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# REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

# APRIL 3<sup>rd</sup> - April 26<sup>th</sup>, 2001 FALL 2001

All currently-registered students who expect to return to CSB/SJU this Fall must complete advance registration by April 26<sup>th</sup>. Please follow these instructions carefully, for proper registration is your responsibility. If you have any questions about registration, call the Registrar's Office at 5260 (CSB) or 3396 (SJU).

#### STUDENTS ARE ELIGIBLE TO REGISTER ONLY IF THEY HAVE:

- 1. Met with their advisor and obtain their Label with Registration PIN #
- 2. Settled all current charges with the Student Accounts Office
- Been accepted by a department (unless they are a firstyear student)
- 4. Complied with Minnesota immunization regulations
- 5. Have an active Network account

We strongly urge you to meet with your advisor early and enter your registration on WEBSTER on the date listed on your PIN Label. Registration is on-line, and delaying your registration will affect course selection.

Students who are ineligible to register for any of these reasons may register on WEBSTER after they have cleared all registration holds.

Please note that registration for ILP's (Individualized Learning Projects) and for special programs (Tri-College Exchange, Internships, etc.) requires your submission of special forms available from the Registrar's Office. Registration for Internships (8 credits or more) are due the first day of classes.

#### REGISTRATION ADJUSTMENTS

Registration adjustments (Drop/Add) can be done on WEBSTER through Sept. 3<sup>rd</sup>. You will need your Registration PIN# that you received from your Advisor. After this date students can come to the Registrar's Office at SJU, Quad 161 or at CSB, Academic Services Building, 208.

Listings of canceled or closed courses will be electronically updated on the Class Schedule Information on WEBSTER. Students should use WEBSTER to check whether a space has become available in a course that was previously closed. Courses may be added through the first 4 class days of the semester.

If a course is closed, check whether there are any other sections of the same course which have spaces available in them and register for an alternate section. If this option is not available to you, consider alternate courses and select among these and register accordingly. Your advisor is a good resource to help determine an appropriate alternate. In some cases, it may be appropriate for the department chair or instructor to "override" a student beyond the course limit. Override registrations are completed by the student presenting a signed (department chair or instructor, as appropriate) Drop/Add card to the Registrar's Office.

We also ask that you use the "Request for Additional Course Spaces" menu item on WEBSTER registration to report a course that you wished to take but were unable to enroll in any section of. Your reporting this will help the colleges plan for possible limit changes or additional sections of the course-both for this semester and for future semesters. Please do not report a course if you were able to register for an alternate section of the same course. This request DOES NOT place you on a waiting list for the course.

#### REGISTRATION PRIORITY AND COURSE SELECTION

Registration priority is based first on class standing, then on the last four digits of your Social Security Number. Students who are studying abroad are given priority within their class. Seniors are assigned courses first, then juniors, sophomores and first-year students. For Fall Semester registration, the lowest (0000) four digits have the highest priority. You are encouraged to keep these priorities in mind when you develop your course requests. WEBSTER will immediately respond to your course selection by indicating Enrolled or Closed.

#### **DROP/ADD on WEBSTER**

If you would like to drop and add courses for Fall Term 2001 you may do this through WEBSTER until September 3<sup>rd</sup>. Please keep your Registration PIN #, you will need this to Drop/Add on WEBSTER. After this date you will need to drop and add courses in the Registrar's Office.

#### **OBTAINING A NETWORK ACCOUNT**

All students must have a NETWORK account to use WEBSTER from the Network PC's on campus. Most of you will already have an account, which you may use for many other functions besides course registration. If you do not have a Network account--or have forgotten your password or how to sign on--please follow these simple steps to obtain your Network account:

Step #1: Go the Computing Center at SJU, Quad 084, from 8:30 am - 4:30 pm

Step #2: Identify yourself as needing a Network account.

Step #3: Activate your account on one of the PC's in the computing center

PROBLEMS -- Discussed below are some common problems we expect some of you may encounter, and how you may solve them.

#### Your PIN # doesn't work.

**Solution:** Re-check your label and carefully re-enter the PIN #. You may have to Exit WEBSTER completely and logon again. **YOUR PIN# for registration is** not the same as your WSC (Webster Security Code) that you use to access Student Information on WEBSTER Please note: the PIN # is not displayed (for security reasons) as you enter it on the computer.

#### You lost your PIN #.

**Solution:** Contact your Advisor to get your Pin Number again, or bring your Advisor's signature to the Registrar's Office. (PIN #'s cannot be obtained in the Computer Access Areas )

#### • You entered the wrong Call #.

**Solution:** WEBSTER allows you to make changes to your registration. See the section on changing your fall registration in the "Instructions for using WEBSTER". You may make changes on WEBSTER through September 3<sup>rd</sup>.

#### While using WEBSTER it displays: "This session for your Login has expired".

Solution: WEBSTER is programmed to Log off of the Registration Screen if you leave the screen idle for more than 2 minutes. Should this happen simply sign on again. To do so, click on WEBSTER and then click on the Fall Registration icon and start over.

#### . WEBSTER shows the status of a course as 'open' but it will not permit you to register for the course.

**Solution:** You may not meet the prerequisites or quota restrictions for that course. Check the notes in the class schedule under that course or contact the Registrar's Office.

#### **ESSENTIAL INFORMATION**

#### **ACADEMIC ADVISING**

After receiving this Class Schedule booklet, visit your academic advisor to arrange a program of classes for next term, and have him or her place your PIN label on the Class Request Worksheet located on the back page of your Fall 2001 Class Schedule Booklet.

If you intend to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. Overloads may be attempted only by students in good academic standing, and overloads of 21 or more credits require the student to see the Academic Advising Office.

#### **AUDITING**

Students intending to audit a course (earn no credit) should indicate their intent when registering for the course, or complete a Drop/Add card and file it with the Registrar during the first week of class. Auditors are expected to attend all regular classes, but they are not required to take final exams. A student who first registers for credit may change to auditor status any time during the first month of class. A student who first enrolls for auditor status may change to credit status only during the first week of class. Courses audited are not included in determining the total credits earned; however, the credit value of any course audited is computed in the assessment of tuition.

#### **ADDING A CLASS**

**Monday, September 3**<sup>rd</sup> is the last day you may ADD a full-term course to your program, unless the course's first meeting is scheduled after September 3<sup>rd</sup>. No student may enroll for a full-term course after the second scheduled meeting without the instructor's consent.

#### **DROPPING A CLASS**

- Sept. 3<sup>rd</sup> Last day to Add a full term course to your schedule
- Sept. 21st Last day to receive a permanent drop on your schedule
- Nov. 14<sup>th</sup> Last day to receive a "W" on your transcript. If you withdraw after this date, your instructor will assign you an "F" at the end of the semester.

For courses scheduled for less than a full term, withdrawal during the first third of the course will result in no record entry; during the second third, a W entry; during the final third, a failure.

#### **EXEMPTION/SUBSTITUTION**

In exceptional circumstances students may petition for exemption from specific academic regulations. Forms for requesting an exemption are available from the Registrar's Office. Students should first consult with their academic advisor, whose signature on the exemption form represents a recommendation that the request be considered favorably by the approving official. Department chairs are the approving officials for exemptions from requirements within majors and minors. Exemptions from academic regulations beyond major and minor fields require the approval of the academic dean of the student's college. Requests for these non-departmental exemptions should be directed to the Academic Advising Offices. The guiding principle in considering requests for any exemption is fidelity to the academic standards of the colleges.

