, see Jane Stromme in the Registrar's Office, QUAD 163.

TRANSCRIPT SERVICE

Current students may request an unofficial copy of their transcript at no charge from the Registrar's Office. Official transcript requests must be submitted in writing to the Registrar's Office and may be picked up at the Registrar's Office (or we can mail them for you) 2-3 working days after the request is made, except during the first and last week of each term.

Former students may request a transcript copy for \$3.00 per transcript. The fee for faxing a transcript will be \$3.00 per transcript. If the transcript is faxed outside the U.S. the fee will be a minimum of \$5.00. All transcript requests must be submitted in writing via mail or fax and payment must accompany the order.

UPDATES TO THE OFFICIAL CLASS SCHEDULE

Updates, including additional courses, cancellations, changes to existing courses, core approvals & other general changes to the Official Class Schedule will be published periodically on the Registrar's Official website. Notification of the publication of these updates will be sent via E-mail to all students and faculty.

VARIABLE CREDIT COURSES

If a course is listed with a range of credits (variable), you must enter the appropriate credit amount desired when you register for the course. The credit amount you are registered for may impact your status as a full-time student or your financial aid.

VERIFICATION OF ENROLLMENT

The Registrar's Office can provide verification of your enrollment at the College of Saint Benedict or Saint John's University, as well as other information, such as graduation date, majors, full-time status, etc.

WITHDRAWAL FROM COLLEGE

Complete withdrawal from all of your courses during the term must be initiated with your Residential Director at CSB, Mary Commons 221 or the Residential Life Office, Sexton 127 at SJU. If you withdraw by February 7th no official record of your registration for that term will be made. If you withdraw between February 8th and April 13th, the mark "W" will appear behind that term's courses on your transcript. **If you withdraw after April 13th, all courses for that term will be followed by the grade of "F"**. If you decide to withdraw after the term ends, you **MUST** notify the office mentioned above.

ART**ART 240D: Topics in Art History: Arts of China***Jennifer Joffee*

This course is an introduction to the arts of China from prehistory to the present. Representative works from major historical periods will be studied, including jades, bronzes, ceramics, painting, sculpture and architecture. An emphasis will be placed on understanding the cultural, political, and/or religious significance of the works in addition to the styles and methods employed in their creation. No previous knowledge of art history or China is required.

ART 309C: Topics in Art History: Islamic Art*Jennifer Joffee*

The focus of this course is Islamic art from the inception of Islam in the 7th century through the present. Islamic art is broadly defined as arts created by and/or for people of the Islamic faith or arts created in regions of the world where Islam has been the predominant faith. Representative works from major historical periods and various geographic locales will be studied including architecture, mosaics, calligraphy, metalwork, ceramics, painting, and textiles. An emphasis will be placed on understanding the cultural, political, and/or religious significance of the works in addition to the styles and methods employed in their creation. No previous knowledge of art history or Islam is required.

BIOLOGY**BIOL 341: Natural History of Tropical Carbonate Ecosystems***Larry Davis**Cross-listed with ENVR 341 & GEOL 341*

This course provides students with an introduction to the unique ecology and geology of tropical marine carbonate ecosystems, with an emphasis on those of the Bahamas. Topics covered include the evolution of reefs and reef-building organisms, geological history of the Bahamas, and the natural history of modern reef, mangal, and seagrass ecosystems. Environmental challenges facing these ecosystems will also be considered. The course requires participation in a field trip to San Salvador, Bahamas. As part of the field trip, students will participate in a research project that involves monitoring of the ecological status of a tropical carbonate ecosystem. Students must have a valid US passport by the time spring break arrives.

PREREQUISITE: BIOL 115 and 116 or ENVR 175 and 275 or GEOL 211 and 212**FEE:** \$1,400**COMMUNICATION****COMM 381B: Visual Rhetoric***Terry Check*

Visual images have the potential to serve as powerful sources of persuasion. This course examines how visual communication functions as argument to sway audiences on public issues. Students will apply methods of rhetorical criticism to various visual artifacts, including television newscasts, advertising, speeches with significant visual components, photographs, illustrations, and other original documents."

PREREQUISITE: COMM 101 or permission of instructor**COMM 381C: Contemporary Rhetorical Theory***Aric Putnam*

This course studies the development of rhetorical and cultural theory in the Twentieth Century. After a brief flirtation with Aristotelian and Enlightenment theories of persuasion, we will engage with critics and theorists who built upon and departed from this tradition. Some of the theorists we will read in depth are Kenneth Burke, Chaim Perelman, Michel Foucault, Stuart Hall, and Helene Cixous. We will read these folks to achieve a greater appreciation of how language, public life, power, and desire are related. Students will write informal reaction papers and enjoy an exam or two. Through these assignments, lecture, and our conversations, we will attempt to discover for ourselves how a rhetorical perspective can make sense of the modern world.

