The Story

This play is set in ancient THEBES (Greece, not Africa), a city founded by Cadmus when he sowed dragon teeth in the earth and soldiers sprang up from the teeth. He had several daughters, each of which faced terrible suffering. Zeus fell in love with one of them, Semele, and she became pregnant with the son of the great god. Just like in many families, Semele's parents and sisters did not believe her when she said the king of all gods had made her pregnant and when she died by lightning they said it was proof she had been lying all along. However, Zeus saved the unborn baby, named him Dionysus (also called Bromius) and had him safely raised by nymphs.

Time passed and King Cadmus decided to retire and passed the throne on to his grandson Pentheus (son of Agave). Dionysus was taught mysteries by his father Zeus and created his own rituals so people could worship him; they were happy to worship him since he invented wine and gave this gift to humans. Dionysus and the female followers he collected on his way through Lydia, Persia, Araby and the eastern Mediterranean arrived in Thebes to make sure his "family" and "hometown" accept him as a god. Dionysus has driven all the women of Thebes, including his grandmother and his aunts, off to mount Cithaeron where they practice his rituals, drinking wine, dancing and playing with wild animals. King Pentheus, his cousin, sees him as a human troublemaker who should have his head cut off. That is the when the play begins.

To this end, each production entered is eligible for a response by a regional KCACTF representative, and selected students and faculty are invited to participate in KCACTF programs involving scholarships, internships, grants and awards for actors, directors, dramaturgs, playwrights, designers, stage managers and critics at both the regional and national levels.

Productions entered on the Participating level are eligible for invitation to the KCACTF regional festival and may also be considered for national awards recognizing outstanding achievement in production, design, direction and performance.

Last year more than 1,300 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.

DIONYSUS: This play has as a main character the Greek god Dionysus, inventor of wine. The first recorded theater festival in the world began in Athens in 534 BCE; writing plays and putting them on at the festival was the way the citizens of Athens worshipped Dionysus. *Seeing great tragedies was a form of worshipping this god.* Dionysus was, in a way, a personification of the grape vine itself: in the fall the vine is cut back and appears to be dead; in the spring life spreads from the stump and the large leaves feed the great clusters of grapes. According to William Arrowsmith, the translator of our version, the play is, "best read as an anthropological passion play of the mystical scapegoat or the Year-Daimon. Dionysiac religion is the field on which the action of the play takes place, not what it is deeply about." Later in the same introduction to the play he states that one should, "be aware of the intentional ritual irony that underlies the death of Pentheus—he dies as a scapegoat and a living substitute for the god he rejects. This, however, is an irony of the play, not its meaning."

Euripides (c.480-406 BCE) wrote this masterpiece shortly before his death and it was produced in Athens posthumously by his son; it won Euripides his first prize at the city Dionysia, the theater festival honoring Dionysus.