#### INDIVIDUAL LEARNING PROJECTS

The guidelines and application forms for Individual Learning Projects, sometimes called Independent Study, are available in the Registrar's Office. If you are planning an ILP for Fall term, please consult these guidelines. Remember, only 4 credits of ILP per term are allowed. You may indicate your intent to register for an ILP by requesting DNA 371-01A, Call #10364 on WEBSTER.

#### POLICY ON INCOMPLETE GRADE

The policy concerning the temporary grade Incomplete (I) includes the following points:

When circumstances warrant, instructors may allow some delay in the completion of course work. Such extensions shall not extend beyond the close of the following regular (fall or spring) semester, and earlier limits may be set at the discretion of the instructor.

The instructor must report on the official grade roster the grade "I" **followed** by the approximate grade the student will receive if the course work is not complete by the end of the following semester (e.g., IF, or IC, or IB). That grade will be used in the computation of grade point averages until the Incomplete is removed.

If by the end of the following semester the instructor reports a single final grade to the Registrar, that grade will replace the I/GRADE, the Incomplete will be removed, and averages recomputed accordingly. Otherwise the provisional grade which was assigned with the "I" will become a permanent part of the transcript.

Exceptions to the above may be granted only by the written permission of the appropriate Academic Dean. Such exceptions will ordinarily be granted only in cases of medical disability or problems of comparable seriousness.

Degree candidates are cautioned that failure to have all degree requirements satisfied (including removal of Incomplete grades in courses needed for graduation) by the reasonable dates set by the Registrar will necessarily result in postponement of their graduation.

#### **INTERNSHIPS**

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an Internship for 8 or more credits during the Summer or Spring of 2002 must enroll in the Pre-Internship Seminar. The September Pre-Internship Seminar--open to juniors and seniors only--meets during A mod, 8:00 am at SJU, or 2:40 pm at CSB. The Pre-Internship Seminar is for no credit. If you wish to sign up for the seminar or if you have questions about other options, contact the Internship Office, Academic Services Building, phone 5799. ALL STUDENTS ARE REQUIRED TO ATTEND TWO ADDITIONAL

SESSIONS: 1) LEGAL ISSUES OF INTERNSHIPS AND 2) REGISTRATION AND REQUIREMENTS. CHECK WITH THE INTERNSHIP OFFICE FOR EXACT DATES. The last day to register for a Fall Internship is September 3<sup>rd</sup>. You may indicate your intent to register for an Internship by requesting DNA 397-01A, Call #10365 through WEBSTER.

#### **SUMMER INTERNSHIPS**

All Internships which take place during the summer must be registered under the Summer term, rather than under either the preceding Spring semester or the following Fall semester. This policy will be strictly enforced for the 2001 Summer.

The last day to register for a Summer Internship is Friday, May 25<sup>th</sup>. **Registration after this date requires approval of the Academic Dean.** You must have taken the Pre-internship seminar. If you have not done so contact Julie Christle, phone 5799 for information on alternative meetings.

Please contact Jill Farry, Director of Internships (Academic Services Center, Phone 5799), for information regarding special tuition structures for Summer Internships.

#### **MODULAR SCHEDULING**

Some departments offer courses of less than a full term's length; these courses begin and end according to the following dates and are called Modules, or "Mods". Each Mod is nine regular teaching periods and will be listed by the codes below in the Official Class Schedule:

#### **ON TRACK**

Advisors will have access to their advisees' **On Track** advising aid through WEB for Faculty or the BARRY Advising System. Please make an appointment to meet with your advisor early to review your academic progress and select your Fall coursework. Remember, all students **MUST** see their advisor to receive their WEBSTER Registration PIN # Label.

#### **OVERLOAD**

If you plan to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. Overload tuition fees is estimated at \$500.00 per credit over 18. Students whose cumulative grade point average is below 2.00 may not register for an overload. Students in good academic standing (GPA above 2.00) may register for a maximum of 2 overload credits (20 credits overall) without permission. Credit totals of 21 or more require the student to see the Academic Advising Office. The WEBSTER registration system will not allow more than 20 credits.

#### REPEATING A COURSE

A course which has been failed may be repeated for credit. Courses which have been passed may not be repeated for credit. They may, however, be repeated for additional honor points. The original grade is not removed when the course is repeated and credit for a course can be earned only once. The higher grade is computed in the GPA. If you are registering for a course which you are repeating you **MUST** notify the Registrar's Office.

#### STUDENT TEACHING

Students registering for student teaching (EDUC 361, 362, 363) in their 9<sup>th</sup> (or greater) semester as a full-time student at CSB/SJU will be billed at ½ the regular tuition rate for that semester. These students will also not be charged the student activity fee, technology fee, and campus center fee for that semester. Institutional gift aid (scholarships/grants) will not be available to these students.

#### STUDY ABROAD

CSB and SJU offer a number of group overseas study programs. Students who plan to enroll in one of these programs should contact the International Studies Office, New Science Center 108, 110, 112 or 114, at SJU. Students who are considering enrolling in coursework offered abroad by another institution should contact the International Education Office or the Registrar's Office, for information on transfer of credits. Consortium Study Abroad Registration will include a \$175.00 fee for all students who register for SA 372, Consortium/External Study Abroad.

#### S/U REGISTRATION

Arrangements for this non-honor point grading option should be made with your professor at the **beginning** of the course. Remember that undergraduates are limited in the number and types of courses they may take for the grade S (Satisfactory). See the Catalog for specific rules. First-year students may not take the S/U option except for a course with only S/U grades available. The grade S, once turned in by the instructor, is **NOT SUBJECT TO LATER CHANGE.** 

Grading options are listed in the Class Schedule as either GRADING OPTION A-F REQUIRED or GRADING OPTION S-U REQUIRED. If neither of these is listed, the instructor will permit eligible students to choose either option by the date the instructor specifies at the beginning of the course. Once you have chosen, you may not request that the S/U be changed to an honor point grade.

If coursework grades average below a C under the S/U option, the grade U (Unsatisfactory) will be given with no credit earned.

#### TRI-COLLEGE EXCHANGE

The College of Saint Benedict, Saint John's University, and Saint Cloud State University have an agreement which encourages regular full-time undergraduate students to take courses on any of the three campuses. If you are interested in taking courses at Saint Cloud State, you can pick up a copy of their Class Schedule and a registration application at the Registrar's Office. If a course seems suitable for your program of studies, see your advisor for permission to register. To register, file the approved application with the Registrar's Office at the St. John's campus before August 21<sup>st</sup>. The course will be added to your Fall 2001 Term Program of Studies, if space is available.

CSB/SJU students will be billed tuition, and other fees, at CSB/SJU rates. If a student is not registered for more than 18 total credits, there will ordinarily be no additional charge. For credits over 18, an additional tuition charge of \$500.00 (estimate), will be made for each additional semester credit hour.

If you have any questions about Tri-College Exchange and the suitability of SCSU courses toward your degree program, see Jane Simon in the Registrar's Office, QUAD 161.