PREREQUISITE: COMM 101 or permission of instructor and Junior or Senior standing**COMM 383D: A Survey of Documentary Film***Lu Lippold*

Truth is Stranger than Fiction. What is the difference between fiction films and non-fiction films? Do documentaries represent "reality"? What choices do documentarists make when they approach a topic? What narrative and stylistic strategies do they use? What social, cultural, and political functions have documentaries served over time? Through the examination of different types of documentary films, this course will introduce students to the history and the theory of documentary film practice. We'll watch some of the most widely acclaimed documentaries of all time, as well as some that are obscure and eccentric. **Note: this is not a course in film production.** Your work will involve analysis of different documentaries as opposed to actual film production.

COMM 383E: Layout & Design for Print Media*Marty Sundvall*

This course will explore the different computer technologies and software used in creating print media. Students will use programs such as Adobe In-Design, Quark XPress, Adobe Photoshop, Adobe Illustrator and basic web page design to bring their creative visions and course projects into printed reality. The course is geared for advertising, public relations and news editorial students.

*Completion of COMM 245 recommended***COMM 385: Communication Dysfunction—The Dark Side of Human Relationships***Don Turk*

Wouldn't you like to take a walk on the dark side for a semester? As we all know, relationships can be both heavenly and hellish. Most relational communication courses emphasize the positive and pleasant aspects of human interaction, while overlooking the darker side of relationships. Such an approach may give us a "warm, fuzzy" feeling about relationships, but it is an incomplete perspective. We may be baffled and confused when we encounter the less than healthy elements of human interaction. To fully understand how to effectively function in relationships requires that we consider how individuals (ourselves and others) perpetuate, participate in, and cope with social interaction that is difficult, problematic, challenging, disruptive, and distressing. "Communication dysfunction" will examine the less than healthy side of human relationship. Primary topics for the course will include: gossip, deception, serial conflict, verbal/emotional abuse, social ineptitude, infidelity, jealousy, sexual harassment, physical abuse, and stalking.

PREREQUISITE: COMM 205 or permission of instructor.**COMPUTER SCIENCE****CSCI 317A: Data Intelligence***Imad Rahal*

The new interdisciplinary field of Data Intelligence and Mining emerged in the early 1990s as a response to the profusion of digital data stored on various storage media in numerous applications areas such as biology, chemistry, astronomy, advertising, banking and finance, retail market, stock market, and the WWW, just to name a few. The nature of this field is entirely interdisciplinary attracting experts, researchers and interested audiences from Computer Science, Databases, Artificial Intelligence, Biology, Agriculture, Business, Mathematics, Statistics, and what have you, with the ultimate aim of extracting useful hidden nuggets of knowledge that can aid in decision-making processes and which would have remained unknown otherwise. Operating over huge volumes of data is one of the intrinsic idiosyncrasies of this young vibrant field.

The course will focus on the four pillars of the field, namely, Association Rule Mining, Classification, Clustering and Outlier Analysis. Students will learn state-of-the-art algorithms in those areas, understand the theory behind them, and observe some of their applications on real-life data sets drawn from numerous application areas. As any field still in its infancy, most important Data Mining resources are in the form of published research papers (in conferences, workshops, and journals); consequently, students will learn how to read and understand this form of resources and cope with its idiosyncrasies. Students will culminate their work in the course by developing intelligent systems capable of mining real-life data sets and by analyzing the results as to how they might aid in decision making.

CSCI 317B: Web Application Development Using Ruby on Rails

James Schnepf

More and more, computer applications are built on top of the web instead of as stand-alone applications. This course will use the Ruby programming language and the Rails framework to explore how to develop web applications. It will include an introduction to the Ruby programming language, an overview of the Rails framework and a study of the critical issues in developing web applications. It will be a seminar style course where the students will lead each other in an understanding of the requirements for rapid development of dynamic web applications.

CORE 360F: Spirituality & the Male Athlete

William Schipper

Cross-listed with GWST 360. See description under GWST 360

CORE - SENIOR SEMINARS

**** All Senior Seminar Courses are offered for Standard grading ****

CORE 390-01A: Poverty, Hunger & Moral Issues

Diane Veale-Jones 1-3-5 / 11:20-12:30 / CSB

Why is there poverty and hunger in the 21st Century? Who are the poor and hungry? Why are they poor and hungry? What is the impact of poverty and hunger on individuals, households, and nations?

Answers to these questions require us to examine the role of social, economic, political, and agricultural factors as causes of poverty and hunger, and to explore the ethical questions and dilemmas associated with poverty and hunger. What approaches to ending hunger have been successful? Why? Is it possible for an individual or small group to have an impact on ending hunger and poverty? If not, do we still have a moral obligation to try?

A small group service learning project is a requirement of the course.

CORE 390-02A: Experiential Roots of Ethics

Martin Andrews 2-4-6 / 9:40-10:50 / SJU

We will try not so much to arrive at ethical decisions as to ask "What are the sources of our ethical ideas?"

We will read such works as Robert Axelrod's *Evolution of Cooperation* (ethics are built into our genes), Nietzsche's *Genealogy of Morals* (ethics are a function of social position), Douglas's *Purity and Danger* (ethics depend on culture), Norma O. Brown's *Life Against Death* (ethics depend on early experience and the unconscious), C.S. Lewis's *Screwtape Letters* (God is the source of ethics) and Lao Tzu's *Way of Life* (a Taoist approach to ethics).

