Integrations Curriculum Update

Change to Speak Video Requirement

An email was sent by AcademicAffairs@csbsju.edu on 2/21 announcing that effective immediately, spring semester 2024, videos are no longer required artifacts for Speak 1 and Speak 2 learning outcomes. Instead, artifacts that students submit for their Speak 1 and 2 learning outcomes may be other evidence of the completed speech (e.g., speech outline, slide deck, speech evaluation). Instructors are still free to require video recordings for instructional purposes, but video files will no longer need to be uploaded to or stored in Canvas or Folio.

Instructors are still expected to assess the Speak 1 (in CI courses) and Speak 2 (in INTG 300) learning outcomes using the associated rubrics in Canvas and students should still be instructed to submit their speak artifact to Folio. Integrations Curriculum Assessment Procedure Updates

Spring, 2024

1. Effective immediately spring semester 2024, **videos are no longer required artifacts for Speak 1 and Speak 2 learning outcomes**. Instead, artifacts that students submit for their Speak 1 and 2 learning outcomes may be other evidence of the completed speech (e.g., speech outline, slide deck, speech evaluation). Instructors are still free to require video recordings for instructional purposes, but video files will no longer need to be uploaded to or stored in Canvas or Folio.

This change is in response to faculty feedback about the technical challenges of creating individual videos, limitations of Folio and related privacy concerns, and now having a better understanding of how students are accessing and reflecting on their artifacts in INTG 300.

Instructors are still expected to assess the speak 1 (in CI courses) and speak 2 (in INTG 300) learning outcomes using the associated rubrics in Canvas and students should still be instructed to submit their speak artifact to Folio. Instructors are not responsible for confirming whether students have uploaded the artifact to Folio.

The Office of Assessment will coordinate all reliability and validity testing of assessment of the "speak" learning goal. This process will be completed by assessment and IT staff, and will not require any effort or recording by faculty or students. As part of this process, sections of CI and INTG 300 courses will be randomly selected for IT to video record student speaking assignments. If your section is randomly selected, IT and the Office of Assessment will contact you in advance to arrange the time and location. Reliability and validity testing of Speak learning outcome assessment will happen on a rotating bases in accordance with the IC assessment schedule.

- 2. **Reminder**: Other important changes were made to embedded assessment in January, 2024. These updates were communicated previously and are summarized here.
 - 1. There is now flexibility in the use of all DEAL reflections versus other written assignment: You may now choose between:
 - a. the DEAL reflection prompt as written,
 - b. modifying the DEAL prompt, OR
 - c. another assignment (paper, project, reflection, etc.)

Whichever you choose, **ensure the artifact/DEAL is assessed in Canvas using the correct rubric.** Please also see the Resources for Embedded Assessment, and the FAQs for Embedded Assessment documents.

- 2. *Procedure Change*: Students should now directly submit their artifacts in the Canvas Course Assignment (*instead of* submitting a Folio link).
 - Students will continue to submit artifacts to Folio for use in INTG 300, but will submit the documents directly into your Canvas Course Assignment for Embedded Assessment.
 - b. This change is based on feedback received from faculty because it:
 - i. Enables the professor to use Speed Grader,
 - ii. Avoids the challenges of non-functional Folio links, and
 - iii. Reduces the number of steps for students and faculty.
- 3. Info Lit 1 and Info Lit 2 are now assessed with artifacts only (no DEAL reflections required). There are revised rubrics for Info Lit 1 and Info Lit 2 Canvas assignments.
- 4. Revisions have been made to several DEAL prompts and rubrics.
 - a. Please update your Canvas assignments to use the most recent rubrics (see Table of Revisions for the complete list of changes – also included on the next page of this document).
 - b. **Courses affected**: INTG 100 (LF), INTG 300 (LI), Cultural and Social Difference: Identity (CI), Theological Integrations (TI), Thematic Focus (JF, MF, TF), Artistic Engagement (AR), Experiential Engagement (EX), Global Engagement (GL), and Quantitative Reasoning (QR)

All these changes were made to the IC Faculty Resources Canvas page and all rubrics were updated in Canvas as of 4:55pm on Friday, January 12th.





Held in 2024 at the College of Saint Benedict, the Benedictine Pedagogy Conference (BPC) invites proposals for conference presentations, centered on Benedictine pedagogy and practices in a higher education setting.

The Benedictine Pedagogy Conference is a conference of the <u>Association of Benedictine Colleges and Universities (ABCU)</u>. The BPC provides a venue for faculty, student life personnel, staff, and administrators to share ideas and practices by which they have successfully integrated the Benedictine Hallmarks into the classroom, student life and collegiate environment. For context, see the foundational ABCU presentation of these Hallmarks here: <u>The Ten Hallmarks of Benedictine Education</u>.

The 2024 Benedictine Pedagogy Conference will meet jointly with the annual ABCU meeting. The BPC will hold its own panels while the ABCU hosts its Leadership Formation Institute and its annual meeting for monastic superiors and college presidents. All participants will be invited to joint sessions with keynote and guest speakers as well as social and liturgical events during the conference. BPC participants are also welcome to attend concurrent sessions of the Leadership Institute portion of the conference if they choose.

CALL FOR PRESENTATIONS

The strongest proposals make explicit connection to the Rule of Benedict, Benedictine pedagogy, and/or the ABCU's Ten Hallmarks of Benedictine Education. Individual presentation proposals should include a title and consist of a roughly **350-word abstract**. Please use link to form below to submit a proposal.

Format and Theme of Presentations

Presentations are scheduled in **40-minute time slots**, including discussion or Q&A; each will be paired with one other presentation in a 90-minute session during the conference.

Proposals are welcome from all academic disciplines, including applied perspectives in higher education administration.

Possible topics may include but are not limited to:

- Delivering and assessing the integration of the Benedictine Hallmarks within coursework, including teaching, assessment and curriculum planning
- Engaging the Benedictine Hallmarks in academic advising and student support
- Delivering an understanding of the Benedictine Hallmarks in various pedagogical contexts (ie: distance learning, experiential learning, service learning, faculty and staff development)
- Benedictine approaches to current pedagogical research trends in higher education (universal design, inclusive teaching and learning, hybrid pedagogy, etc.)
- Infusing the Hallmarks in athletics, co-curricular and residence life
- Orienting new faculty and staff to the Benedictine tradition and the Hallmarks
- Appealing to an education in wisdom, the "love of learning and the desire for God" amid the overt demands of specialization.
- Exploring the implications of Catholic Social Teaching and its interface with the Benedictine tradition and Hallmarks
- Exploring Benedictine hospitality vis-à-vis institutional commitment to diversity, equity, inclusion and justice
- Engaging the Benedictine Hallmarks (ie: hospitality) for particular populations (international students, LGBTQ+, non-traditional students)
- Engaging Benedictine Hallmarks in alumni relations and community relations
- Exploring Benedictine stability and stewardship vis-à-vis institutional commitment to environmental justice
- Exploring Benedictine practices, liturgy and ritual and its impact on pedagogy