#### TRANSCRIPT SERVICE

Current students may request an unofficial copy of their transcript at no charge from the Registrar's Office. Official transcript requests must be submitted in writing to the Registrar's Office and may be picked up at the Registrar's Office (or we can mail them for you) 2-3 days after the request is made, except during the first and last week of each term.

Former students may request a transcript copy for \$3.00 per transcript. The fee for faxing a transcript will be \$3.00 per transcript. If the transcript is faxed outside the U.S. the fee will be a minimum of \$5.00. All transcript requests must be submitted in writing via mail or fax and payment must accompany the order.

#### WITHDRAWAL FROM COLLEGE

Complete withdrawal from all of your courses during the term must be initiated with your Residential Director at CSB, Mary Commons 221 or the Residential Life Office, Mary 018 at SJU. If you withdraw by September 21<sup>st</sup>, no official record of your registration for that term will be made. If you withdraw between September 24<sup>th</sup> and November 14<sup>th</sup>, the mark "W" will appear behind that term's courses on your transcript. If you withdraw after November 14<sup>th</sup>, all courses for that term will be followed by the grade of "F". If you decide to withdraw after the term ends, you MUST notify the office mentioned above.

The academic calendar concludes each semester with a one-day study and four-day test cycle. Faculty may administer final exams for their classes only during the exam periods officially scheduled by the Registrar's Office. Cumulative final examinations may not be given during the regularly scheduled class days of the semester. If there is to be a cumulative final exam in a course, all exams given during the semester must be returned for student review by the last scheduled day of class.

Instructors of each full-term course are expected to announce at the beginning of the course whether a written two hour final examination will be given. Such an exam will be administered during the four day test cycle according to the schedule above. Note that a class is assigned a test time and day in the schedule according to the cycle and time period it meets during the semester. Classes which meet after Period V may use their last regularly scheduled class period for a final exam.

One period has been reserved on each of the four test days for the administration of a common exam for multiple-section courses who so desire. A list of such courses, and their exam times, will be announced this fall. The legend, MS, in the accompanying chart signifies times set aside for these multi-section common exams.

The classroom assignments or campus locations of some classes listed in this Schedule may be changed before the term begins. Students MUST consult their Program of Study printout they will receive at the time they report to confirm their registration in August, just before classes begin.

## **FALL 2001 COURSE DESCRIPTIONS**

#### **COMMUNICATION**

COMM 381: SPT: Rhetoric of Music

Contemporary scholars of rhetoric have spent the past quarter century attempting to expand the definition of rhetoric to include a variety of forms of communication. This course will follow in that path by studying the role music has played in efforts to persuade throughout U.S. history. Students will read about, listen to, discuss and research such musical forms as Spirituals, Corridos, Blues, Rock, Folk, Country and Rap to discover their role in the evolution of the American social conscience.

PREREQUISITE: COMM 101

#### **COURSES OF THE COLLEGE**

COLG 105: Special Topics: EMT Basic

This course covers basic minimal emergency care required to work on an ambulance or first responder squad throughout the 50 states in the The course offers basic to more advanced techniques and principles of pre-hospital; emergency care. Students must be at least eighteen years old to take the National and State Certification exams. Students who have been convicted of a felony should contact the course coordinator.

#### **CORE - SENIOR SEMINARS**

CORE 390-01A: Gender, Power and Consumer Culture

Martha Blauvelt and Meg Lewis

This course is cross-listed with GWST 390

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make moral decisions.

Since the beginning of modern consumer culture in the late 19th c., gender has been a prominent and often defining factor in that culture's development. How things are sold and who buys what have shaped American imagination, economics, politics and history as well. What does this mean for our moral decision-making?

This course examines issues of consumption and commercialization by first looking at the origins of modern patterns at the turn of the century, when spending promised Americanization for immigrants, status for the middle class and purchasing power for women, even as it bound them to materialism and defined their roles. As we move through the twentieth century, we will examine how contemporary gender images, roles, and identities are mediated by the marketplace; how "politics as consumption" shapes political participation and choices; how new patterns of consumption affect how we experience family and community

(how is the work-family dichotomy driven by consumption patterns?); and how consumerism has turned social problems into individual purchasing decisions (simplify your life by buying a twenty dollar book on living more

The field of consumer culture provides theoretical and ethical challenges to one of the most basic elements of contemporary society. Among the books we may read are:

Thorstein Veblen: Theory of the Leisure Class

#### CORE 390-02A: World Hunger: Causes and Solutions

Diane Veale-Jones

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make moral decisions.

Who are the world's hungry? Why are they hungry? What does it mean to be hungry? What is the impact of hunger on individuals, households and nations? This course examines the ethical dimensions of world hunger and the moral arguments about what and how the issues of hunger should be addressed. These approaches include lifeboat ethics, food aid, rights and justice, and development programs.

We explore the role of social, economic, political and agricultural factors as causes of hunger and as forces for ending hunger. Some of the topics we will address include: food insecurity, overpopulation, poverty, conflict, and food production. What approaches to ending hunger have been successful? Why? Is it possible for an individual or small group to have an impact on world hunger? Do we have a moral obligation to try?

#### CORE 390-03A: Social Issues and Law

Tim Robinson

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make moral decisions.

Making decisions for ourselves can be complicated enough. The complications just get worse when we have to make a decision on behalf of all of us. But that's just what legislators and judges to, and it's what every citizen does who walks into a voting booth. In this course we'll practice sorting out the complexities of collective decision-making by focusing on a couple of issues of current interest. Possible topics include capital punishment, abortion, affirmative action, the morality of war, and others. For guidance, we will call on philosophical analyses of ethics and politics, and on examples of practical reasoning exhibited in judicial opinions. We'll look at several court cases, both real and imaginary. No previous training in law or philosophy required.

#### CORE 390-04A: The Moral Core of Judaism and Christianity John Merkle

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make moral decisions.

In this course we will explore the foundational moral values of both Judaism and Christianity and how these values can affect politics, economics, and other aspects of social life. Among the themes we will examine from Jewish and Christian perspectives are the connection between religion and morality, the relationship between humanity and the rest of creation, militarism and the nature of enmity, and the bond between justice and peace. In the process, we will seek to discern the roots and the content of our own deepest religious and moral convictions, the means by which we may review, revise, and enact these convictions, and the goals to which they lead.

#### CORE 390-05A: Ethics and Economics of Sustainable Societies Ernie Diedrich

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make moral decisions.

In this course, we analyze the ethical and economic underpinnings of current industrial societies, critique them, and suggest a different foundation for sustainable societies. The topics covered include the economic and philosophical underpinnings of current market systems, a critique of these underpinnings including the flaws in neoclassical

economics (epistemology, methodology, and ethics), and an evaluation of how a new paradigm might be constructed.

The purpose of this course is to decide if societies such as ours are sustainable (after we understand this idea) and suggest what a sustainable society could be. #### CORE 390-07A: Do Animals Have Rights?

Elizabeth Wurdak

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make moral decisions.

In this class we shall examine the case for animal rights through readings, film, discussion, debate, site visits and reaction papers. We shall consider current practices regarding the use of animals in research, as well as the treatment of pets, livestock, and wildlife. We shall explore the historical roots of the animal rights movement and the present activities of the organizations that seek to protect animals from abuse. Readings will include *The Monkey Wars* by Deborah Blum, *The Hot Zone* by Richard Preston, *The Dreaded Comparison* by Marjorie Spiegel, selected newspaper and journal articles, and literature provided by animal rights advocacy groups.