The class is discussion-based, and grades will be determined by written work and class participation.

CORE 390-03A: Truth & Lies in the Latin American Arts

Corey Shouse 2-4-6 / 9:40-10:50 / SJU

How do we understand the truthfulness of films and novels? Does history lie? What are the ethical responsibilities of artists and academics? What role do the arts play in memory and awareness of traumatic events and social issues? This course explores these questions as they relate to selected films, novels and historical monographs from three case study countries: Argentina, Guatemala and Colombia. The course will include general background information, contextual readings and theoretical essays to familiarize students with the selected case study countries and course content. All discussion, reading and coursework will be conducted in English.

CORE 390-04A: Cultural Criticism

Bruce Campbell 2-4-6 / 11:20-12:30 / SJU

Whether we're reading a book, watching television, going to the movies, attending a concert, visiting a museum or engaging in cultural criticism (!), we're involved in a process of negotiating and producing meaning, shaping and re-shaping how we perceive ourselves and others and the core values that hold society together (or pull it apart). There are a lot of differing opinions about what "culture" is, and about why we should bother to study it at all. Mass, popular, and "high" culture are value-laden categories that further complicate the matter. And different critical approaches to culture carry with them distinct ethical and political objectives. It's no wonder that "culture" has been called one of the most complicated words in the English language.

We will read and discuss a range of theories and methods of cultural analysis, and apply these to a variety of cultural forms (television, film,

visual art, advertising, music and literature), touching on themes including aesthetics, cultural representation, semiotics, and ideology. The goal of the course will be to develop the student's ability to critically evaluate the ethical implications of the cultural environment and their own relationship to it.

CORE 390-05A: Race & Socio-Economic Status: An America Still Divided

Phil Kramer 2-4-6 / 11:20-12:30 / CSB

This course will examine the effects race and socio-economic status have on the increasing gaps found in educational achievement, economic opportunity, political power, and identity in America. A number of theoretical and practical lenses will be used to examine the increasing differences and tensions between subgroups and the democratic and moral leadership issues and implications America's future leaders may expect and confront.

CORE 390-06A: Medical Ethics in the 21st Century

Henry Jakubowski 2-4-6 / 2:40-3:50 / CSB

New understandings of the molecular and cellular bases of life are leading to profound changes in the practice of medicine, from the use of stem cells to treat disease to new drugs that may make us smarter and stronger. We are all consumers in the health care system, and will have to make vital decisions about health care for ourselves, our families, and ultimately our society. Join in a discussion of medical ethics in the 21st century, as we explore ethical issues, especially those in neuroethics, involved in developing and using a health care system in the "post-genomic" era.

CORE 390-07A: Reading for Life

Anthony Cunningham Monday / 6-9 pm / SJU

Everyone loves a good story. Great stories can provide us with far more than mere recreation. Stories can provide us with rich character portraits that can reveal the subtleties and nuances of what it means to live well and responsibly. In this course we'll use novels and films to address Socrates' most basic ethical questions, "How should one live?" and "What sort of person should I be?" We'll do so by attending to all the concrete, particular details of real-life and fictional characters thoroughly embroiled in the "business of living." Reading well offers the possibility of vicarious experience and ultimately, ethical insight. The stated goal of the Senior Seminar Core requirement is to help students to develop the ability to make good moral judgments. This is a life-long process but hopefully some diligent, careful, thoughtful attention on our part this semester can help us hone the ability to think about Socrates' questions. Our readings may include some of the following: *The Crucible* (Arthur Miller), *Nobody's Fool* (Richard Russo), *The Remains of the Day* (Kazuo Ishiguro), *Beloved* (Toni Morrison), *Crossing to Safety* (Wallace Stegner), *Their Eyes Were Watching God* (Zora Neale Hurston) and *Cold Mountain* (Charles Frazier).

CORE 390-08A: Religion, Identity, and Conflict

Noreen Herzfeld Tuesday / 6:30-9:30 pm / SJU

In many recent conflicts the sides have been identified primarily through religious affiliation. But are these religious conflicts? And, if so, to what extent do the religious traditions involved affect both the cause and the means used in these conflicts? This course will address the role of religion and identity in recent conflicts in Northern Ireland, Bosnia, and the Middle East. Our focus will be on how religious tenets, values, and customs have shaped these conflicts. We will also continually ask how comprehensive the role of religion is in these conflicts. What is the role of religion in shaping personal or group identity and how do religious values affect our decisions in times of both war and peace? Does one's religious affiliation affect one's world view, even when one is no longer an active participant in that tradition? How can we reconcile religion with the acts committed in its name?

Core 390-09A: Expanding Awareness and Consciousness (without drugs!)

Leigh Dillard Tuesday / 6:30-9:30 pm / CSB

This course examines how our perception of reality, and ourselves, is determined by our belief-systems and how unaware we are of our own resulting biases and blind spots. The course explores different ways of thinking and knowing from a variety of perspectives (e.g., somatics, psychology, neuro-science, the arts) and includes an experiential component combining meditation, the Feldenkrais Method, creative movement and play as means for increasing self-awareness and altering belief-systems and perceptions of reality.

