Environmental Education and Community Outreach

Saint John's Arboretum is committed to providing environmental education opportunities to its neighbors, students and the surrounding community.

Highlights from this past year include:

- Participated in fall orientation by leading walks for over 1000 incoming freshman the weekend before classes started
- Offered winter classes to prek-12th grades and had 9 classrooms participate in animal signs and winter survival classes
- Twelve sections of Biology 221
 participated in a maple syruping lab
 taught by Arboretum staff out at the
 maple syrup sugar shack

Benedictine Stewardship and Conservation

Environmental stewardship and conservation are at the heart of the Arboretum's mission. Designated a natural arboretum in 1997, its goal is to restore and preserve Central Minnesota's increasingly rare native habitats.

The Arboretum promotes conservation and stewardship within the community through educational programing and ongoing support of the Avon Hills Initiative. Stewardship is also demonstrated through our habitat restoration efforts such as sustainable logging, tree planting, prairie burns during the spring and fall, and a controlled deer hunt for population control.

We are also actively involved in the management of invasive species such as European buckthorn, absinth wormwood, and spotted knapweed which out-compete native plants and degrade native habitats.

In the spring of 2002 the Forest Stewardship Council gave the forests at the Arboretum green certification. Maintaining this certification requires the Arboretum to continuously work towards improving the health of the forest and the sustainability of its timber harvesting plans. This year we are proud that lower grade red oak lumber, usually sold to open market, was used as flooring in the new Abbey Guesthouse.

Avon Hills Initiative

Since May 2004, the Avon Hills Initiative (AHI) has been lead by local residents committed to preserving the rural and natural character of roughly 50 square miles of land in Avon, St. Joseph, Collegeville, and St. Wendel Townships. The organization works through education, community organization, and local governments to increase awareness of land development pressures facing the Avon Hills.

In February, 2006 the Avon Hills Initiative sponsored its second community event in the form of a workshop focused on conservation overlays. The half-day conference included a keynote address, two break-out sessions that featured a number of growth-based issues and a panel discussion on the benefits of establishing a conservation overlay within the Avon Hills district. AHI is hoping to hold community events annually.

The Avon Hills Initiative continues to move forward in its efforts to establish dialogue between citizens and government. To this end, two Avon Hills Initiative executive officers have accepted positions on the Stearns County Comprehensive Plan review group. This group will review the state of the county and establish goals for future development.