#### CORE 390-08A: Art and Morality: Is it Art if . . .?

James Hendershot

Through active involvement, course participants will be developing their own moral framework to deal with the issues addressed by the art world. We will have a chance to apply this framework to some real problems addressed by artists and their works. Students will be shown some techniques of analysis through a series discussing articles, visiting galleries, and tracking the involvement of the various media (television, newspaper, and publications). Seeing the art world from the view of moral critical analysis will be dealt with in groups of 3-4 students. The final project will involve going beyond the limits of the classroom to acquire the information necessary to complete the assignment. The process of gathering information is an important step so the participants will need to sharpen their innovative research skills.

Participants will raise questions ancient and modern: Does producing art to promote social issues end up destroying art? Are the values of art more important than social values? And on the lighter side, a sculpture placed in a pasture and used as a backscratcher, is it art? Participants will be required to read and discuss assigned materials in class and to develop a project independently or cooperatively (pairs). They will work on a schedule of viewing or experiencing the works which they wish to study, collect appropriate data, share it with the class, and discuss it in terms of the core theme, art and morality. The prime goal of the course is to be able to gain insight into what it means to make moral choices in

#### CORE 390-10A: Liberating Earth/Liberating Body

JP Earls

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make moral decisions.

Environmental ethics of liberation. An exploration of the links between the environmental crisis and the inequities of race, class, gender and species that insure the "social securities" of those on top--like most of us. Many believe that the environmental crisis can be remedied by changing public policies and moderating the production, packaging, and the design of consumables. Philosopher Arne Naess calls this "shallow ecology" because it does not reshape our consciousness to be able to deal with a world in which humanity is not "top dog." We will be looking at philosophical and poetic texts in a way that may promote such a reshaping of the consciousness, texts that decenter western humanistic thought and its multiple hegemonies in order to hear such marginalized voices as those of women, animal advocates, and the racially, economically, and erotically oppressed. To free the earth from our consuming ways, we must find a way to free those whose bondage has been our "social security."

#### CORE 390-11A: Ethics in Society

Carmen Mulcahy, OSB, RN, PhD

What are the challenges of daily life that affect people and their decisions? Whether these challenges come from government, business, economic conditions, health administration or clinical health care, how do we meet them? Today the word "ethics" is frequently used. How is it understood? Various kinds of media presentation, though concerned with problems of an ethical nature, are explored apart from professional, philosophical, or ethical guidelines or principles. The question arises as to what preparation sources and methods help people function ethically. The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make good moral judgments. Through readings, discussion, presentations and writing, ethical implications of situations in society will be explored. Case studies, films, presentations and role-playing will be utilized.

# CORE 390-12A: Religion, Ethics and Politics in America

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make moral decisions.

Americans have a conflicted view of the role of religion in the political life of the country. Religion is viewed by many as indispensable for personal and public moral behavior; to others, religion is mainly a source of sectarian conflict, intolerance, and public disunity. Some welcome the voices of ministers, priests, and rabbis in our political debates; others argue that politics doesn't belong in the pulpit, because voting is a matter of conscience and not religious conformity. As individuals, we often question what religion has to do with morally ambiguous political choices involving selecting the "lesser of two evils." In this course we will look at the role of religion in our private and public lives from 1) a historical perspective (e.g., what did the "separation of church and state" mean to the writers of the Constitution? 2) case studies (e.g., Jesse Jackson, Pat Robertson, and Roman Catholic bishops) and 3) contemporary controversies. Students will be encouraged (and expected!) to discuss what is the appropriate level of involvement for religious leaders in politics, and the appropriateness of individuals using religious beliefs to guide how they vote and act politically.

#### **EDUCATION**

#### **EDUC 108: First Year Field Experience**

This introductory field experience for students intending to either major or minor in education is taken concurrently with EDUC 107. The field experience consists of two components: 1) Students will participate in an approved Service Learning Program of at least 30 hours in which there is direct service to at-risk children/youth. Satisfactory completion of this component will be assessed through on-going communication about the field experience with the course facilitator, a supervisor's evaluation, and a final reflection paper that addresses prescribed standards. 2) A field experience of 5 full days (35-40 hours total) in an approved school setting at a level of intended licensure (elementary/secondary). Students will need to arrange for this experience to take place during a college break. Satisfactory completion of this component will be assessed through a reflection paper that addresses prescribed standards and a supervisor's evaluation.

<u>INTENDED FOR</u>: New ELED majors who have not taken EDUC 212 or 275.

#### **ENGLISH**

#### **ENGL 243:** Reading Literature, Theory, and Culture

The literary component of this course will offer a global survey of award-winning fiction and poetry from the last ten years, including works such as Jhumpa Lahiri's *Interpreter of Maladies* (Pulitzer 2000), Philip Roth's *American Pastoral* (Pulitzer 1998), Michael Ondaatje's *The English Patient* (Booker Prize 1992), Ben Okri's *The Famished Road* (Booker 1991), and other works by Toni Morrison, Nadine Gordimer, Arundhati Roy, and Robert Haas. The real fun in this course will come from our readings in current literary and cultural theory, including Marxist and materialist theory; psychoanalytic theory; gender theory; race, ethnicity, and post-colonial analysis.

#### **ENGL 355: Individual Authors**

This course will engage texts that struggle over the content and meaning of particular traumatic histories. Such historical events are generally surrounded in controversy about what "really" occurred. Often there is an "official" version of history written by a national government. We will read fictional texts that attempt, in some way, to tell an oppositional "truth." Texts that could fall into this category are *One Hundred Years of Solitude* and *Beloved*.

Individual authors vary. (A possible grouping of authors might be: Gabriel Garcia Marquez, William Faulkner, Ariel Dorfman, and Toni Morrison.) Format: discussion and lecture. Evaluation: one short paper (5-8 pages) and one research paper (12-20 pages).

This course can be used towards the Gender and Women's Studies

#### **ENGL 366: Studies in Modern Literature**

In describing the first half of the twentieth century, some would agree with T. S. Eliot that that is was "wasteland" characterized by spiritual and cultural sterility. Or they might say with W. B. Yeats that "Things fall apart; the center cannot hold." The events of these fifty years were so cataclysmic, that many people sensed the end of Western civilization as they knew it. The brutality of World War I, the Great Depression, the rise of fascism in Europe and international Communism led many people to a sense of social breakdown and individual powerlessness. Writers like Ernest Hemingway, William Faulkner, T.S. Eliot, and Ezra Pound reflect the fragmentation and uncertainty of the age.

But that is not the whole story. During this half-century, new voices made themselves heard, telling new stories. In the 1920s, for example, the Harlem Renaissance brought African-American experience to new prominence through the work of such writers as Zora Neale Hurston, Jean Toomer, and Langston Hughes. In the 1930s, language and labor came together, as working people became both the subjects and the authors of fiction, poetry, and reportage. This was a period of disillusionment but also a time when literature reflected a sense of protest and promise.

Some works we may read are: T. S. Eliot, *The Four Quartets*; John Steinbeck, *The Grapes of Wrath*; F. Scott Fitzgerald, *The Great Gatsby*; Tillie Olsen, *Yonnondio*; James Agee and Walker Evans, *Let Us Now Praise Famous Men*; Ernest Hemingway, *For Whom the Bell Tolls*; Zora Neale Hurston, *Their Eyes Were Watching God*; Jean Toomer, *Cane*; John Neihardt, *Black Elk Speaks* 

<u>PREREQUISITE:</u> Fulfillment of HML literature and Sophomore standing. NOTE: HMU pending approval.