CORE 390-10A: Striking a Balance: Reassessing our Values and Priorities

Andreas Kiryakakis

Wednesdays / 6-9 pm / SJU

The goal and intention of the SJU/CSB senior seminar program is to develop an ability to lead responsible lives in a contemporary world and to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives. Do you think that this is possible? Isn't a bit late? Have you not been living in the "contemporary world" for the last two decades, and is your code of conduct not in accordance with the society in which you were brought up? Would you not agree that we have accepted a standard of behavior as part of our tradition? If so, has this standard eliminated hunger, war, and division of religion and nationality?

Similarly, discussions about aspects of moral philosophy remain controversial. The field abounds with theories concerning the proper conduct of one's life. Contending ideas, arguments and models range from Aristotle's view of the virtuous life to feminism and the ethics of care. Although the various theories often present very engaging and convincing arguments most tend to be rooted in disciplines like religion, politics, etiquette, economics, and law, among others. The result is that even knowledgeable philosophers will disagree about the various theories, and about fundamental ideas.

Where does that leave us in regard to the objectives of the CSB/SJU senior seminar? It is precisely that question that will be at the core of our analysis. It is the aim of the seminar to determine if a paradigm shift is necessary, and if it is possible to cultivate a capacity to combine rational and nonrational ways of knowing, and if it is possible to become comfortable with uncertainty.

Required reading includes: The Epic of Gilgamesh, Faust I, Siddhartha, The Little Prince, The Grand Inquisitor, Freedom from the Known, and selected essays dealing with recent discoveries of quantum physics and healing.

COURSES OF THE COLLEGE

COLG 130: EMT Basics

This course covers basic minimal emergency care required to work on an ambulance or first responder squad throughout the 50 states in the U.S. The course offers basic to more advanced techniques and principles of pre-hospital; emergency care. Students must be at least 18 years old to take the National and State Certification exams. .

ECONOMICS

ECON 329: Economics of Health Care

Joseph Friedrich

Emphasis on the application of economic reasoning to an understanding of the health care system of the United States. Evaluation of the changing nature of health care and its consequences for the medical professions and institutions. Analysis of public policy for provision and financing of health care.

PREREQUISITE: ECON 111

ECON 359D: Industrial Organization and Public Policy

William Wheatley

Theoretical and empirical investigation of industry structure and conduct as well as issues of location, information, pricing strategy, and advertising. Empirical and case studies of theories of firm organization. Exploration of topics such as network economics, technology adoption and technological standards, the value of innovation, and intellectual property.

PREREQUISITE: ECON 334

ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES

ENVR 200A: Environmental Art & Architecture

Richard Bresnahan

Cross-listed with ART 200

This course focuses on a range of issues addressing art, architecture and their relationship to a sustainable environment. Through an analysis of critical theory, students will gain an understanding of the language and critical issues of art, architecture and their impact upon the environment. Through a hands-on approach, students will apply these concepts to make ceramic artwork in the SJU Pottery studio. Students will critically analyze readings, discuss examples of art and architecture and meet with artists in order to expand their understanding of the relationship between art, architecture and the environment.

Grading: A-F only

ENVR 200B: Food, Gender, Globalization, and the Environment

Diane Veale Jones

This course will examine the environmental, economical, and social equity issues of food production, processing, distribution, consumption, and disposal. We explore the journey of food from the field to our table. To map successfully this journey we analyze women's and men's roles, historically and currently, in food production: determine global food supply and hunger trends: compare consumption patterns among countries: investigate the environmental impact of agricultural methods of food production: examine different approaches to food sustainability and environmental sustainability; and delve into the politics of food.

ENVR 300A: Introduction to Geographic Information Systems

Jean Lavigne

Geographic Information Systems are combinations of data management and mapping software that allow users (such as city and state governments) to organize, query, and map multiple forms of spatial data. Data can include road networks, lakes and streams, vegetation or soil types, land use, property ownership, zoning codes, elevations, census tract data, and so on. In this class, students will learn how these systems work and will produce a series of maps, some from existing data and others from new data collected during the course with global positioning systems (GPS). In order to do this successfully, students will learn spatial analysis techniques, some principles of cartography, and will consider the ethical and social justice implications of the use of GIS and GPS technologies.

ENVR 341: Natural History of Tropical Carbonate Ecosystems

Larry Davis

Cross-listed with BIOL 341 & GEOL 341. See course description under BIOL 341

GENDER & WOMEN'S STUDIES

GWST 290A: Men's Studies Research

Gar Kellom

In addition to men's studies content and research methodology, students participate in three ongoing research projects in the SJU men's center: a small group social norms study of masculinity, a social norms spirituality project, and an international men's stories project. Additional projects may be developed. Class time arranged with those enrolled. May be repeated.

GWST 360: Spirituality & the Male Athlete

William Schipper

Cross-listed with CORE 360F

This course will use the experience of the male athlete as the point of departure for a consideration of the interplay between male sexuality, masculine identity and spirituality, and the ways in which these might be better integrated. This course will examine concepts found in long-established and contemporary studies of spirituality, male sexuality, and masculinity. Of special interest will be the ways in which male sexuality, masculine identity and spirituality affect men's relationships with God, self and the other. Underlying this course is the assumption that the development of a personal spirituality will help one to be more attentive to the voice of God, more aware of the meaning of one's own existence, and better able to form communities founded on respect for individual persons.

GEOLOGY

GEOL 341: Natural History of Tropical Carbonate Ecosystems

Larry Davis

Cross-listed with BIOL 341 & ENVR 341. See course description under BIOL 341

HISTORY

HIST 300B: Civil Rights

William Green

This course will examine central topics that contributed to the development of civil rights for African Americans, the interrelationship between social custom and the social contract, and tension between race, ethnicity and class.

HIST 300H: From Books to Bytes

Theresa Vann

Books have served as a primary repository of human knowledge since their inception. Over the millennia, book technology has evolved from ancient papyrus scrolls to modern digital formats, proving the adaptability and longevity of the book form.

Using the collections and resources of the Hill Museum & Manuscript Library, this introductory course will examine the book both as an artifact and as an agent of cultural change. Students will learn the technology of the book; the innovations introduced by the book; and the book's impact on human culture on a global basis.

The goal of this course will be to provide an introductory vocabulary and a structure for students who wish to explore the history of books and printing from the ancient to modern world. The course will be organized around the following topics: the technology of the book; the book in ancient society, focusing on the development of writing and the alphabet; the classical book; the people of the book; the medieval book; printing; and the digital book.

HIST 300I: Human Rights in Latin America

Mary Strasma

This course examines the theme of human rights in Latin American history, with an emphasis on the period 1970 to the present. We will consider the development of the concepts of human rights, counterinsurgency, the national security state, drug wars, and economic rights. We will pay attention to the role of individuals, including activists, perpetrators and bystanders, and look at how some Latin American societies are dealing in the present with this difficult aspect of their history. Students will complete a research project on a specific case that interests them.

HIST 395: Historiography and Methods

Derek Larson

This course will explore the historiography of the American West, covering such topics as the impact of U.S. expansion on the environment and native peoples of the West, the realities of violence in "frontier" towns, the political and economic relationships between Eastern cities and their Western counterparts, and the evolution of the 20th century West into an overwhelmingly urban society in the midst of a sparsely populated hinterland. Special attention will be paid to historical debates over the "meaning of the West," the introduction of race, class, gender, and environment as themes in these debates, and the varying types of evidence historians have used to interpret the region's past. Readings will include Richard White's *It's Your Misfortune and None of My Own: A New History of the American West*, Stephen Ambrose's *Undaunted Courage*, several monographic treatments of Western issues, at least one western novel, and 8-10 Western movies screened outside of class.

HONORS

HONR 210A: Evolution of Scientific Thought

Clayton Gearhart

In this course we will study science in its historical context by examining two quite different "scientific revolutions", those associated with Copernicus and Einstein. The Copernican revolution resulted, by the time of Newton, in a complete reformulation of the principles of both physics and astronomy. The second revolution, associated with Einstein, is still taking place, and has drastically reshaped our notions of space, time, gravity, and matter. The course will examine these two scientific revolutions, and in the process will discuss in an historical context how science operates (the "scientific method"), and the nature of scientific development and change. We will also discuss the relation of science and the rest of society, and see, for example, that science has strong connections to such subjects as philosophy, literature, and religion. In this context we will examine the trial of Galileo in detail, and examine the importance of such "sciences" as astrology and alchemy and how they affected science and western thought generally.

Texts will include Thomas Kuhn's *Structure of Scientific Revolutions*, Stillman Drake's *Discoveries and Opinions of Galileo*, Richard Westfall's *Essays on the Trial of Galileo*, and Dennis Overbye's, biography of Einstein, *Einstein in Love: A Scientific Romance*. Course requirements will emphasize the importance of good writing, and will include papers, essay midsemester and final exams (open book), occasional reports, and a laboratory.

HONR 220B: Introduction to Human Communication

Karyl Daughters

This course provides students with a general overview of the communication theory and research, particularly as it relates to their everyday interactions. Topics may include theories of communication on meaning, language, perception, nonverbal cues, gender, relationships, self-disclosure, conflict, listening persuasion, groups, organizations, and cultures. This course counts towards the communication major/minor as COMM 105.

HONR 240A: The Development of the Christian Tradition

Vincent Smiles

An introduction to the discipline of Christian theology with a substantial focus on select themes and texts of the scriptures. Attention is also given to the method of theological study and to the development of the Christian tradition since Biblical times. Students will be introduced to the Biblical languages, especially Hebrew, and will learn to think critically both about the Bible and about modern theological controversies.