#### ENGL 385: Studies in Lit: Literature of the Indian Subcontinent

This course can be used to fulfill the requirements for the Asian Studies Minor.

A study of twentieth century literature of the Indian sub-continent (India, Pakistan, Bangladesh, and Sri Lanka), emphasizing its historical and social contexts. Our readings will examine the way this literature has been shaped by the impact of British colonization, the nationalist movements, and by more recent political upheavals. We will also explore the relations between the complex social structures (of religion, class, caste, etc.) that crucially inform the literature of these countries.

Texts will include: Rabindranath Tagore, <u>Home and the World;</u> Salman Rushdie, <u>Midnight's Children;</u> Mahaweta Devi, <u>Imaginary Maps;</u> Anita Desai, <u>In Custody</u>; Maniza Naqvi, <u>Mass Transit;</u> Hasan Manzar, *A Requiem for the Earth;* Romesh Gunesekara, *Reef;* Michael Ondaatje, *Anil's Ghost;* 

<u>PREREQUISITE</u>: Completion of **HML** literature and sophomore standing.

#### **GENDER AND WOMEN'S STUDIES**

**GWST 390: Gender, Power and Consumer Culture** 

This course is cross-listed with CORE 390 See description under CORE 390

#### **GEOLOGY**

#### GEOL 350: Petrology

A study of igneous, sedimentary and metamorphic rocks in outcrop, hand sample and thin section. This study includes the description and classification of rocks, and a study of the histories and origins of rocks. <u>PREREQUISITE:</u> GEOL 210 Physical Geology

#### **HISTORY**

#### HIST 200: Witchcraft and Magic in Early Modern Europe

During the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, intellectual, economic, political, social, and cultural factors produced thousands of trials for the crimes of witchcraft, sorcery, and superstition throughout Europe. We will examine these trials and what they can tell us about society and culture during the period. We will look at popular belief in sorcery, magic, and diabolical activity; ideas about gender and sexuality that influenced definitions of the witch; the legal institutions that supported witch trials in civil and church courts; and the reasons for the decline of witch-hunting and belief in witchcraft and sorcery. Primary sources will include witch trials, treatises written by clerics and secular officials about the nature of the witch, and works by contemporaries who criticized the witch-hunts. The witch-craze has attracted considerable attention from historians; we will examine and evaluate their different historical approaches and interpretations.

#### HIST 389-01A: Historiography & Methods

Ken Jones

This section of HIST 389 is designed for Social Science majors who are Secondary Education minors.

This course has multiple goals. At the most basic level, it is intended to make you more familiar with the history of the United States over the last 50 years, but it also raises the issue of historiography, or how the story of these decades has evolved as different people have shaped the narrative. Finally, it is designed to increase your readiness to teach High School History. My hope is that you will leave this course with more confidence in your ability to lecture and lead discussion, and with some new ideas on how to make the recent past exciting for the students you will soon be teaching.

#### HIST 389-02A: Historiography & Methods

S. Carol Berg

Between 1900 and 1917 (though sometimes give as 1890-1920), we have what is called the Progressive Era in U.S. history. During that time, many reform drives began or were continued; among these are: regulation of economy, an increase in welfare, and municipal reform. But historians differ greatly in their interpretation of who led this movement and how much success it enjoyed. Profound changes did occur, however, and we will examine several of them—noting the varied explanations and judgments.

Through extensive reading, writing and discussion, we will explore the Progressive Era, using both primary and secondary sources. A bibliographic essay may be required.

#### **HONORS**

#### HONR 210: Medicine: East Meets West (NS)

Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) is becoming increasingly popular in this country, yet few of us have an understanding of its historical development. In this course, we will compare and contrast the history and practice of medicine in the West and in China. The comparative study of these medical systems is inexorably intertwined with the development and practice of science in the different hemispheres. Hence we will also explore in depth how the practice of science evolved differently in China and the West. Specifically, we will probe how cultural differences affect the methods we use to explore our world and our definitions, diagnosis, and treatment in both TCM (including 5 Element and Yin/Yang theories, acupuncture and herbal medicine) and "modern" medical practice (based on a molecular and cellular foundation). Laboratory experiences will help students study the nature of the modern scientific "method" and the properties of biological molecules.

#### HONR 230: Music and Creativity (FA)

<u>Music and Creativity</u> is a study of the creative process in music through listening, musical analysis, history and comparison with other disciplines. It will study the creative process through a book called <u>Music and the Mind</u> by Anthony Storr. The class will study the life of one particular composer through a biography. It will concentrate on about ten major musical works through listening, live performances and class analysis. Class includes a research paper, discussion and writing flags.

# HONR 240: Development of the Christian Tradition (TH) Michael Patella

The course will study the foundations of the Christian faith and its development throughout two millennia. Texts include major selections from the Bible, patristic literature, and pertinent writings up to the present: the arts will also be an important component of the investigation. Ecumenical in focus and addressing topics in Judaism, special attention will be given to Catholicism and Western Christianity.

#### HONR 240: The Development of the Christian Tradition (TH) Vincent Smiles

An introduction to the discipline of Christian theology with a substantial focus on select themes and texts of the scriptures. Attention is also given to the method of theological study and to the development of the Christian tradition since Biblical times. Students will be introduced to the Biblical languages, especially Hebrew, and will learn to think critically both abut the Bible and about modern theological controversies.

#### HONR 250: Persuasion in Society (HML)

The course addresses the issue of public persuasion. Students will learn to think critically about the ways individuals and groups identify needs and concerns of particular audiences and use language creatively to respond to those needs and problems. The course will be organized around the rhetoric of several U.S. social movements such as the American Revolution, Abolition, Women's Liberation and La Raza. Evaluation of student work will include papers as well as individual and group presentations.

#### HONR 310: Great Books/Ideas (HMU)

This is a yearlong discussion based seminar that concentrates on some of the world's greatest works of literature, philosophy, and intellectual history. Authors may include Augustine, Euripides, Austen, Thoreau, Biblical writers, Camus, Dostoevsky, Tolstoy, Eliot, Faulkner, Pynchon, Freud, Homer, Kafka, Melville, Dinesen, Flannery O'Connor, Plato, Nabokov, Shakespeare, Cervantes, Virginia Woolf, and others. Preference will be given to Junior honors students, but Seniors will also be considered. Registration is my permission of the instructor only. Interested students should email the instructor. All students in this course purchase a personal library consisting of roughly 100 books, and students are required to read a number of novels and plays during the summer.

#### HONR 320: Gender and Communication (SSU)

Examines the impact of socialization on gender roles and the influence of gender roles on communication. Looks at the communication behaviors of women and men in same sex and mixed sex contexts. Introduces students to current theories of gendered communication. Examines the function of communication in gender role development. Topics may include development of sex roles, language, perception, nonverbal cues, power, homophobia, self-disclosure, self-assertion, communicative style, gender in private contexts (such as friendship, marriage, family, romantic relationships), gender in public contexts (such as the classroom and the workplace), gender in the media, and sexual harassment.