HONR 250E: Great Poets for Life

Mark Thamert

This honors course will feature such great world poets as Jalauddin Rumi, Pablo Neruda, Rainer Maria Rilke, Shakespeare and the Poet of the Book of Job as well as modern classic poems by writers like Sekou Sundiata, Li Ch'ing-chao, Michael Ondaatje, Margaret Atwood, Claribel Aleegna and Carolyn Forché. In many cases, classical and modern musical compositions which feature these authors' poems will be played and discussed in class for the purpose of refining students ability to understand and interpret poetic texts. Students will be asked to learn by heart several of their favorite poems or parts of poems which ring most profoundly for them, for, as poet Molly Peacock writes, "Each time any of us reads a favorite poem, it conjures up a special sorcery of second sight and third and fourth, until understanding is so profound that we are returned to a state before we even had language... That is why it is so hard to say exactly what a poem means. Yet how rare – and thrilling – to be struck dumb in the all too articulate world." The purpose of this course is to allow students not only to explore and to understand, but also to be struck dumb in the face of some of the world's greatest poetry. Students intending to take the Great Books course their junior year will find this course a helpful preparation. Questions about this course can be addressed to mthamert@csbsju.edu.

HONR 250F: Philosophy of Religion

Dennis Beach

One of the difficulties of attaining and maintaining a belief in God is the question of why the world God made is as it is, why individuals and peoples meet the fates that they do. This question arises especially in the face of personal or public disasters: Why has God done this to me? To us? Passionate thinkers have wrestled with this question throughout the ages, hoping either to justify the ways of God to humankind, or to justify their own rejection of belief in a God who cares for us mortals. We will read literature and philosophy from the Book of Job, Saints Augustine and Thomas Aquinas, Milton's dramatic poetry, Leibniz's Theodicy and Dostoevsky's "The Grand Inquisitor," ending with contemporary reflections that struggle with the problem of evil in a world created and ordered by a God we want to be good.

HONR 270B: Math Exploration: Paradox and Manipulations in the Mathematical Theory of Voting

On the day of an election, one often hears political commentators say things such as "the voters have spoken," or "we can finally find out how the voters feel about the candidates and the issues." Such statements presume that there is only one way to interpret the collection of all votes. Unfortunately, the underlying mathematics of analyzing voting profiles is surprisingly complex and "chaotic" when there are at least three candidates (alternatives) to choose from. In the U.S. the political and media institutions encourage a dualistic kind of thinking with regard to election results. There are only Republicans and Democrats, liberals and conservatives, or in mathematical terms an alternative A and its complement A^c.

Starting in the 1950s, economists, political scientists and mathematicians started to look at voting "profiles" as dynamical systems once three or more alternatives are allowed to be factored into the final interpretation of the results. The economist Kenneth Arrow was eventually given a Nobel Prize for his famous Impossibility Theorem related to all attempts to find a single set of "reasonable" fairness criteria for determining a truly "democratic" voting system. Building on Arrow's work, the mathe-

maticians Allan Gibbard and Mark Satterthwaite proved a theorem in the 1970s that essentially says that there is no "reasonable" voting system with three or more alternatives that is non-manipulable, i.e. voters will always have an opportunity to benefit themselves by submitting a disingenuous ballot.

In the ensuing decades a number of theorems of striking mathematical naturality have been proven about manipulability of voting systems and how the paradoxes from Arrow's work might be neutralized. In both cases, methods have been developed to trade some desirable traits of voting systems for a minimalization of their bad paradoxes and manipulability of the system by individual voters.

Political scientists and economists have applied these results to make some controversial and surprising conclusions. For example, some political scientists question whether Abraham Lincoln should have been declared the winner of the 1860 presidential election based upon the voting profiles involving four major candidates. Others question whether the current method (a variation of the Hare Method) used by the Olympic Committee to determine the future sites of the Olympic Games is a "fair method" or instead favors a certain subset of countries.

This course will look at some of the theorems in the mathematical theory of voting over the last fifty years, especially their ramifications according to current philosophers, economists and political scientists. Opportunities will be given to create one's own voting systems to weight which fairness criterions have been satisfied and the extent to which the system can be manipulated by a disingenuous voter. No prior knowledge of calculus or even pre-calculus is required or needed. This then is not a heavy duty mathematics course. Anyone with an open mind willing and not afraid to explore some mathematical concepts not normally encountered in high school or undergraduate college curriculums are encouraged to sign up for this course.

This course will also satisfy the Core Mathematics requirement.

HONR 311: Great Books/Great Ideas

Scott Richardson

This is a year-long discussion based seminar that concentrates on some of the world's greatest works of literature, philosophy, and intellectual history. Authors may include Augustine, Euripides, Austen, Thoreau, Biblical writers, Camus, Dostoevsky, Tolstoy, Eliot, Faulkner, Pynchon, Freud, Homer, Kafka, Flaubert, Melville, Dinesen, Flannery O'Connor, Plato, Nabokov, Shakespeare, Cervantes, Virginia Woolf, and others. Preference will be given to Junior and Senior honors students who will complete the entire year. Registration is by permission of the instructor only. All students in this course purchase a personal library consisting of roughly 100 books, and students are required to read a number of works during the summer.

HONR 340F: The Reality of God

John Merkle

This course is Cross-listed with HONR 350F

A study of the meaning of the existence, nature, attributes, revelation and presence of God according to the biblical traditions, with particular attention to the question of the grounds for monotheistic faith and Trinitarian doctrine.

HONR 350F: The Reality of God

John Merkle

This course is Cross-listed with HONR 340F. See description under HONR 340F

MANAGEMENT

MGMT 304: Entrepreneurship

Paul Marsnik

All students admitted to the course will spend significant time (in and out of class) working on a real new venture project. Many different things can qualify as a new venture project. During the semester, a new venture project could be at any one of three phases: 1. Planning for a new venture to be launched in the future, 2. Launching a new venture, or 3. Running a new venture that has recently been launched.

About half of the class time will be devoted to working on new venture projects. The other half of class time will be spent covering topics such as: theories of entrepreneurship, entrepreneurial strategy, entrepreneurial finance, marketing for entrepreneurs, human resource issues in start-up ventures, and new venture operations.

MGMT 305A: Personal Finance

Mark Asuzu

The course introduces the student to the concepts, tools, and applications of personal finance and investments. It shows the student how to take the first step towards understanding the process of financial planning and the logic that drives it. Special attention will be paid to cash or liquid asset management, the use of open credit, consumer loans, insurance, investment management, automobile and housing purchase and financing.

PREREQUISITE: None. Open to all majors.

MODERN AND CLASSICAL LANGUAGES

FREN 351: Topics in Literature: Moliere

Charles Villette

We will study in depth comedies of Molière, "le Peintre des Moeurs." Comedy, perhaps tragedy, Molière paints "d'après nature". The comedy is a careful and satiric study of human nature.

PEACE STUDIES

PCST 399: Is Peace Possible?

Kelly Kraemer

Are human beings naturally violent and warlike, or do we have the potential for peace? John Lennon once said, "If everyone demanded peace instead of another television set, then there'd be peace." Maybe it's not quite that simple, but is peace possible? If it is, how might we achieve it, and what roles can individuals play in the process? This course is designed to help senior peace studies majors and minors search for and evaluate answers to these and related questions by examining theories and evidence from a variety of fields (including, but not limited to: peace studies, anthropology, psychology, history, sociology, biology, and futures studies), with a view to integrating their four year academic experience.

Preference given to senior Peace Studies majors & minors

PSYCHOLOGY

PSYC 393: Senior Psychology Seminar

Bob Kachelski

This seminar will focus on what Daniel Schacter calls the "seven sins" of memory: transience, absent-mindedness, blocking, misattribution, suggestibility, bias and persistence. In this reading-intensive discussion-based course, we will review the research on these phenomena, including proposed causes, the impact on people's everyday lives, and efforts designed to improve memory. In addition, we will examine the pivotal role that memory plays in criminal proceedings, some psychological disorders, and the development and maintenance of a sense of self. Questions addressed will include, "Why can't I remember people's names?" "Are children more suggestible than adults?" and "Are there really people with memory problems like that guy in Memento?" Students will write a major paper and present it to the group; they will also lead discussions and complete frequent short writing assignments.

THEOLOGY

THEO 339B: Spiritual Companionship

Marian Diaz

This course will introduce participants to the ministry of spiritual companionship. They will explore the growing need for "soul friends" in contemporary life and consider the various contexts for cultivating spiritual community: one-to-one, small groups, marriage, family life, place of worship, and the workplace. Participants will apply companionship skills to their own lives through course assignments and class activities such as role-plays, discussion of case studies, and reflection on personal experiences.

THEO 395: Advanced Seminar in Theology: God & the World

John Merkle

In this seminar all participants will read and discuss writings by the most influential theologians in the Christian tradition on the nature and existence of God and on God's relationship to the world. Each student will also do a research project on a chosen theological theme. The project may involve a comparison of theological perspectives from the Christian, Jewish, and Islamic traditions.

PREREQUISITE: THEO 180, 200, 201 & 202

NOTE: This course is restricted to theology majors & minors.

SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

HHTH 468-01A: Celtic Monasticism

Mary Forman

Cross-listed with MONS 468-01A

The Lives of Saints Brigit, Brendan, Columba and Columbanus are a small part of the traditions that comprise the beginnings of Celtic monasticism, from its origins in Ireland to its spread on the continent. The course will examine the documents, culture, history and theology of such works as the penitentials, *vitae*, Irish Biblical Apocrypha, rules, the Stowe Missal, and the Book of Kells among others. The study of famous Celtic monasteries like Iona, Bangor, Luxeuil and St. Gall will reveal that the monks not only produced fine manuscripts, but also greatly facilitated education, encouraged practices of prayer and enhanced pilgrimages as a way of Christian devotion.

HHTH 468-02A: Liturgy & the Church

Mary Collins

Cross-listed with LTGY 468-01A

The course will explore the dynamic relationship between worshipping communities and the Church's liturgical books. Official liturgy intends to shape the self-understanding and faith of the Church universal. Local churches, in engaging in acts of liturgical worship, claim and deepen their ecclesial identity. Attention will be given to historical and contemporary praxis.