#### HONR 340: Ethics and the Jewish Tradition (JC)

An introduction to the sources of Jewish moral principles (as presented in the narrative and legal portions of the Bible and rabbinic literature) and the relationship of those principles to other Jewish religious concepts. Students will then explore how the classical sources can be used in practical moral problems, including medical decisions, social and business dilemmas, and interpersonal relationships. The course will conclude by examining the unique ethical challenges posed by the events of the Holocaust.

# HONR 390: Justice in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century (Senior Seminar) Daniel Finn

Few issues are as fundamental to human life as justice: everyone is in favor of it. Yet few issues are as controversial: justice has widely divergent meanings for different people. This course will examine in detail five rival understandings of justice prevalent in debates today. Students will read two novels and five philosophical theological treatments of the notion of justice in our joint efforts to come to grips with what justice means in our lives: personally and on a national and global scale. Like all Senior Seminars, the goal of this course is to improve each student's ability to make good moral judgments.

#### **LEARNING COMMUNITIES**

# ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES LEARNING COMMUNITY: PEOPLE AND THE ENVIRONMENT IN NORTHERN MINNESOTA

The Northern Minnesota Learning community will provide students with an interdisciplinary examination of the complex issues involved in species and habitat preservation, natural resource management, and economic development in this region. Students will begin the semester at CSB|SJU and will spend a month (late September - late October) in field study off campus in Northern Minnesota. Students and faculty will spend the remainder of the semester engaged in study and research back at the CSB/SJU campuses, where all students in the learning community will be enrolled in the following courses together:

#### **ENVR 250: Integrated Environmental Science**

This course will provide an interdisciplinary examination of ecosystems and important environmental issues in the region. This course will have a laboratory component that will involve both field and bench exercises. Extensive fieldwork will be carried out at the Cloquet Forestry Center and the Itasca Field Station. This course carries natural science core designation and a quantitative reasoning flag.

#### HIST 360: U.S. Environmental History

This course will examine the history of U.S. environmental thought, practice, and legislation, with an emphasis on developments in the 20th century. This special edition of Environmental History will have a substantial focus on issues important to Northern Minnesota and surrounding regions. This course carries an upper-division humanities core designation.

# ECON 329/MGMT305: Sustainable Enterprise in Northern Minnesota (cross-listed)

This course will examine the economic issues involved in economic development in Northern Minnesota. Examples of traditional and "green" businesses will be examined. This course will count as an upper-division social science course for the Environmental Studies Minor.

#### ENVR 271/371: Independent Research Project

Brown, Lamberts, Deidrich, Larson, Partridge, Ross:

This learning community will provide an opportunity for independent or collaborative exploration of economic and environmental issues related to Northern Minnesota. Students will design and conduct research projects and present their findings to affected communities or groups in the region. This project will satisfy the ILP requirement of the Environmental Studies Practicum.

#### **MANAGEMENT**

#### MGMT 305: International Finance

This course examines the international dimensions of finance. The financial management of a multinational corporation is more complex than the management of a strictly domestic enterprise. This course also provides a conceptual framework for the key financial decisions that a multinational corporation must make. Topics include the balance of payments, the determination of exchange rates, methods of hedging exchange rate volatility, short-term and long-term financing, the cost of capital for a multinational, multinational capital budgeting, and international cash management.

#### PREREQUISITE: MGMT 201, ECON 111, ACCT 113

#### MGMT 305: Marketing Research

Methods for collecting and analyzing data to solve marketing problems. Topics include research design, secondary and primary data collection, sample design and data analysis.

\*\*PREREQUISITE:\*\* MGMT 321\*\*

#### MGMT 305: Management Information Systems

Conceptual foundations of MIS, roles of computer-based information systems in organizations, global and ethical issues in MIS, and business application software with an emphasis on database management systems.

#### PREREQUISITE: MGMT 241

#### MGMT 380: Applied Strategic Management

Fulfills the experiential learning requirement for management majors. This course is designed as a management practicum to reinforce the link between strategic theories and application of the theories. Students enrolled in this practicum will meet periodically in a classroom setting to share their common experiences. Students will set up their own practicums early in the semester and will write a summary paper on their practicums as a final project. Students can choose from a menu of practicums including: volunteer service learning commitments, campus

organizational leadership positions, and community work with managerial responsibilities.

PREREQUISITE: Senior Management Major

#### **MATHEMATICS**

#### MATH 115: Pre-Calculus Mathematics

Properties of polynomial, trigonometric, exponential functions. For the student who needs further preparation for calculus.

<u>PREREQUISITE:</u> Three years of college preparatory mathematics and mathematics proficiency.

#### Math 340: Elementary Number Theory

The first set of numbers that you became familiar with as a child was the set of positive integers, {1, 2, 3, 4, ...}. This set is also the (most important) set of numbers studied in the branch of mathematics known as number theory. Although the study of the integers has fascinated mathematicians for over 2500 years, the enthusiasm greeting Andrew Wiles' proof of Fermat's Last Theorem in 1995 demonstrates that number theory remains an active and exciting area of current research. Number theory is tantalizing because many easy to state, but difficult to answer, open questions remain. For example, is every even number > 4 the sum of two odd primes, as was conjectured by Goldbach? Are there infinitely many "twin" primes (primes such as 17 and 19, which differ by 2)? In addition to studying the main concepts of elementary number theory, we will also look at some very practical applications to such areas as cryptology (the study of secrecy systems).

#### **MODERN AND CLASSICAL LANGUAGES**

#### FREN 351: (Topics in French Literature) Poesie Et Musique

From the epic history of the Chanson de Roland to the rap lyrics of contemporary Ivory Coast musicians, poetry has offered powerful glimpses of culture, politics and the bonds of social commitment. Poets as diverse as Jacques Brel and Celine, and the troubadours and Edith Piaf, Lamartine and Colet have also magnified, rarified, glorified themes of love, identity, personal conquest and loss. In this seminar, we read poetry from many periods of French-language literature, concentrating on poems which were sung or accompanied by music, or those using music as metaphor. We will also discuss the ways poetry has variously aligned itself with theatre, philosophy, criticism, history and narrative.

Readings include canonical figures (Ronsard, Verlaine, Prevert, Anne Hebert, etc.) as well as artists on the fringes of the poetic tradition (choice here depends on specific interests of seminar participants). Assignments may include explication de texte, essay, historical study, performance, translation and creative adaptation. Informal sessions are available between class meetings for poetry readings, comprehension checks and individual coaching in pronunciation. The main goal of the course is to learn to appreciate more deeply the beauty and power of poetry. Students will also gain increased fluency in French through specialized (and fun!) exercises in versification, phonetics, rhetoric, listening comprehension and oral presentation.

# SPAN 355: Highlights in Contemporary Latin American Short Fiction

Selections from Nobel Prize winner Gabriel Garcia Marquez, Borges, Cortazar and by a constellation of distinguished women authors. Focus on literary analysis, symbolic and critical thinking, class discussions and research papers.

PREREQUISITE: SPAN 312 or Permission of Instructor

#### **NURSING**

#### NRSG 365 Health Deviations II

This course emphasizes the collaborative role of the nurse in providing nursing care to individuals and families experiencing critical, chronic and/or terminal illness. Students will examine clinical nutrition aspects of care for those clients with specific critical and/or chronic health deviations and those clients who are terminally ill. Students will develop the ability to provide psychological support to clients and/or families coping with issues of loss, death, grief and chronic pain. Quality of life issues and the meaning of suffering are examined.

#### **NUTRITION**

#### **NUTR 225: Experimental Food Science**

A laboratory-based foods course which examines the underlying principles of chemistry, biology, and physics that influence food quality. Employing the scientific method, students observe the effects of modifying ratios and types of ingredients, as well as altering preparation

methods on a variety of food products. Emphasis is placed on classic culinary techniques in the preparation of food, and sensory and objective evaluation of the results of food experiments. Issues of food safety, technology, and biotechnology are discussed throughout this course.

#### NUTR 342: Interviewing and Counseling

This is a practice/performance-based course that introduces necessary clinical skills to dietetics majors early in the curriculum. The intent is to improve mastery of interviewing and counseling skills through emphasizing this as a separate topic, allowing students more time to focus on establishing performance in this area, and then apply what they have learned in upper division course work. Observing student performance in this area earlier in the curriculum provides greater opportunity for focused advising and mentoring of students in skill development. It is a 2-credit course that will allow for small class size, flexibility for student's schedules and course load as well as departmental staffing.

PREREQUISITE: NUTR 125, NUTR 323

#### **PEACE STUDIES**

#### PCST 354: Global Environmental Politics (SSU)

Explores the nature of the environment as an international political issue. Specifically, topics to be covered include: transnational environmental movements, North-South issues, restrictions on national sovereignty, the environmental impacts of international monetary and trade organizations and the effectiveness of global conferences.

#### PCST 368-01A: Social Movements

Why do social movements emerge when and where they do? What are effective organizing strategies and who becomes involved and why? Why do some movements use violence and others nonviolence? What other kinds of tactics do movements use? What kinds of impacts do movements have and when are movements effective in achieving their goals? How do social movement groups and organizations operate? What impact are transnational social movements having in the global system? In this course we will address these and other questions, and look at several social movements within countries, such as the U.S. Civil Rights movement. We will also look at the emerging development of transnational social movements, such as the anti-globalization movement.

#### PCST 368 02A: Jewish Lit (HMU)

This discussion seminar will consider an international range of modern and postmodern Jewish writers who explore themes of peace and justice in their works. We begin with Franz Kafka, whose novel *The Trial* and novella "In the Penal Colony" post fundamental questions as to the nature of judgement and punishment. We turn next to Martin Buber, whose retellings of Hasidic tales portray visions of millennial peace and universal harmony. We then consider first-hand responses to the Holocaust and the new Israeli state by poets Nelly Sachs, Paul Celan and Yehuda Amichai, as well as novelist Amoz Oz and memoirist Simon Wiesenthal. Next we immerse ourselves in Jewish stories set in postwar America—and dealing with the political turmoil of the present—by Isaac Bashevis Singer, Resellen Brown and Grace Paley. Two written essays will be required on topics to be chosen by the student and approved by the instructor.

#### PCST 368-03A: WOMEN AND PEACE

This course will explore the connections between gender and peace in theory and in practice, with a special focus on the traditions of women's peace activism. Topics to be examined include theories relating gendered notions of human nature to violence and peace, militarism (and other forms of institutionalized violence) to violence against women, motherhood to peace, and feminism to nonviolence; the reasons for women-only and women-centered peace groups and movements; the history of women's peace movements in the U.S. and around the world; and the links between women's peace movements, women's rights movements, and other movements for social justice.

#### **PHILOSOPHY**

#### PHIL 368: Special Topics: Morality & Human Nature

Philosophers have wondered about the basis of human morality since the beginning of recorded history. Some have argued that human morality is innate, a kind of "moral instinct," while others have insisted that it is learned. Some have insisted that morality is a matter of feeling a certain way, others that it is a matter of thinking a certain way. Disagreements continue to this day. With all these arguments to and fro, the bewildered inquirer is likely to wonder whether there is any evidence that might help to settle the question. Enter the (relatively) new and recently reenergized tradition of evolutionary ethics. Advocates of this

approach to ethics suggest that human morality is in some sense the product of natural selection. Humans with a certain propensity for fair play, the argument goes, are more likely to survive and reproduce than those lacking this propensity. As a result, at least some aspects of human morality would seem to be innate, products of the evolutionary history of the human species. But which aspects? Will this approach settle the question of whether morality is a matter of feeling or reason? And if morality really is in some sense innate, how is it that humans can behave so badly so much of the time? Can this scientifically informed approach really help to settle these age-old philosophical debates? Let's find out. This class will examine recent writings by philosophers and scientists discussing the proposition that human morality is the result of natural selection.

#### **PSYCHOLOGY**

#### PSYC 309: Sports Psychology

This course will focus on the scientific study of the behavioral, affective, and cognitive reactions of participants and spectators to various sport settings. An emphasis will be placed on the potential of sport to contribute to psychological health and well being, as well as the potential for sport to increase anxiety, aggression, violence, and injury. In addition, the role of the sports psychologist will be examined, including increasing the level of athletic performance, dealing with the emotional problems of athletes, educating athletes, coaches, and spectators, and studying human behavior and mental processes in sports settings. *PREREQUISITE*: PSYC 111

#### **SOCIAL WORK**

#### SWRK 380: Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation

This course is a study of sexual orientation and gender identity from the perspective of individual identity development. The course will also explore the impact of families and communities on the lives of gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender youth and adults. Responses to prejudice and discrimination toward sexual minorities will also be explored.

#### **THEATER**

#### THEA 240: Production Lab: Dramaturgy

Dramaturgical experience under the supervision of a theater faculty member.

- To enhance the student's understanding of the historical and literary background of the dramatic text
- To expand the student's research skills in the discipline of theater
- To foster a meaningful dialogue between the dramaturg and the production team

#### THEA 340: Technical Problems: Dramaturgy

Project of special interest in dramaturgy

- To further enhance the student's understanding of the historical and literary background of the dramatic text
- To expand the advanced theater student's research skills in the discipline of theater
- To foster a meaningful dialogue between the dramaturg and the production team

#### **THEOLOGY**

#### THEO 309: Bible Church & Gender

This course is cross-listed with CORE 359

An exploration of the engagement between, on the one hand, the Bible and the Christian tradition and, on the other, modern questions arising from the study of gender (feminism, gay and lesbian studies, men's studies). The course identifies and engages texts and arguments which underlie such issues as: ideas about men (masculinity) and women (femininity) - views on marriage, sex and celibacy - the Bible and homosexuality - women in the Christian tradition - the Bible as a norm for modern sexual ethics and "family values." Essentially the course is a conversation between ancient teaching and insight, which is still with us, and modern perspectives, which both endorse and question the traditional heritage.

#### **THEO 332: Benedictine Spirituality and Community**

This course is cross-listed with CORE 346

Laymen and women throughout the centuries have drawn wisdom and inspiration from Benedictine spirituality and monastic life. This integrated course combines academic study of Benedictine spirituality and values with a community living experience. Intended for men and women who

will live on each campus in apartment style housing and commit themselves to selected spiritual practices and community living. Areas covered include the *Rule of Benedict* and other monastic sources, Christian and Benedictine spirituality: prayer, community, *lectio divina* (prayerful reading), care for creation, simplicity and peace. Attention will also be given to monasticism in its non-western and Protestant forms, to the heritage and charisms of Saint John's Abbey and Saint Benedict's Monastery as well as to the integration of Benedictine values in one's chosen vocation and life. The course will be team-taught by a member of each monastic community and the community living experience will provide the context in which what is learned academically can be practiced and reflected upon alone and with others. Open to persons of all religious traditions who will be juniors or seniors fall semester of each academic year. **Permission of the instructors after an interview is required.** 

#### SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

#### **DOCT 468: Theological Foundations of Art and Architecture**

This class will explore the interplay of theology and aesthetics and theology and beauty and examine the role that art and architecture have played and at present play in the life of the Christian Churches.