LTGY 468-01A: Liturgy & the Church

Mary Collins

Cross-listed with HHTH 468-02A. See description above.

MONS 468-01A: Celtic Monasticism

Mary Forman

Cross-listed with HHTH 468-01A. See description above.

SSNT 468: A Catholic Reading of Scripture

Charles Bobertz

This course will provide an overview of how the bible has been interpreted within the Catholic Church from its beginning until the present day. Topics will include the formation of the Christian canon of Scripture and the exclusion of the "other" gospels, spiritual and allegorical interpretation in the early and medieval church and the impact of the Enlightenment and Reformation on Catholic interpretation. Special attention will be given to the rise of modern biblical scholarship and its impact on the Church's understanding of the bible. Topics covered here will include the origin of literalist and fundamentalist interpretations of scripture, the Catholic Church's initial resistance and then embrace of modern critical method and the current dialogue between literalist and non-literalist readers of scripture within the Catholic Church. The course will conclude with an exploration of a liturgically centered interpretation of scripture.

STUDY ABROAD COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

General:

MGMT 389: SA Experiential Learning

Wendy Klepetar & Virginia Arthur

This course is designed for students participating in Study Abroad. Reading relevant to understanding business in the international environment will be assigned. Students will write a series of essays integrating their knowledge of theory with their personal observations and reactions. Particular emphasis will be placed on the impact of culture on business. The course will be taught by a professor at CSB/SJU using distance learning to maintain contact with students located in a variety of countries.

CORE CURRICULUM REQUIREMENTS

The purpose of the Core Curriculum is to provide students with a foundation and the intellectual tools necessary to examine the fundamental, recurring questions about ourselves and our world. These questions challenge students to broaden their interests and explore a variety of academic areas. Striving to ask those questions well and make good moral and ethical judgments about them is at the heart of our colleges' mission.

The Core Curriculum is composed of four levels of requirements:

1. Proficiency-based requirements

Foreign language proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in speaking or reading a classical or modern language through satisfactory completion of the language proficiency exam or through satisfactory completion of Modern/Classical Language 211 (with any passing grade).

Mathematics Proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in elementary algebra and geometry through satisfactory completion of the mathematics proficiency exam or calculus readiness exam.

First Year Students beginning Fall 2001 must complete the Fine Arts Experience requirement by attending 8 designated Fine Arts Experience Events—four events per semester.

2. Cross-Disciplinary courses

First-Year Symposium (2 courses)-- CORE 100 & 101, or HONR 100 & 101

Senior Seminar--CORE 390, or HONR 390 only. Education majors can complete EDUC 390 and SWRK majors can complete SWRK 390. Ordinarily completed during Senior year. Cannot be repeated for credit. Both semesters of First-Year Symposium must already be completed.

3. Disciplinary courses

Only courses which are designated within the course title by the appropriate symbol (FA, HML, MT, JC, etc) may be used to complete the following disciplinary requirements.

FA	(4 credits)	Must be from courses that are designated as fulfilling Fine Arts
HML	(2 courses)	Must be from different departments or disciplines (ex. Not two literature courses even if they are from different department)
TH	(1 course)	Must be 100 level theology course.
HMU	(1 course)	Must be from the same discipline as one HML or TH already completed. Cross listed courses only fulfill either the HMU or the JC, but not both disciplinary requirements.
JC	(1 course)	May be satisfied only after the TH and one HML course is completed. Cross listed courses only fulfill either the HMU or the JC, but not both disciplinary requirements.
MT	(1 course)	Must have satisfied the Math Proficiency before the completion of the course.
NS	(2 courses)	Must be from different departments (unless NATS, COLG, HONR or ENVR).
SSL	(1 course)	Must be 100 level.
SSU	(1 course)	Must have completed the SSL course first.

4. Flagged courses

Courses may carry 1 or more flags, in addition to meeting Core disciplinary or Major requirements. Flagged courses are specific to the instructor and term. Flagged courses are listed in the Class Schedule and updated lists are posted at the Office of the Registrar.

GEOL 211: Physical Geology (NS), 4 credits

Geology is the study of the composition of the Earth and its dynamic systems. One system, using solar and gravitational energy, involves the processes of weathering, erosion and deposition of sediments by the atmosphere, wind, rivers, ground water and glaciers. The other system, using internal energy of the Earth, is tectonic. This involves movement of material in the Earth's interior resulting in plate movement which creates and destroys the crust and results in volcanism, earthquakes and mountain-building. Laboratory and field trips required.

GEOL 214: Paleobiology of Dinosauria (NS), 4 credits

An introduction to textual analysis in the context of the cultural histories and social issues of the Spanish-speaking world. The student will study a variety of texts, including a range of literary genres and film, with a unifying theme to be determined by the instructor. The course also reviews language structures to enhance reading, writing, and speaking skills, serving as a bridge between 111-211 and the more advanced courses in language, literature and culture. The student will learn about internship opportunities and study abroad in Central America and Spain. This course fulfills a core HML requirement.