#### HHTH 428: History of Spirituality III

This course is cross-listed with SPIR 426

The Development of Christian Spirituality from the Protestant and Catholic Reformations to the present.

#### MORL 468: Environmental Ethics

Can Christian Theology help us in responding to current environmental problems? Does Christian theology have any interest in the "nature"? This course seeks to discover what classical Christian thought has to say about the natural world. The course surveys selected writings of Christian theologians to determine how they answer the question: what should be the relationship between the human person and the rest of creation?

#### PTHM 468-01A: Pastoral Leadership and Professional Boundaries Nils Friberg

This course focuses on issues of personal boundaries and relational integrity for people in ministry, including understanding, integration, and preventive awareness. The course will examine theological and ethical standards that define and shape appropriate behavioral expectations, along with structures of accountability that reduce systemic vulnerability to abusive behavior. Registrants are expected to attend the June 24-26, 2001 or 2002 (dates to be determined) ISTI (Interfaith Sexual Trauma Institute) National Conference.

#### PTHM 468-02A: Pastoral Counseling II

Elisabeth Horst

Building on the foundation of PTHM 408, this course introduces the next level of counseling techniques and theory. Students will practice and refine their counseling skills and explore the appropriate parameters for counseling in a parish setting. We will discuss interventions for some of the more common issues that lead people to seek pastoral counseling.

#### PTHM 468-03A: Issues in Ministry

This course is designed by the sabbatical student and an advisor and focuses on interests the student would like to explore during his/her sabbatical time at St. John's. A general topic needs to be identified as part of the application process and a written or oral summary provided the Director of Lifelong Learning at the end of the sabbatical. Pass/Fail.

#### SPIR 426: History of Spirituality III

This course is cross-listed with HHTH 428

The Development of Christian Spirituality from the Protestant and Catholic Reformations to the present.

#### SPIR 468: A Biblical Spirituality of Hope

This course seeks a fuller Biblical understanding of the redemptive power of the Cross for Christian Spirituality. It examines the claim of literary critic Rene Girard that the Judeo-Christian Scriptures not only illustrate the anthropological roots of social violence but also offer a path for overcoming the ancient mechanisms that continue to destroy whole societies as well as particular families. Topics include the origins of myth and ritual; sacrifice and violence; rivalry and jealousy; divine and human vengeance, the Kingdom of God and the New People of God.

### CORE CURRICULUM REQUIREMENTS

The purpose of the Core Curriculum is to provide students with a foundation and the intellectual tools necessary to examine the fundamental, recurring questions about ourselves and our world. These questions challenge students to broaden their interests and explore a variety of academic areas. Striving to ask those questions well and make good moral and ethical judgments about them is at the heart of our colleges' mission.

#### The Core Curriculum is composed of four levels of requirements:

#### a. Proficiency-based requirements

Foreign language proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in speaking or reading a classical or modern language through satisfactory completion of the language proficiency exam or through satisfactory completion of Modern/Classical Language 211 (with any passing grade).

**Mathematics Proficiency** 

Students demonstrate proficiency in elementary algebra and geometry through satisfactory completion of the mathematics proficiency exam or calculus readiness exam.

#### b. Cross-Disciplinary courses

First-Year Symposium (2 courses) -- CORE 100 & 101, or HONR 100 &101

Senior Seminar--CORE 390, GWST 390 or HONR 390 only. Education majors can complete EDUC 390 and SWRK majors can complete SWRK 390. Ordinarily completed during Senior year. <u>Cannot be repeated for credit.</u> Both semesters of First-Year Symposium must already be completed.

#### c. Disciplinary courses

Only courses which are designated within the course title by the appropriate symbol (FA, HML, MT, JC, etc) may be used to complete the following disciplinary requirements.

# Instructions for Using WEBSTER

#### AT ANY NETWORKED PC:

Log on to the PC (your username and password)
Click on the START button
Select NETWORK PROGRAMS
Select INTERNET APPLICATIONS
Click on NETSCAPE
The CSB/SJU HOMEPAGE displays

#### FROM OTHER PC'S THAT HAVE ACCESS TO A WEB BROWSER:

Sign on as you normally would, then Enter http://www.csbsju.edu/ The CSB/SJU HOMEPAGE displays

- Click on "Inside CSB/SJU". Then click on the word "Student Links" and click on "WEBSTER" on the left hand side under "ACADEMIC"
- Click on the Fall term ONLINE Registration Icon
- At the Registration Login Screen, Click on the box and Enter your Student ID # (with no spaces or dashes) & Enter your PIN # in the
  space labeled "PIN" (PIN # is on the PIN Label you received from your advisor Do not use your WSC)
  Click on the Login button once
- At the Registration Login Verification Screen

Click on the box and Enter your PIN# again & then click on the Login button once

• To Enter your Fall Term Registration:

Click on ADD/DROP Courses

Enter the 5 digit Call #'s for all of the courses you want to register for - call numbers are listed next to the course number in the Spring Class Schedule Booklet. Click on Submit Registration button - you must click on this for your registration to be entered into the computer system. If there is space in the courses you selected and if you meet the necessary prerequisites, the screen will display "Registered Successfully". It will also display the Course ID, Credits and Title of the courses that you have registered for. If a class is closed or you do not meet the prerequisite the screen will display "Class Registration failed with error" and a reason for the error.

• To change the credits on a Variable Credit Course:

Click on Change Course Credit

Enter the number of credits in the box (select from the range displayed) & click on Submit Changes

To check course availability:

Click on Look-up Class to Add

Click on the name of the Subject and Click on Select Subject button

Click on the Department and Course Number and Click on Select Course button

This will display all the sections of that course, and under 'status' it will state 'open' or 'closed'

(Note: You may **not** be able to register for some courses that are 'open' because you do not meet the prerequisite or quota restrictions for that course.)

To request a course that your were unable to enroll in any section of:

Click on Request for Additional Course Spaces - from Student Registration Menu

Enter the 5 digit Call #'s of the course(s) you were not able to enroll in (this request DOES NOT place you on a wait list for the course). Click on Submit

The screen will display "Courses Requested" or "Course Request Failed" and a reason

To change your Fall Registration:

Click on ADD/DROP Courses

Click on the down arrow in the Action Box of the course you want to Drop

Click on DROP

Under ADD Class fill in the Call # of the new course you want to Add

Click on Submit Registration Button - this will drop your course and add a new one at the same time. Keep your Registration PIN # - you may Drop/Add for Fall semester until September 3<sup>rd</sup>.

• To send a copy of your Course Requests to the printer:

Click on File from Menu Bar Select Print & Click on OK

To sign off:

Click on **Exit WEBSTER**Exit the CSB/SJU Homepage
Exit Netscape
Log-off the PC
